High School Classes To PWC At Record High

The largest high school enrolment in the history of Prince of Wales College has created an "unprecedented problem with regard to both the physical and teaching facilities." The registrar, Gordon Bennett, said yesterday that the total enrolment for grades 11 and 12 is 512 students, an increase of 34 per cent. The high school students registered Tuesday and yesterday for classes which will get underway today. The first year academic students number 265 compared with 235 last year, and the first year commerce students number 41. There were 29 last year.

The second year academic students number 148 in comparison with 139 last year, and there are 63 commerce students which is 14 more than last year.

The registration of university students will take place next week but advance registration shows an increasingly large number for these classes as well.

The fourth year class which normally numbers about 40 students already has 44 applicants and the indication is that this number will increase considerably when actual registration takes place next Monday and Tuesday.

Charlottetown Tax Receipts For The First Eight Months Of This Year Are Up By Over \$100,000 Over The Same Period Last Year.

Last fall finance committee chairman H.E. Hyndman had given the warning that an early budget would be brought down, and he had made the request to other committee chairmen to submit their estimates by the end of January.

Mr. Hyndman considers that the boost in tax returns is ample proof that his early budgeting is paying off.

Mr. Hyndman had earlier stated that an earlier budget would result in greater tax revenue at an earlier date and a consequent reduction in necessary borrowing to finance city activities.

GREAT SAVING

Reducing the borrowing of funds from the banks would result in a great saving to the city in interest rates paid for their use.

The finance chairman said presentation of an earlier budget would permit getting the tax bills out to the public much earlier in the year than formerly. This, he stated, would also benefit the people by permitting them to plan their payments in advance instead of having to meet their tax obligations all at once or within a relatively short paying period.

City Controller John Butler said this morning every classification of tax receipts showed an increase in the first eight months of this year.

Total receipts for the period were \$1,157,899.87, he said and compared this to the 1962 total for the matching period of \$985,600.12.

Returns in the various classifications with last year's figures in brackets were as follows: real estate \$426,306.33 (\$383,596.69); personal property \$320,687.18 (\$295,740.01); educational tax \$54,724.70 (\$41,191.96); arrears \$96,245.10 (\$79,741.19); streets and sidewalks \$48,797.30 (\$2,000.29); licenses \$48,826.60 (\$2,827.75); miscellaneous and interest \$178,002.76 (\$178,570.25).

Regional HS Students In Temporary Quarters

Seven separate schools are currently housing students enrolled for the Charlottetown Regional High School. It was learned yesterday that transportation for these in grades 11 and 12 were laid on Tuesday, and those for nine and 10 will start operating today. It is expected over 500 students from upwards of 32 districts will attend classes.

Temporarily classrooms have been set up in the new Provisional Vocational Institute building where over 200 grades nine and 10 students will be accommodated. Other students in these grades will pursue studies at Sherwood High School, Parkdale and St. Anne's, Parkdale High School and Fort Augustin.

Grades 11 and 12 students are attending classes at Saint Dunstan's, Prince of Wales and Notre Dame Academy.

Principal of Charlottetown Regional High is Frank Castelo formerly of Parkdale High School. He will have a class of time for classes at the vocational centre.

The construction of a new regional high will depend on future developments at Prince of Wales College and plans for grade 11 and 12 students in the Charlottetown area, and also on what percentage of the student population in these grades will be absorbed when the vocational high school program gets underway in 1964. It is not expected the vocational school will be operating at full scale until four years from the opening date.

Director MacDonnell is chairman of the trustees of the Charlottetown Rural Regional High School.

Of two drunk and incapable one received a 30-day jail sentence and the other was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Tourist Ass'n Planning For Off Season

A meeting of the directors of the P.E.I. Tourist Association at the Charlottetown Hotel on September 10, will be one of the most important events for the Association this fall. It was announced by Canon J.B. Davies, Linkletter, Summerside, president of the organization.

Last year the annual meeting of the association named a special committee to work in liaison with a service committee of the P.E.I. 1964 Centennial Committee. On Sept. 21 this special committee moved to Charlottetown to meet with the central directors to work out a plan for the annual meetings scheduled for next year.

On Sept. 23 the Tourist Association will hold a small reception and dinner for the famous British author, Hammond Innes, in honour of his novel, "Mr. Innes" several days. It is believed Mr. Innes' purpose in coming here is to make it a literary tour of this province, possibly with a view to making it the locale for his next novel, "Mr. Innes" is one of the most successful novelists in Britain with his books selling millions of copies.

Chiropractor's Damage Slight As Result Of Lightning

An amazingly small amount of damage, in view of the tremendous force of the lightning, resulted from Trinity United Church being struck by lightning last Saturday.

Actual structural damage is being negligible and City Engineer Norman Stewart stated the building is as structurally sound as ever. In fact, only one small area did the force of the bolt reach the back wall slightly inward, but without affecting the solid brick retaining supports on both the outside and inside walls of the roof. From the top of the roof at the point of the chimney down the left side stonework and bricks were ripped loose and scattered widely, but even this left a relatively small opening between the roof and the back wall, odd.

Mr. Stewart made a further inspection of the church yesterday afternoon and with various workmen who will make specific repairs such as trim work involving steel metal work. He stated electricians had finished all the repair work in their line, the organ was being re-tuned and could be used during the remainder of several days until temporarily to prevent possible water damage. Mr. Stewart added the church would be fully prepared for services this Sunday and such services would be held as scheduled.

Seems Like Age, Fellin Declares

HAZLETON, Pa. (AP) - "It all seems like a hundred years ago, instead of just a little over a week."

That spoke 85-year-old David Fellin Wednesday, going back for the first time to the nearby Shopton coal mine where he and Henry Thronse, 28, were rescued on Aug. 27 from two weeks of entombment.

Fellin quickly added: "I'm just sorry Lou! Lou can't be here."

He was speaking at Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, the third man caught in the Aug. 13 cave-in more than 300 feet underground. Bova was trapped in a separate burrow, parted from the other two by a mass of debris. Mine experts are trying to find out what happened to Bova, of whose survival state officials have all but abandoned hope.

At a press conference before State Hospital Tuesday, Fellin restated his belief that Bova might somehow have weathered his ordeal, and again said he wanted to go to the mine site, and, if necessary, lead a search party for Bova.

REAFFIRMS TREATY

TOKYO (AP) - The Soviet Union told Communist China Tuesday there was no need for it to try to manufacture an atom bomb because it attacked it could count on Russian nuclear aid under the friendship and mutual assistance treaty. In a Japanese-language broadcast, Moscow radio reiterated that despite Chinese-Soviet differences, the treaty remains in effect.

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Union locals of non-professional hospital workers are continuing to press the provincial government for action in providing wage increases for employees of the Charlottetown and Prince Edward Island hospitals.

A recent letter to Premier Show from J.F. MacMillan, regional director of the Public Employees' Association, on behalf of union 805 and 826, called for a meeting with a charge of officials in order that the situation may be clarified.

The letter stated in part: "The action of your government and the Hospital Insurance Commission failing to make the monies available, has denied the employees within the bargaining unit the right to a fair wage adjustment."

The wage dispute arose when local unions demanded increases but the Hospital Services Commission of the Government said the funds could not be made available.

A conciliation board was then established by the government to investigate the situation. The board unanimously awarded the increase and the union prepared to enter into a collective agreement with the two hospitals on the basis of this award.

The reason given by the commission was the funds could only be provided by the provincial government.
