Steel Magnates Hold Conference

Montreal, June 26.—Directors of the British Steel Corporation gathered in the city over the week end for a conference in anticipation of the adjourned annual meeting of the company which is scheduled for Tuesday. The meeting this year is of special importance and leading financial interests look for some important changes in the personnel of the board. It has been well known in the street that the presidency has been offered to Sir Herbert Holt, but that he finds he is unable to accept the invitation owing to his many important corporation engagements. It is not stated definitely by anyone in authority that Sir Herbert has declined the offer but the best informed circles in the street understand that he will not be able to accept.

MOTOR REGISTRATION

OTTAWA, June 25.—Canada's registration of motor vehicles for 1921 shows an increase of more than 50,000 over the previous year, according to official figures issued by the Highways Branch of the Department of Railways and Canals. Last year there were 463,848 motor vehicles registered in the Dominion, as against 415,288 the previous year. Total revenue from registrations was \$7,669,493, practically all of which was expended by the different provinces on highway improvements. On the 1921 census of 8,782,422 persons in the Dominion, there was one motor vehicle for every 19 persons in Canada. Saskatchewan, with 51,176 vehicles and 757

Ontario, with 206,517 vehicles and 2,335,153 persons, and Alberta, with 40,292 vehicles and 588,458 persons tied for second place with one vehicle per 14 persons. Prince Edward Island, with 1,751 vehicles to 88,615 persons had the lowest per capita registration, with one vehicle per 51 of population. There were 49,709 chauffeurs registered, 60,990 operators and registrations show a total of 1,688 tractors registered, of which 1,603 were in Alberta.
