PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

One of the Tax Bills Presented

BREWERS, ELECTRIC AND OTHER COMPANIES ARE IN IT.

Liquor Sellers and Liquor Agents are Also to be Taxed.

THURSDAY, May 16.

House met at 10.45. Mr. Campbell asked the chairman of the Stock Farm Commissioners if any of the stock belonging to the Government Farm were exhibited at the Exhibitions at Halifax or St. John last autumn, has the stock on said Farm been tested for tuberculosis, if not why such action has not been taken.

Hon. Mr. McNutt said that the Government did not exhibit the cattle on the Government Stock Farm at the cattle shows in St. John or Halifax. One of the first things he (Mr. McNutt) did after being appointed on the Board of Commissioners was to have the cattle tested, and the veterinary surgeon was here to go on with the work. He called the Commissioners together and found a majority opposed to the test. One of the Commissioners who has a herd of pure bred cattle opposed such action so strongly that it had to be deferred. It was his intention however to have the work done as soon as a majority of the Commissioners were in favor of it. He thought all the herds should be tested. A gentleman had offered a price for one of the shorthorn heifers on the Stock Farm which he wanted for a herd. The man in charge thought the Commissioners would not refuse the offer, and the heifer was taken to Halifax. Upon her return from Halifax he (Mr. McNutt) was called up by telephone and asked if he would accept the price offered for the heifer. But he refused to sell at any price.

Mr. John A. McD. asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to pay Mr. John Hickey, of Darahey, the sum of fifteen dollars as agreed upon for lands taken by the Government to open up a new road to the shore of Darahey River through Hickey's farm.

Hon. Mr. McLean said that the matter in question had been referred to Hon. Peter McNutt and that no application had been made to him by Mr. Hickey.

Mr. D. A. McKinnon moved the third reading of the act incorporating the Prince Edward Island Mutual Insurance Company. Mr. Campbell moved in amendment that the bill be read a third time this day three months.

The amendment was declared lost and the bill was read a third time and passed. Mr. Sinclair voted with the Opposition in favor of the amendment that the bill be read a third time this day three months.

On motion of Mr. A. Peters, the act respecting assignments for the benefit of creditors was read a third time and passed. Hon. Mr. MacLean submitted the following resolution:—

Resolved, that the Government of this Province have liberty to introduce a bill in this present session of the Legislature authorizing the issue of debentures in such form and manner as may be deemed proper for the construction of a wing or annex to the Hospital for the Insane at Falconwood, also for the construction of certain steel bridges and for the purchase and construction of other public works of a permanent nature, such debentures to run for a period of thirty years and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed three per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and the amount for which such debentures shall be issued shall not exceed in the whole the sum of twenty-six thousand dollars; and also to make provision for a sinking fund to redeem such debentures by setting apart every year a sum equal to one and a half per cent on the amount of debentures actually issued.

The House then went into committee on the resolution, with Mr. Wise in the chair. The resolution was reported agreed to and a bill in accordance therewith was presented which was set down for a second reading tomorrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Rogers the bill amending the public schools act was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. D. A. McKinnon the act respecting the profession of medicine and surgery was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. McDonald introduced a bill entitled "an act to amend an act to impose a direct tax on certain classes of traders." Second reading tomorrow.

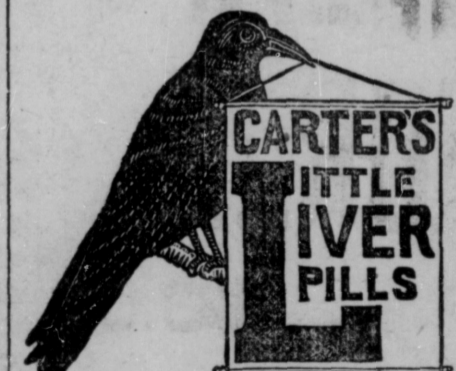
WHY RUSSIA WANTS PEACE

Great Britain at Present is the Only Power Able to Lend Her Money.

The publication of the striking statement as to Russia and England made by M. de Witte, the Russian Minister of Finance, at the private meeting of the Council of Ministers, may, and we hope will, lead to results of the greatest moment, says the London Spectator. That statement, which of course was never intended to be made public, puts with the utmost frankness Russia's commercial position. Russia, like all other countries, wants to grow rich, and wants to develop her great estate. Now, to do this, she wants to do two things. She must sell the surplus products of her agriculture, for Russia is not essentially an agriculture country, and she must be able to borrow capital for the purpose of developing her internal resources. But her ability to fulfil these essential needs is at present greatly hampered. France, Germany, Austria, and indeed the whole of the continent, shut out Russian products; the well beloved ally France, being the most exclusive of all the powers. England is thus the only country that offers a market for Russia's agricultural products; and even here the amount of trade done is not anything like what it might be, and, from the Russian point of view, ought to be, for unless the Russian peasants can sell their surplus products their condition is extremely grave. But not only is Russia hampered by the continent's unwillingness to buy from her, the unwillingness, or perhaps we should say the inability, of the powers to lend her money, is equally well marked, as M. de Witte remarks, the London money market became closed to Russia after the Afghan frontier troubles. Then Berlin was tried, but again political complications closed the doors. Next France was used, but now France seems unable to lend any more. She is either timid or sucked dry. Practically, London remains the only remaining the only available source of loans, for London is infinitely the greatest money market of the world. It comes, then, to this, that Russia wants our aid both as a purchaser and as a borrower. But, as M. de Witte most truly points out, England will not become a better purchaser and a better lender unless public opinion here can be made to take a more friendly view of Russia—can be made, that is, to believe in the security of Russian investments, and can, we may add, be got to understand that Russia and England are not natural enemies.

—Disraeli, it is said, only laughed once in the House of Commons. The incident is described in Sir John Mowbray's "Seventy years at Westminster," published in Blackwood's Magazine for February. Mr. Gladstone had made an impassioned speech in favor of the union of Wallachia and Moldavia. Mr. Disraeli, speaking in opposition, pointed out that the result would be the extinction of the independence of these people, and the only thing left would be the remorse "which would be painted with admirable sequence by the rhetorician of the day." Paraphrasing, Mr. Gladstone said that he would not be guilty of the affected modesty of pretending to be ignorant that designation, "the rhetorician of the day," was intended for himself. Mr. Disraeli interrupted him with the remark "I beg your pardon, I really did not mean that." Disraeli sat down with a satisfied smile that told of his enjoyment. Mr. Gladstone's face expressed amazement and indignation. His opposition had placed him in the mortifying position of applying a remark to himself which had been such personal reference—therefore Gladstone's wrath and Disraeli's smile. The Liberal leader proceeded with his speech, and condemned the "sagittal words and inflated language" of the leader of the Conservative.

LONDON, May 15.—The Times, of Saturday, expressing its hope of a successful termination of the labour of the Joint High Commission for the settlement of questions in dispute between Canada and the United States, says:

"Both the United States and Canada must understand that they cannot expect to have things entirely their own way. Our Imperial part is rather advisory as regards both. Every narrowing of the area of controversy is to be welcomed as promoting good feeling, which we are glad to note is displayed on both sides.

—Major Pollard some time ago prepared a plan of a bridge over Government Pond to replace Black Sam's Bridge, and for the improvement of the pond. We presume that it will receive from our City Fathers the consideration which it merits. The subject is one that ought to be taken up at once. Everyone who passes the spot must feel that Government pond is disgraceful to the city. There was a good deal of talk last year about the sanitary condition of Havana; but we feel sure that there was nothing exposed to view in Havana to be compared with Government Pond in Charlottetown. If we should have a particularly hot season, the pond would be a menace to the health of the city. Only the salubrity of our climate saves us from the effects which in other cities would inevitably follow such carelessness as has been shown in respect to Government Pond.
