

# Atlantics Win In Over Time To Go Nine Points Ahead Of Local Team

Fast skating Muckle Hollett, sweeping in from the right wing side, converted Billy Gool's 40-foot pass after five minutes and seventeen seconds of sudden-death overtime here Saturday night to give the Halifax Atlantics a hard won 3-2 victory over the Charlottetown Islanders.

The hard working Hollett, who is the smallest player in the M.M.H.L., swept Gool's shot into the Islanders' cage in one motion as he trapped the pass and flipped a backhand into the top part of the net over a prostrate Al Millar.

The goal broke up a bitterly fought game between the two clubs. During the contest, fifteen penalties were handed out, all of them in the roughly played first and second periods.

As a result of their victory the Atlantics increase their first place lead over the Islanders to nine points. Both teams have 21 games left to play in the league schedule.

A sell-out crowd of about 3,000 people watched the Atlantics skate into a 1-0 lead in the first period. The teams split two goals in the middle frame and the Islanders scored the only counter of the third period to send the contest into overtime.

Penalties played a major role in the Islanders' defeat. The Islanders were two men short when Billy Ford opened the scoring in the first period. Again in the second period the Islanders were playing with a man in the sin bin when Bob Bonness counted to make the score 2-1.

The first period was the roughest, twenty minutes of hockey to be played here for some time as the players on both sides resorted to charging, high sticking and

slashing at the slightest provocation. Referee Hughie Gillis and Art Perry caught many of the infractions but had difficulty in persuading some of the offenders to go to the penalty box.

"Peanuts" McLaughlin of Halifax drew the only misconduct sentence when he hestily pushed Referee Gillis after being charged with a two-minute minor for interference. McLaughlin, although the worst offender, was not the only player guilty of such disrespect towards officials.

Temper cooled in the second period and the fans were treated to some smart hockey. Again in the third period and the overtime the boys concentrated on the puck and came up with a crowd-pleasing performance.

Goalies Al Millar and Roy MacMeekin were in good form. MacMeekin turned aside 32 shots against 23 for Millar. Neither goalie had a shot for the first seven minutes of the game until Buck Whitlock tested MacMeekin with a close-in drive.

The Islanders enjoyed a wide margin of play during the first twelve minutes of the opening period. However a roughing penalty to Clements and a holding penalty to Hurst within the space of a minute left the Islanders two men short and set the stage for the Atlantics' opening goal.

Left winger Billy Ford was the triggerman as he rapped home Billy Watson's rebound. Al Millar was screened on the shot and didn't have a chance to make the save.

Another outstanding feature of the first period was Gary Gordon's body check of Joe Lepine. Gordon

Pete Dunphy, Johnny Taylor and Bob Mooney shared runner-up honors with 13 points each. Clarence MacDonald had 10 points and MacDonald, although guilty of four fouls, sank five out of eight shots for a shooting average of 63%.

Leggett of Saint John was the big man on the visitors attack with a 21 point performance. Coffill was runner-up with 12 points.

The Saints gave a sharp display in the free throw department. They scored on 12 of their 16 chances for an average of 75%. The Red and White court men counted on 36 field goals out of 93 shots for a shooting average of 39%.

The Saint John team scored 15 free throws on 36 chances for a free throwing average of 41%.

The Saints lost the services of second string centre Earl MacKinnon for a short time. MacKinnon suffered a head injury early in the game and was taken to hospital. His condition was reported as much improved yesterday and it is expected he will be back in action within two weeks.

The visitors held the Saints down fairly well in the first quarter. At the end of the first ten minutes the score was 11-5 in favor of the local team. The Saints went ahead 41-20 at the half and were leading 58-33 at the three quarters.

The "Night" will possibly be held shortly after Buck scores the 300th goal of his Maritime hockey career. Whitlock has scored 41 goals this season and 297 goals in his career and it is quite possible he will reach the 300 mark before the week is out.

The 170-pound goal scoring wizard has already won three Maritime senior scoring crowns and is well on his way to his fourth scoring title this year. At present he holds a commanding lead over runner-up Billy Watson of Halifax.

# Robertson Sparks Sydney Millionaires To 5-1 Win Over Glace Bay Miners

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP) — George Robertson gained some prestige for the faltering Sydney Millionaires Saturday, sparking them to a 5-1 victory over the rambling Glace Bay Miners in a Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The Miners, arch-rivals who've been taking their measure quite easily for a couple of weeks, went down in convincing fashion as Robertson scored twice and assisted on other goals by Freddy Hildebrand and Dunc McIntyre. Nick Hill got the other.

Kenny Watson was Miners' lone marksman.

The win left last-place Sydney five points behind Glace Bay.

Robertson started the rout with a smart goal on a power play early in the first period, closely followed by tallies by Hill and Hildebrand.

Sydney pushed their lead to 5-0 in the second as Robertson scored unassisted and then made a perfect pass-out to McIntyre for a slick goal a minute later.

It looked as if Sydney would avenge the 5-0 shutout at the hands of the Miners Friday until Watson, assisted by Bill McCracken, whipped one past Nick Pidsodny mid-way in the third.

The Maritime Major Hockey League is rapidly attaining a name for itself as being the "Graveyard of Referees". Saturday night's game was a good example of why no referee would wish to remain in the business too long.

During the first period on the majority of penalties the fans had to put up with an exhibition of shoving, arguing and delaying the game tactics as the guilty parties tried to convince the officials that they were in the right. Such juvenile practices, possibly intended to cover up for the players' mistake, might be cured by a good stiff rap on the pocket book of every player who roughs up an official. The league has lost most of its highly rated imported officials and will lose its Maritime referees unless something is done to show who's running the game.

Aside from the player-referee incidents it was a good game of hockey. Both defenses hit hard, the goalies were good and the forwards skated well. The difference in the teams lay in the penalties. The Atlantics scored two of their goals when the Islanders were short-handed. The Islanders on the other hand, were totally ineffective when Halifax had men in the penalty box. At one time in the second period the Atlantics had two men in the sin bin and the Islanders could get nothing going.

Halifax playing coach Dugger McNeill didn't play but Dugger arguing with the referees over nearly every minor or major point, could take a pat on the back for the win. It was the big game and he gambled on it all the way in the last fifteen minutes. He used the Watson, Campbell and Ford line much of this time. When they weren't on the ice he put out the Laufman, Bowness, King line. But for the payoff goal he sent out the west rest unit. They caught the Islanders line tired, outskated them and were ready for the break which led to the winning goal.

Goal tender Roy MacMeekin has been the Islanders' biggest problem in the games the locals have lost to the Atlantics. MacMeekin was very sharp Saturday night as he has been in most of the games he has played in Charlottetown. In this season the black-thatched netminder had a solid defense in front of him for the week-end game with Carrol Bloom and Joe Lepine being the standouts. Bloom usually plays a strong game although he often resorts to holding and blocking tactics for which he could easily be penalized.

The Islanders' Al Millar may be out of action for some time. Millar was granted permission to play on Saturday night by the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association. The M.A.H.A. with President Walter Lawlor presiding, met in Halifax Saturday to draw up schedules for the Maritime playdowns in amateur leagues. The Millar case was brought up and the Islanders were granted permission to use him for one game under a clause dealing with "Unusual Circumstances". Earlier President Hudson of the M.M.H.L. had stated that Millar was suspended indefinitely but the M.A.H.A. felt that

# Al Millar Case Rocks MMHL To Foundations

HALIFAX, (CP) — The Maritime Major Hockey League rocked on its foundations over the weekend, but goalie Al Millar is still playing hockey.

The tempestuous netminder of Charlottetown Islanders, who drew a charge in Halifax Friday night, when he was accused of striking a woman spectator with his stick, was back in the nets in Charlottetown Saturday, facing Halifax Atlantics.

He even drew another penalty—a minor for tripping an opponent.

But for 15 minutes, it looked as if the league would fall apart over the decision by the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association that permitted Millar to play.

Free on ball till his assault case is heard next Wednesday, Millar was under automatic suspension as a result of his match penalty.

The Islanders appealed to the M.A.H.A. Saturday, and it was agreed to overrule the suspension by league president J.E. Hudson.

Informed of the decision, president George Tingley of the Atlantics ordered his team to stay off the ice for their Saturday night game in Charlottetown. Halifax officials said the M.A.H.A. had no right to interfere and threatened to withdraw the Islanders did not have time to secure the services of another goalie for Saturday.

The Millar case will again come up in court on Wednesday morning in Halifax, at which time a sentence is expected to be handed down. Judge Hudson has refrained from passing a hockey sentence on the Islanders' goalie until the case has been completed in a civil court. In the meantime the Islanders will be using Chuck Holdaway, who turned in a sharp performance in Halifax last Friday night.
