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VARIED HUMAN MOTIVES AT ODDS IN ALPINE THRILLER, "THE WHITE TOWER"

With scenes at the actual locale of the story in the French Alps, RKO Radio's "The White Tower," stars Glenn Ford, Valli, Claude Rains and Oscar Homolka in a suspenseful romantic drama of mountain climbing, as filmed throughout in color by Technicolor opens at the Prince Edward today. The plot turns on an attempt by six persons of different nationalities to ascend a hitherto-unclimbed peak. Each of them has a different kind of urge to conquer the ice-clad pinnacle. The conflicts that develop between various members of the party and the romance between a young American flier and an Italian girl, motivate the action of the enthralling story. Ford and Miss Valli have the romantic leads, with Rains as a French author, Homolka as a veteran Swiss guide, Sir Cedric Hardwicke as a British naturalist, and Lloyd Bridges as a German officer. All the exteriors were photographed in and around the village of Chamouix and on the glaciers and snow fields of the world-famous Mont Blanc, giving the film a striking realism all the way through to its surprise climax. Scripted by Paul Jarrico from the novel by James Ramsay Ullman, the picture was produced by Sid Rogell and directed by Ted Tetzlaff. The featured supporting cast includes Lloyd Bridges, June Clayworth and Lotte Stein, besides Hardwicke.

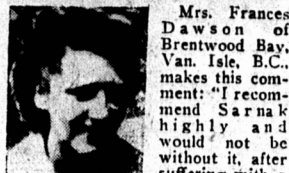

Son Of P.E.I. Woman Killed In Alberta

Of interest to many readers in the Montague locality is the following item taken from the Edmonton Journal:

STONY PLAIN—A spectacular truck-train collision Dec. 1st claimed the life of Gordon Kreye, 23, when the truck in which he was driving was struck at a level crossing on the main street by a freight train.

The truck, which burst into flames was wrapped around the engine of the train and carried for about three-quarters of a mile.

The truck was driven by Joe Van Peterghen, North Battleford, Sask., who was killed instantly. Gordon Kreye died later in Edmonton Hospital from injuries and burns.

According to witnesses the train continued for about three quarters of a mile before it came to a stop. Wrapped around the engine of the train was the burning truck. The truck caught fire at the impact. The fire burned over the flag flying from the locomotive.

Fact that Kreye was taken from the wrecked truck alive was attributed to the prompt rescue efforts of a section crew. They rushed to the train when it stopped and threw snow into the truck to quench the flames and to enable them to pull out the two trapped men.

Kreye was still conscious and said he had seen the freight train approaching. It was reported his clothes were nearly burned off him, and he was suffering from what was described as third degree burns.

One witness said, "When it hit, there was a big bang, a cloud of snow flew up, and away they went." Another witness reported that "The whole truck was in flames when it went past the station."

Both men had been employed by Garrity Drilling for about three years. Kreye was the son of A. Kreye and Mrs. Kreye, the former Hilda Ross, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Ross, Union Road, King's County, P. E. I.

He was also a nephew of Mrs. Alex Hamilton, New Perth and Mr. Vernon Ross of Union Road, and a grand nephew of Mrs. Joseph MacGregor, Montague, P. E. I.

Christmas Service At Mt. Stewart Church

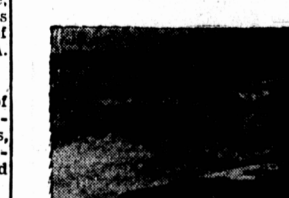

While the rest of Canada is enjoying an unprecedented boom, many of the long-established communities of northwest Ontario have become virtually stagnant economically due according to leading citizens, to Ontario government's forest policy, which has given the pulp and paper barons a monopoly on northland forests. This has resulted in freezing out of the sawmill industry. To rectify that, a locally born secessionist movement is under way in Fort William, which aims to create new province which will improve forest policy, out of all that part of Ontario west of a line drawn north from Sault Ste. Marie to James Bay, an area greater than Manitoba, and Saskatchewan combined.
