GOV'T MAJORITY REDUCED TO 14

On the Food Fraud Question.

THE LIBERAL MEMBERS VOTE AGAINST THE GOVERNMENT

Government Prevents a Defeat With Difficulty—Honest Men Refuse to Condone Fraud.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, July 6.—The emergency food debate was continued until past midnight by three Liberals, viz. Monet, Oliver and Richardson, who condemned the white-washing report. The last two said that a great fraud had been committed and they held the Government and the Minister of Militia responsible.

The minority report, introduced as an amendment, was lost.

The vote was taken at 12.30. The tally showed 73 to 50.—six Liberals—Richardson, Oliver, Rogers, Puttee, Ellis and Graham voting for the amendment condemning the minister and the department. Messrs. Gibbs and McCarthy, the two McCarthyites, dodged the vote. The vote was then taken on the motion to adopt the majority report. On the main motion, the vote stood 66 to 52, cutting the government majority down to 14. Ten Liberals voted against the government—Ellis, Oliver, Graham, Rogers, Richardson, Puttee, Patlet, Monet, Bourassa, and Ethier.

The result was received with loud and long continued cheers on the Opposition side. The Government had the advantage of Hon. Mr. Sifton's vote, as he reappeared in the Chamber yesterday.

This is the most curious break in the Government ranks during five sessions.

Dr. Russell and his fellow members of the majority in the committee looked rather blue when they found member after member of their own party refusing to accept their white-washing report. The party whips, the ministers and the premier himself labored all day with the members who could not see their way clear to condone this fraud.

Half a dozen members who proposed to vote against the majority were got into line when it became evident that such action would place the Government in peril. Several were induced to dodge the vote.

THE CAMPAIGN.

Demonstration Against Government at Brookfield.

A grand meeting was held at Brookfield last evening. Donald E. Campbell, Esq., occupied the chair.

The speakers were Mr. Wise, Dr. Douglas, Hon. W. Campbell, Mr. John Wheat, Mr. A. A. McLean, Mr. D. A. McKinnon, Mr. Shaw, Premier Farquharson and Mr. James McLean, of West River.

At the conclusion there was quite a demonstration in favor of the Opposition of the Pineau-Farquharson Government. Cheer after cheer was given for Mr. Wise, the farmer-candidate.

THE NEWS FROM CHINA IS BAD

Prince Tung is Dictator at Pekin

AND HAS ORDERED THE EXTERMINATION OF FOREIGNERS.

A Frightful Story that Will Shock Europe.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

SHANGHAI July 6.—Young Shi Kai Governor of Shang Tung, has wired the French Counsel here that Prince Tung is virtually dictator at Pekin and is preparing an edict ordering the extermination of all foreigners.

This is probably intended to prepare the public for the worst news.

The Chinese cumulative reports, which are generally believed here, declare that all foreigners in Pekin have been massacred and that the Emperor Ruangsu has been absolved.

Thirty thousand Chinese troops are now marching on Tien Tsin under General Nich and troops are proceeding from Peking.

The safety of all the foreigners in the north of China depends upon the prompt action of the Japanese.

Japan has 70,000 troops ready, but is prevented from sending them to China by international jealousies.

LONDON, July 6.—The Daily Mail has this cable from Shanghai dated Thursday: "I have no hesitation in stating crimes, including, I believe, the murder of all the European ministers and officials have been committed in Pekin, at which, when the facts are known, the whole civilized world will stand aghast.

The official information, when it comes, may even include an awful story of outraged English women, tortured children and the public execution in the streets of Pekin of men, women and children.

The story is one of frightful atrocity, which will shock Europe, in fact it may almost be taken for granted that the whole of foreign Pekin has been completely wiped out. These are the whisperings, the startling and sensational rumors, which are floating around without apparent reliable sources in the native quarters. But it must not be forgotten that the imperial telegraphs over which alone news can now come from Pekin are safely in the hands of the Chinese, so that the whisperings and rumors of native quarters, at least, are likely to have some solid basis in fact.

MONTREAL, July 5.—Mr. Tarte, according to the special correspondent of the Patrie, from Paris, recently, had an interview with the promoters of a direct steamship line between France and Canada, who asked for the assistance of the Canadian Government. Mr. Tarte requested them to prepare a memorial, which he promised to submit to his colleagues at Ottawa.

CANADIANS COMING HOME.

Hard Treatment in Field Hospital.

LONDON, July 6.—A number of the First Canadian Contingent sent to South Africa sailed for home on the Allan steamer Parisian yesterday.

They complained greatly of the treatment they were subjected to in the field hospitals. Of 1150 Canadian troops, 800 were stricken down with enteric fever mostly due to the putrid water of Paardeberg.

THE BAYONNE FIRE.

A Hundred Acres Still Fiercely Burning.

NEW YORK, July 6.—Two millions and a quarter of dollars damage has been done by fire at the Standard Oil Works at Bayonne and 100 acres of ground is still burning fiercely. Many buildings and tanks are in ruins.

MILITARY CAMP NOTES.

After it was over the organ was taken to the marquee where further music and song was given. Messrs Leslie Cook and Chas Earle led in the singing, and gave the soldiers a very fine treat.

This evening, at 7.30, the 4th Regt., C. A., band will give a concert at the artillery camp, Victoria Park.
