

C. And B. Juniors Down M.C.A. 12-6 For First Win On Memorial Field

Johnny Carroll's Curran and Briggs Juniors from Summerside won their first game of the season on Memorial Field as they defeated M.C.A. 12-6 last night in a free flowing Island League Baseball game that was called at the end of seven innings.

The game was a loosely played affair with each side committing more than their share of miscues. The Curran's scored only half their runs while M.C.A. earned only two of their six.

Left-handed Jack Kearns of C & B and Jackie Burke of M.C.A. started on the mound for their respective teams but neither boy pitched as well as he had in previous games. Kearns received credit for the Summerside win.

Burke left in the third inning with the bases loaded and none out after he had issued three straight walks. He was replaced by Melvin MacKenzie, who proceeded to get out of one inning with only one out.

Kearns batted five full innings before Coach Carroll replaced him with his new right-hander, Ed Walker. In the five innings he pitched, Kearns gave up six runs and three hits. He was outpitched by Burke in the fifth inning.

M.C.A. took a one-run lead in the sixth inning as MacKenzie scored on a single. The Curran's took the game in the third as Burke scored on an infield hit. The C & B brought them ahead in the fourth when they came up with a pair of runs in the fourth inning.

The Curran's scored a home run in the fifth inning as the smallest of M.C.A. scored twice over the home run. Irving MacKenzie scored a home triple for M.C.A. in the sixth but was out at the plate trying to stretch it into a double.

Ed Walker pitched all five innings with three hits in five innings.

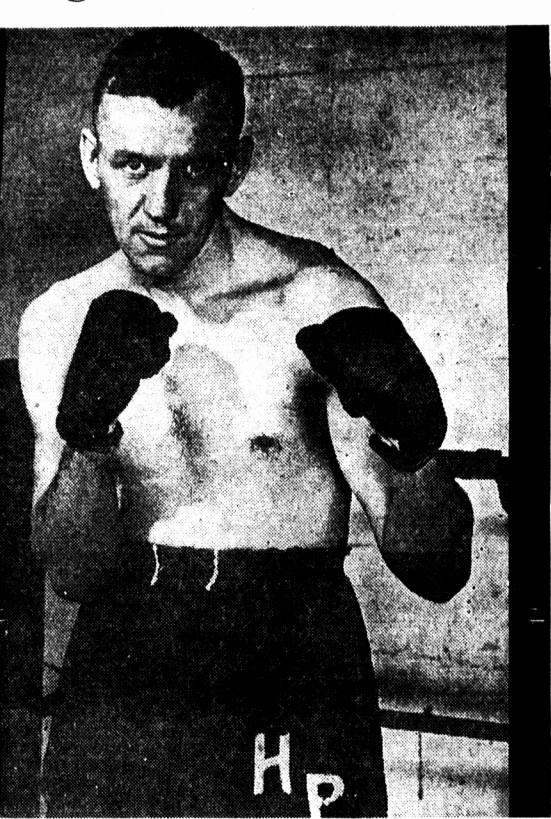

Fights For Title Tonight



Harry "Kid" Poulton (above), the boy who licked polio and every formidable opponent he has ever faced, climbs into the ring tonight for his first crack at the Dominion boxing championship and the biggest fight of his noteworthy career.

"The Kid" takes on champion Yvon Durelle of Chatham, New Brunswick in a 12 round title fight at Stellarton and riding on the clever motions of Poulton's hands and feet will be his and Prince Edward Island's hope of obtaining a Canadian boxing crown.

Poulton, who gave a masterful boxing display in outpointing rugged Gil Edwards of New York here last week will have to be at his boxing best to wrest the crown from the muscular, hard-hitting army soldier from New Brunswick.

Durelle, only 22 years old and possibly the most promising fighter in the Dominion, won the title by stopping George Ross of Glace Bay in a 12 round bout held nearly two months ago.

But Poulton, a skillful fighter especially when he is regarded as the underdog will be going into the ring tonight against the kind of odds he likes. Over the years Poulton has given his greatest fights against the toughest opposition and has risen to the heights when the chips were for him big and blue.

Harry will be taking a wealth of ring experience into the squared circle with him tonight. He has fought more than 100 professional fights and has trained with some of the best boxers in Canada and the Eastern United States.

He will also be taking the best wishes of his fight fan on the Island with him and all will join with us in wishing him the best of luck.

There is a possibility that the fight may be broadcast.

Canadian Football At St. F.X. Likely This Year

ANTIGONISH, N. S. (CP)—St. Francis Xavier University, one of the greatest names in Maritime English rugby, is considering introducing Canadian football to its campus here.

Qualified observers predicted Thursday that the Canadian game probably will be played concurrently with rugby this fall.

Rev. Adley Hogan is coach of the St. F.X. squad.

St. F.X. would be the fifth Maritime university to play the game. It has been introduced at the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton, St. Joseph's in Memramcook, N. B., St. Thomas in Chatham, N. B., and Dalhousie University at Halifax.

In Montreal Father Hogan was an interested observer of the McGill University-Quebec Rugby football Union clinic last week.

Father Hogan filled numerous note books with information about the Canadian game and paid close attention to talks by coach Vic Obeck of McGill University and coach Doug Peahead Walker of Montreal Alouettes of the Big Four.

Winnipeg, (CP)—It's literally true that you can die of a broken heart.

You can even die of fright, sooner or later.

Dr. J. P. S. Cathcart of Ottawa said in an interview at the convention of the Canadian Medical Association here that nearly 100 per cent of coronary thrombosis cases are caused by deep emotional stress or states of neurotic anxiety.

He said that usually such cases resulted from the loss or anticipated loss of someone dear to the patient, or to a son's or daughter's unfortunate marriage or career.

In an address to the Canadian Psychiatric Association, Dr. Cathcart said highest mortality rate from the disease is found among American psycho-analysts and bartenders.

Reiterate Strong Stand Against Sunday Sports

HAMILTON, (CP)—Reiteration of its strong stand against any further extension of Sunday sports and games was made in one of four resolutions adopted Wednesday by the 65th annual Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec.

The convention expressed its "grave concern" at the "growing secularization" of Sunday.

A resolution on religious freedom was sent back to committee because of some disagreement on sections aimed at Quebec Province.

The disputed sections read that "Canadian Baptists use all their resources to challenge religious intolerance and persecution practiced from time to time in Quebec towards various Protestant groups."

"And be it resolved they petition the Quebec legislature to revise legislation which allows the prohibition of the distribution of religious literature on the streets and from door to door."

When other delegates asked if the paragraph dealing with distribution of pamphlets was satisfactory to members of the Grande Ligne mission in Quebec, G. J. Jochem of Montreal replied that he would like a change. The work of Protestant groups in Quebec has been hurt by the activities of one small denomination, he said. While the Baptists had "fairly friendly" relations with the Quebec government, another body had caused trouble at Val d'Or and other places. He would like to make clear the Baptists had nothing to do with such actions.

Japs Arrive To Practice Tennis

VANCOUVER, (CP)—Proper grass courts "just won't grow" in Japan, says Jiro Yamagishi, playing captain of the Japanese Davis Cup tennis squad.

That partly explains why the team, matched against the United States here July 9-11, turned up Tuesday, two weeks early, to begin practising.

But the matches are being held here for only one reason: Japanese insistence on grass courts. None was available in Seattle, where the cup tie was originally scheduled.

Yamagishi explains that insistence too: "We must play on grass in Australia, Forest Hills and Wimbledon, and they're the tennis centre of the world."

"If we're ever going to win the Davis Cup, we first must get used to grass."

He said Japan has experimented with grass courts, importing the seed from England, but without luck.

Boston Red Sox In 23-3 Win Over Detroit Tigers

The last-place Detroit Tigers are making Boston Red Sox look like world-beaters this week.

According to the American loop standings, the Sox are having a tough time staying in the first division. Their pitching has been spotty and most of the time they can't hit a lick.

But against the Tigers apparently they can't miss. Fresh from a lop-sided 17-1 victory the previous day, they eclipsed it Thursday by scoring that many runs in a single inning, a modern major league record, to run their count over the hapless Tigers to 23-3.

It will take some digging from the statisticians to discover how many records were broken in the slugfest. Outfielder Gene Stephens shattered one by hitting safely three times in a single inning.

The big blow of the savage seventh inning was Dick Gernert's three-run homer, the third four-bagger in two days for the former Knoxville, N. S., Wildcat first baseman.

In all, the Sox collected 14 hits and six bases on balls of Steve Gromek, Dick Welk and Earl Harst. Starter Ned Garver, who had departed before the slaughter began, was charged with the loss.
