THUNDER AND LIGHTNING.

Severe Storm Yesterday.

HOUSES STRUCK AND OTHER DAMAGE DONE.

Two Men Struck and Killed at Kelly's Cross.

A severe storm of thunder and lightning, accompanied by a heavy fall of rain, passed over this province yesterday. The storm began early in the afternoon and continued with slight interruptions until late at night.

The telephone lines are considerably interred with by reason of the storm. During the early part of the day communication with some of the outlying sections was interrupted, and some "crosses" are reported in the city.

The switch in the telegraph office was badly damaged during the progress of the storm. About ten o'clock last night Mr. T. C. James entered the office for a postage stamp and found the switch and the wood-work about the same in flames. He at once extinguished the fire and thus prevented what might have been a serious conflagration. By nine o'clock this morning communication with Sackville was established.

The bar of Mr. James Mutch, at Lot 48, was struck by lightning and destroyed. Two calves, and the other contents of the barn were lost.

Martin's lobster factory at Cavendish was destroyed. A barn belonging to Capt. D. Sutherland at the same place was struck, but was not destroyed.

The house of Allan A. McDonald, at Peake's station, was also struck, and the chimney and some other parts of the structure damaged. A woman who was in the house at the time was struck on the foot by the electric current.

The house of Christopher Birt, at Cardigan, was struck and Mr. Birt and two boys were injured. But their injuries are not serious.

A dwelling house near Grant's Mills, Mount Stewart, was also struck.

It is reported that Houston's Hotel, Brackley Point, was also damaged somewhat by the electric current.

Four trees near Mr. Percy Pope's summer residence at Keppock, were struck and stripped of their bark.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

Two Men Killed at Kelly's Cross Last Evening.

(Special by Telephone.)

At 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, during the prevalence of the heavy thunder and lightning, the house of Mr. William Duffy, at Kelly's Cross, was struck and shattered. Unfortunately the damage was not confined to the house alone. Two men, Thomas W. Moanahan and Owen Trainor, neighbors who at the time were visiting Mr. Duffy, were killed outright. The lightning entered the house through a chimney, tearing down an upstairs partition. Thence it went down to the lower floor. Mr. Moanahan was sitting in the dining room chatting. In an adjoining room was Mr. Trainor. Sitting between the two was Mr. Duffy, who escaped without injury. Miss Duffy, who was in the house at the time, also received a shock, from which she fortunately recovered. The sudden loss has created much excitement at Kelly's Cross.

The storm in that section of the Island, as well as at Emerald and in its vicinity, is reported to have been terribly severe.
