

Four City Youths To Attend Sackville Boys' Parliament

A young man from Charlottetown will be deputy premier of the annual Older Boys' Parliament which meets at Sackville December 27-31.

He is Hugh MacLean, a fourth year student at Prince of Wales College and son of Rev. A. Frank MacLean and Mrs. MacLean.

Hugh has been prominent in boys' parliaments during the last three years both at Sackville and at Charlottetown.

His position of deputy premier puts him in line for the top post next year, should he decide to accept the office.

Prominent in the student life of Prince of Wales, the deputy premier is a former King of the campus and has taken the leading role in college musical productions.

The Sackville parliament is sponsored each year by the Maritime Religious Education Council and is interdenominational in makeup.

FOUR TO ATTEND Four students will attend from Charlottetown.

Ronnie Riggs of Trinity Church has been nominated to represent the Presbyterian Young People's Union of P.E.I. and will attend for the first time.

From the Charlottetown Baptist church, Henry Sharam and Dewar Harper will attend. Both have been very active in the Young Peoples' activities of their church.

Discussions are confined to religious and moral issues of the day but all debates are carried out under strict parliamentary procedure.

The boys, during their five day stay at parliament will be quartered at Trueman House on the Mount Allison campus. Recreation and sports will form an important part of the agenda.

The session comes to a climax with a watchnight service on New Year's eve. At this service which is for the most part one of prayer and witness, young men have been tremendously moved and some have found the direction of their lives completely changed.

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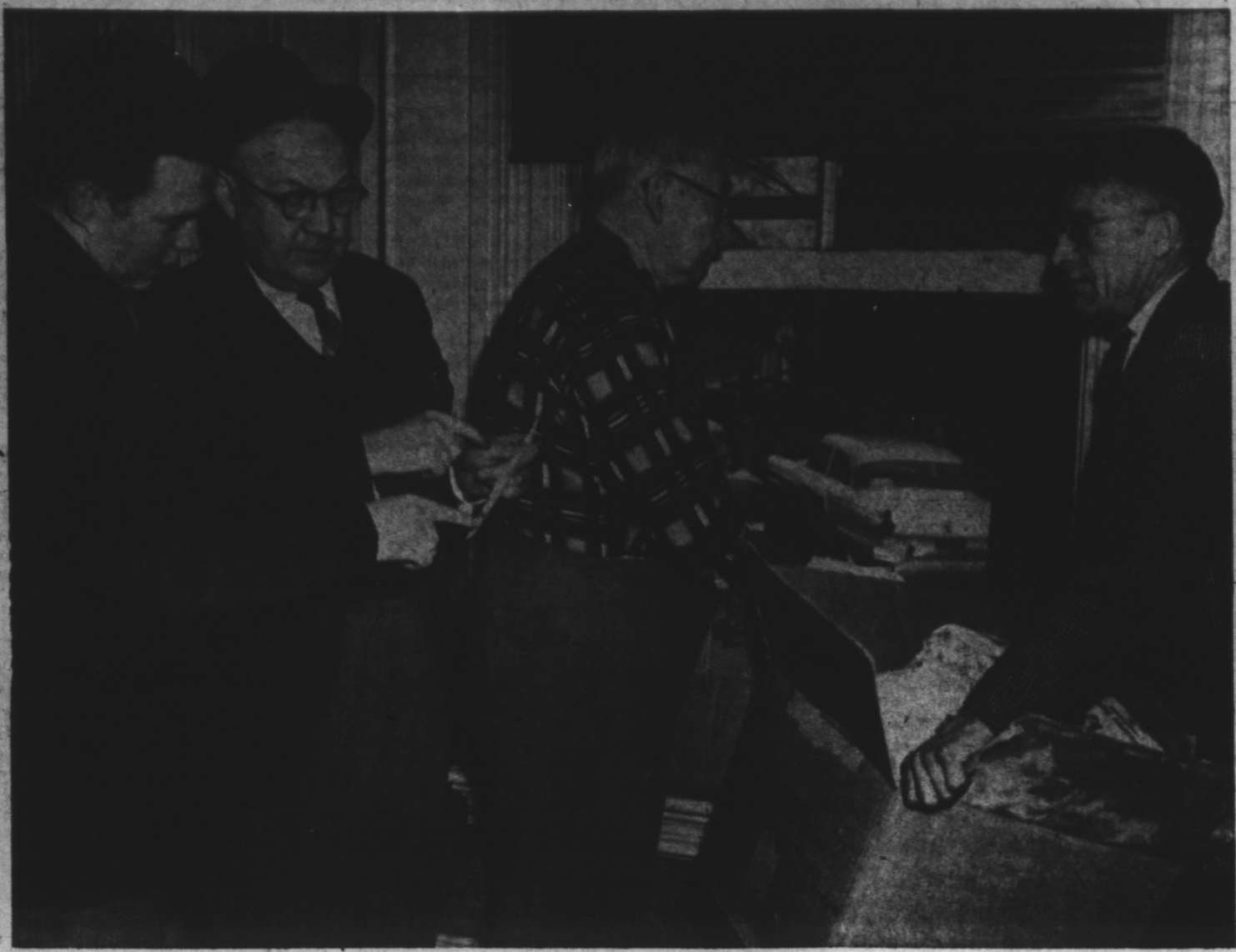
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FOOD FOR NEEDY FAMILIES

Deputy Mayor To Seek Top Civic Post In Feb.

Deputy Mayor A. Walthen Gaudet yesterday declared his intention to contest the office of mayor in the civic election next February.

Mayor Johnstone has stated that he will definitely not contest another election. He has sat in the council for six terms. Three of these were as finance chairman, two as market chairman and one as mayor.

Mayor Johnstone, a graduate of Dalhousie University, is manager of the Dominion Life Assurance Company branch office in the City.

Councillor Gaudet is also a graduate of Dalhousie where he received his degree in law. He is a veteran of the Royal Canadian Navy in which he served as a commissioned officer during the Second World War.

Of the nine remaining councillors, none have given a definite yes as to their intentions but three have stated definitely that they will not run. They are Coun. G. R. Foster in Ward 5; Coun. Earle Baker in Ward 4 and Coun. O'Neill in Ward 3.

Councillors MacRae, Arsenault and Boyles said they would very likely contest their present seats. Councillors Gormley, Hyndman and Haslam are undecided.

VARIED EXPERIENCE Deputy Mayor Gaudet has served in his present capacity for the last four years and has headed the finance committee for the past two years. He has also headed the fire, streets, market and public relations committees.

He is quite active in other fields of service and during the past year was appointed a member of the national capital commission. More recently he was named chairman of the fisherman's loan committee. Coun. Gaudet has been secretary of the Charlottetown Board of Trade for a number of years.

The office of mayor carries an expense account for \$1,000 per year. Councillors serve without remuneration.

During the past two years with the heavy expansion and development program precipitated by the amalgamation of Spring Park, the duties of councillor have become increasingly onerous. Coun-

The group will leave Vancouver Monday aboard the SS Arcadia. The return trip will be made March 18.

Donnie is a grade 12 student at Summerside High School and has been a member of the Sea Cadet Corps since 1955.

Stuart Scott is a grade 11 student at Oakwood Collegiate Institute, Toronto and also has been a member of the Navy League Cadets since 1955.

Nursing Assistants' School Being Planned For Riverside

A school to train girls as licensed nursing assistants will be established here as soon as necessary conditions can be arranged, Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday.

The new school probably will be located in connection with Riverside Hospital where facilities are expected to be available.

The proposal has received the approval of the government and the school is expected to be in operation as quickly as remaining details can be worked out. It will be under the direction of Hon. Hubert McNeill, minister of health.

Premier Shaw stated the purpose of the school to be established under the Licensed Assistants Act, "is to train young women to care for selected convalescent patients and to assist the professional nurse in the care of more critically ill cases."

He added the licensed assistants would also provide nursing service in institutions and private homes and might also be employed by individuals, hospitals or health agencies and would work under the direct orders of a physician or registered nurse.

"It is felt there is a great need for assistant nurses with the training and stamp of approval, a school of this kind can give," the Premier said.
