Canada Plans To Boost Trade Links With Russia

By HAROLD MORRISON Canadian Press Staff writer OTTAWA (CP) — Canada plans to boost her trade links with Russia following the slash by the Western powers in the list of strategic goods banned from Communist trade, it was learned Friday. For the first time, a Canadian trade commissioner's office may be opened in Moscow this fall. It will be followed by consideration as to whether other offices should be opened later in other parts of the Communist world. In addition, it is understood that Trade Minister Churchill will give thought to making an extended tour of overseas countries during the next few months and may include stopovers in Russia and perhaps in Communist China as well.

S'ide Chief Concerned With Driving Cases

Science and road improvement can help in reducing accidents but the most reliable answer to the problem must be found in the mind of the motorist, said Chief of Police Peter R. White of Summerside, speaking yesterday with concern in regard to the prevalence of impaired driving. "It is the man, not the machine; it is the brain, not the motor; it is the reflexes, not the roads, that are responsible for the majority of accidents," said Chief White, in pointing out that accidents are more likely to occur when reflexes are dulled by the use of alcohol. Putting the problem plainly, Chief White said that every motorist who might be an impaired, careless or false driver, should visualize what one feels to stand over the mangled body of some little child or some fatally injured person and realize, too late, the tragic sorrow resulting to parents or loved ones, which could have been averted by careful, sober driving. He said that a drunken or speeding motorist should be regarded as any other public menace, and that many citizens do not take the responsibility of assisting police in curbing these offences, meanwhile, death continues on the highways, and the only ones who seem to care greatly are those who are immediately affected by such tragedy. Statistics show that 95 per cent of road accidents are caused on the part of drivers, and only 5 per cent through defects in the road or vehicle. 97 per cent of accidents occur between vehicles in good condition; 82 per cent occur when visibility is good; and 71 per cent occur on dry and straight roadways. "This clearly establishes," said Chief White, "that drivers are responsible for the majority of accidents, and the human factor still remains the greatest reason of motoring accidents." He said that the police will do all they can to aid every motorist, but expect all motorists to drive carefully and obey traffic rules and regulations. In expressing concern about the prevalence of drunken driving he said, "help this country to be safer so that you yourself may feel safer on the highways when you are motoring."
