Rangers Defeat Canadiens 4-1 In Spirited Game

NEW YORK (AP) — A sparkling goaltending performance by Johnny Boxer coupled with electrifying second-period goals by Dean Prentice and Larry Popen enabled New York Rangers to defeat the front-running Montreal Canadiens 4-1 in a spirited National Hockey League game Sunday night.

Boxer, filling for the injured Lorne Worley, thrilled 13,364 at the Lorne Square Garden spectators, while stopping 29 shots by the explosive Canadiens.

Only midway in the opening period did Boxer falter. During a Montreal power play, defenceman Tom Johnson scored the only Montreal goal as the puck slipped between Johnny's pads.

With the score deadlocked 1-1, Prentice netted a picture goal at 13:11 of the second period to put New York in front to stay.

N. H. L. Games Saturday

MONTREAL (CP) — The high-flying Montreal Canadiens fired three goals in the first two minutes of the second period Saturday night to set back Detroit Red Wings 4-1 in a Forum crowd of 14,372 roared approval.

The triumph increased Montreal's first place lead in the National Hockey League to seven points over Detroit. The Wings dropped into a second-place tie with Toronto Maple Leafs, who defeated New York Rangers 3-1.

Kenny Mosdell, Jackie Leclair, Maurice Richard and Jean Beliveau scored for the Habs in that order. Bert Olmstead was the big man in the assist department, helping set up Leclair's winning tally and the Rocket's goal.

Rookie Charlie Hodge, substituting for the ailing Jacques Plante, lost his shutout when Bill Dineen scored unassisted while the Canadiens were a man short in the third period.

Eskimos Win Cup In Upset

One Alouettes' Miscue Gives Edmonton 26-25 Win

 TORONTO (CP)—One electrifying Montreal miscue, climax to a tremendous heart-thumping succession of thrills, sent the lightly-regarded Edmonton Eskimos into the select circle of Grey Cup champions Saturday. Their triumph also sent football experts scurrying for cover.

Beaten down by the odds-makers—5 to 1 or even money on a 13-point spread—the western champions flouted the odds to record the greatest upset in the history of the east-west classic with a 26-25 victory over Montreal Alouettes. The Als were ballyhooed as the greatest club in the history of the Big Four but they couldn't make the tag stick for 60 minutes Saturday. They were just 3 minutes away from their third Dominion title when they were swept to stunning defeat.

PASS OR FUMBLE
 Big Chuck Hunsinger, a powerhouse with the Als this season, came up with a play that promptly made him the goat of the game. It happened this way:

The Als were ahead 15-20. They had driven to the Edmonton 10 when Hunsinger either threw or fumbled the ball as three Eskimo players bore down on him. Jackie Parker, gimp-legged import from Mississippi State, picked up the bounding ball on his second stab, raced 85 yards for the touchdown which, with the convert, spelled the doom of the Als.

That was the key play and one that will be long remembered.

With the ball on the Montreal 10, quarter Sam Etcheverry pitched out to the former Chicago Bear, Hunsinger attempted to circle the left end but was trapped 10 yards back of the scrimmage line and as he was about to be tackled, the ball left his hands.

Parker was closest to it. He broke into the clear, outraced Montreal players to go over for the touchdown and stun the near-record crowd of 7,321. It wasn't clear whether Hunsinger tried forward, a lateral or just tossed the ball away in panic.

UNEXPLAINABLE
 The 29-year-old American couldn't explain it. "It was just one of those things, there's nothing trying to talk about it," he said in the Montreal dressing room.

The official version, from referee Hap Shoubridge of Ottawa, was: "It was clearly a fumble and not a forward pass. It could not be considered a pass at all. It just went away from him."

Coach Doug Peddie, Walker of the Als commented only: "I suppose it was impulse."

The Als had one final kick left after the sudden reversal. From the Montreal 35, Etcheverry passed to Red O'Quinn at midfield. The Big Four all-star quarter got another away to O'Quinn at the Edmonton 37 who dropped it as he was hit and Bill Briggs of the Eskimos picked up the loose ball.

HOPES SNUFFED
 That snuffed out Montreal's last chance to get in position for a single to tie the score and force the first overtime game in cup history.

The Eskimos dazzled the crowd with the split-T running game against Montreal's straight-T formation and pass attack.

They were great opportunists. They gambled and their sometimes reckless chances paid off with the

Eskimo Team And Western Fans Elated Over Victory

 TORONTO (CP)—"I'm so happy I could cry."

That was the post-game reaction of halfback Johnny Bright, and undoubtedly thousands of western football fans, after Edmonton Eskimos ended another Grey Cup famine for the west by edging Montreal Alouettes 26-25 Saturday.

And some Eskimos, even an old pro or two, did wipe aside unashamed tears of joy in the bedroom of the Edmonton dressing room after one of the greatest underdog performances in cup history.

"It was a team effort—amen," said co-captain and guard Frankie Morris. True, but there was one man who capped this effort with the one big play of the game to win it.

He was battered and bruised Jackie Parker, first-year import half from Mississippi State, who recovered Chuck Hunsinger's wayward lateral in the dying minutes and galloped 85 yards for Edmonton's deciding touchdown.

KNEW HE'D MAKE IT
 "Once I got the ball and started running for the Montreal goal line, I never doubted I would make it there," Parker said as he wearily stripped off his football harness.

Parker scored the major on-guts and practically with no legs under him. He had entered the game with a recently-chipped in-twig bone in his right foot and twisted his left knee badly in the opening quarter of the classic.

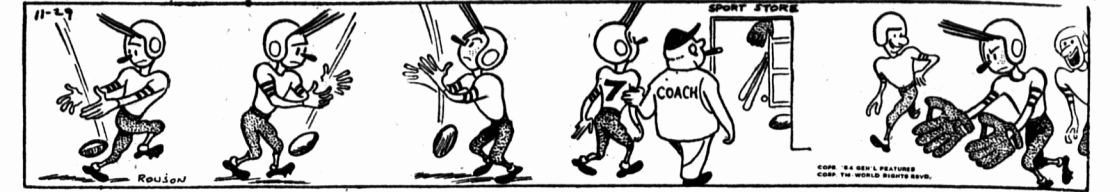

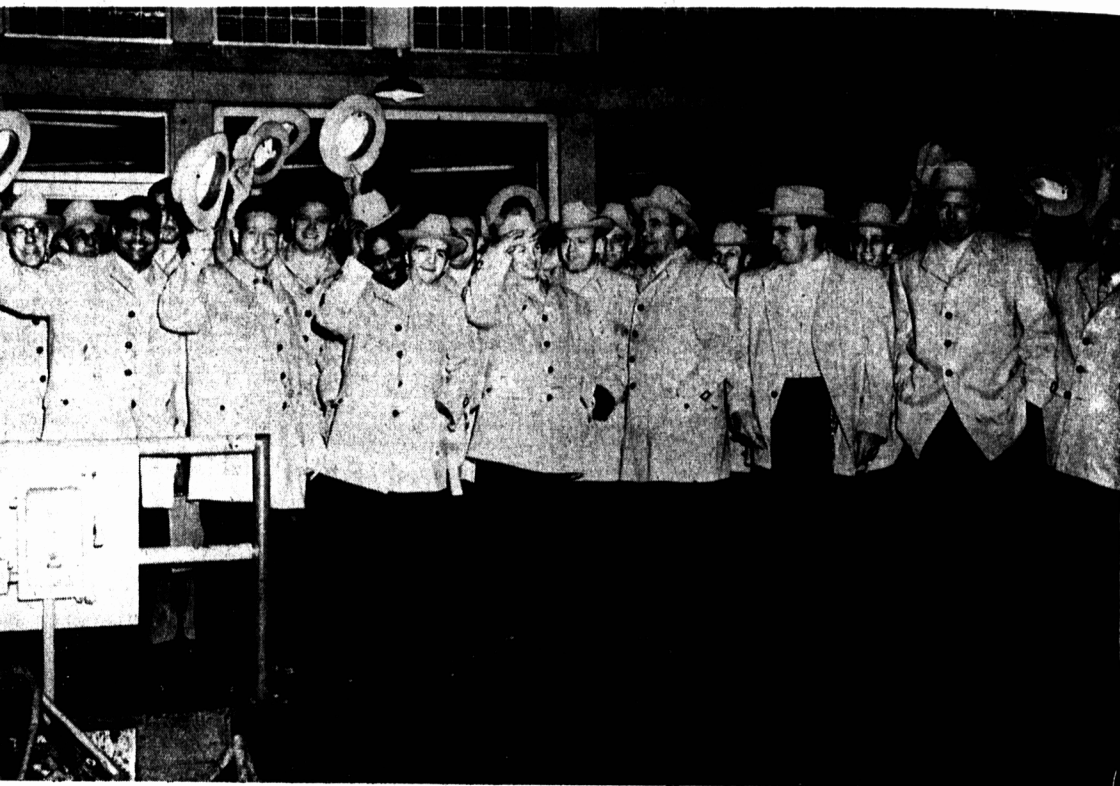

After that, he hobbled back onto the field to snap the ball for all of Edmonton's third down punts except in the dying minutes of the game and to snap for Edmonton's field goal by tackle Bob Dean and for Edmonton's third convert.
