

Colorful Processions Witnessed In Quebec

QUEBEC (CP) — Quebecers Tuesday watched a colorful series of processions as Alfredo Cardinal Ottaviani visited provincial and civic officials, the Quebec Seminary and Laval University.

Cardinal Ottaviani is papal legate for celebrations marking the 300th anniversary of the arrival of Francois de Montmorency-Laval first bishop of New France.

He wore the scarlet robe of his office. Escorting him was a member of the pontifical guard in a bright blue uniform and a burnished copper helmet which glistened in the sunlight. Fifteen church dignitaries who accompanied him from the Vatican also wore their robes of office.

The party moved from site to site through the old fortress city in a police-escorted motorcade.

Government buildings, the university and religious institutions are draped with red and gold hangings for the week-long celebration.

PLACES WREATH

In the morning Cardinal Ottaviani placed a wreath at the statue to Bishop Laval, founder of the Roman Catholic hierarchy in Canada. The statue stands near the palace of Most Rev. Maurice Roy, archbishop of Quebec and primate of all Canada.

The tour of the seminary and the university followed.

Then the party moved to the provincial legislature for a 15-minute chat with Premier Paul Sauve in his office. From the legislature the cavalcade moved to city hall where the cardinal was received by Mayor Wilfred Hamel.

In the afternoon the party drove to Bois de Colongue, residence of Lieutenant-Governor Onesime Gagnon. James Cardinal McGuigan of Toronto, Paul Emile Cardinal Legher of Montreal and the archbishops and bishops from Canada, the United States, Britain, Belgium, France and Nationalist China also attended the reception.

A small dinner offered by the papal legate for church dignitaries and Premier Sauve followed.

OPEN MEETING

Sixty-five Canadian bishops and archbishops also opened a plenary council meeting Tuesday of the Canadian Catholic Conference — being held in conjunction with

the Laval celebrations.

One of their jobs will be choosing five delegates for the first episcopal conference for church representatives from Canada, the United States and Latin American countries.

Most Rev. Paul Bernier, archbishop of Gaspé and CCC president, announced Monday night the meeting will be held Nov. 25 at Washington.

Five delegates from each of the three areas will discuss social, moral and apostolic problems confronting the Roman Catholic Church in their countries.
