Consider Film Council, Library For Summerside

The National Film Board office at Charlottetown has extended a very generous offer to clubs and organizations in Summerside, towards the establishing of a film council and a film lending library for Summerside.

Previously there has been no such organization in Summerside, although many rural communities in the area have taken advantage of the free films and service available from this department.

Mr. John Martin from the Film Board office in Charlottetown is spending a few days in Summerside contacting the various clubs and organizations who have expressed a desire for the establishment of a film council here.

The National Film Board is a government department which produces or otherwise makes available free to club, group, or organization films of an entertaining-educational nature.

More than 1200 such films are available in the Charlottetown library alone, and these are constantly being changed and added to.

Mr. Martin said yesterday that the people of this Province are getting a far better film service than any other province in relation to population, and his office is anxious to have the maximum use made of these free films.

If the Summerside people indicate sufficient interest, it is the intention of the National Film Board to establish a branch lending library in Summerside with a large number of films being available at all times; and if sufficient interest is indicated they will also lend to the Summerside area one or two sets of equipment to facilitate the setting up of the council.

Mr. Martin stated yesterday that any club, group, or organization interested in becoming a member of this film council should contact him at the National Film Board office in Charlottetown.

He said it is planned to hold a mass meeting in November at which representatives from each interested organization will be in attendance and at which time the executive of the proposed council will be elected.

In discussing the proposed film council in Summerside, Mr. Martin said that a film council might be described as a group of individuals, most of them representing organizations, who pool their experience and resources to simplify, improve and increase the use of films as a medium of information and as tools for learning.

He said a film council is not just another community organization set up as an outlet for the energy of people who are not otherwise occupied. The film council's purpose is to provide film services for all groups who can make use of films and to demonstrate the methods of using them. This means that although the film council does not initiate projects involving the development of the community or the education of the people in it, it can and should sponsor projects related directly to its purpose. Training classes for projectionists, film workshops, film evaluation panels and film festivals are quite properly organized by a film council.

Films and filmstrips are designed for use by groups of people. Thus, said Mr. Martin, the film council's primary objective should be to bring the visual aids to the attention of the local groups that

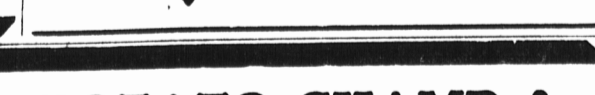
