FIVE OF THEM DEAD.—A number of deaths have occurred at Buctouche from a complication of pneumonia, following a gripper. Every member of a family named Sawyer, consisting of eight persons, was attacked by the disease and five of them died, two young men, two girls and the mother. The father, a girl and a little boy are the only survivors, and it is feared that the girl cannot recover.

Lecture at St. James' Hall.

Capt. W. A. Weeks appeared in St. James' Hall last evening for the first time in the capacity of a lecturer. Notwithstanding the many engagements elsewhere in the city, the captain was greeted with a fairly large audience, who seemed much pleased at the clever way in which he treated the subject, "How we fought in days gone by."

He commenced by describing to his hearers the great and rapid advance made by the British people in Arts and Commerce, between Waterloo and the Crimea,—the struggle of the Greek and Latin churches in Palestine, which brought about the dispute between Russia and Turkey, and which eventually resulted in dragging England and France into war. He related briefly the engagement between the Russians and the Turks on the Danube, where the Turks, led by English officers, defeated the Russians and changed the plan of campaign, and also the determination of the British and French to destroy Sebastopol. The lecturer then, by well-prepared charts, showed the advance of the allied armies to the Alma, the courageous onslaught of Coddington's Brigade on the Russian redoubt,—the support of the Guards and the Highlanders demonstrating the supremacy of line over column,—the victory of the Alma and the march of the allies to the north side of Sebastopol, concluding with the brilliant exploits of Scarlett's Brigade and Lord Cardigan's Light Cavalry charge. Capt. Weeks resumed his seat amid loud applause, and received a unanimous vote of thanks for his highly interesting paper.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 4.

In the Commons to-day Hon. Mr. Tupper introduced a bill to give the Superior Courts jurisdiction in cases of violation of the act for the protection of navigable waters, which now must be tried under the Summary Conviction Act. The bill also repeals the clause in the present act giving the Governor-in-Council power to exempt certain streams from the operation. Lumbermen now throwing their sawdust into streams will be given a year in which to provide other means of disposing of it, and after that time no more is to go into rivers. The House then went into Committee of Supply, and the Opposition wasted all the afternoon in criticism of a few petty items relating to Rideau Hall expenditure, advertising receipts, etc., departmental subscriptions to newspapers, and Ministerial cab hire. The House adjourned at six o'clock.

"Times" Parnell Libel Suit.

LONDON, Feb. 4.

The trial of the suit for libel, brought by Mr. Parnell against the *Times*, was to have been begun to-day, but when the case was called the counsel announced that the suit had been compromised, the *Times* paying Mr. Parnell £5,000 damages, and also announced that, in the action brought by Henry Campbell, Parnell's private secretary, against the *Times* for damages, for statements affecting Campbell, that the *Times* will pay Campbell £200 damages besides meeting all the costs of his action. The court room was crowded, and the announcement caused a sensation.

Came Into a Fortune.

MONTREAL, Feb. 4.

A young French girl named Marie Anne Jeanne Cattler has come into a fortune. Her grandmother, aunt and mother lived together in the same house for years. The grandmother, aunt and the girl's mother died recently, and when the house was being cleaned up a few days ago three tin boxes containing money to the amount of \$60,000 were discovered.
