Victory for Reform.

The city has been redeemed. Notwithstanding the silence and apathy of the party press, leaving the GUARDIAN to fight the battle alone; notwithstanding that many electors snubbed and remained away from the polls; notwithstanding that the liquor party and anti-reformers exerted their utmost endeavors and polled their every vote, the Reformers have returned Dr. Jenkins by the handsome majority of about two hundred and eighty votes, and Coun. Henry C. Douse, as the GUARDIAN predicted, has more reason than ever to be opposed to the abolition of the Wards.

The total vote polled (1214) though not large compared with the total polled in the city at the last general local election (about 2074 votes) was larger than we expected, and would have been larger still had there been a necessity. Early in the afternoon when it was known that the doctor's majority was so large Coun. Douse and his friends gave up the fight and many who were quite prepared to vote if required, did not care to leave their work when they knew the doctor's return was assured. The result then may be taken as a signal triumph for the reformers, and as indicating that the city as a whole is overwhelmingly in favor of reform.

We congratulate Dr. Jenkins on the handsome manner in which he has been returned as the citizens representative. He has obtained a majority of votes in every Ward and in all but two polling stations. It must be very pleasing for him to know that the course he adopted in relation to civic government has the approval of the citizens.

The Reformers will now no doubt address their attention to the framing of a bill to be placed before the legislature at its coming session, and afterwards submitted to the electors for their approval. We do hope that the bill will call for the abolition of the Ward system in Charlottetown.

The Island as a Summer Resort

With splendid new passenger steamers running regularly between the Island and Canadian and American ports during the coming summer, it may fairly be assumed that the passenger traffic will be greater than ever before. It is to be hoped therefore that the movement on the part of the Board of Trade to have a first class hotel established will be more successful than previous efforts in that direction. We notice that in the neighboring provinces the question of advertising their summer resorts in leading American papers is being discussed. This might be a good plan for Charlottetown to follow—if we had sufficient hotel accommodation. There is no doubt that the advantages of the province for a summer outing are almost unknown in many quarters. Whatever is going to be done ought to be done at once, however, as preparations for summer migrations are made early in the spring.

Hypnotizing Drunkards

Senator James Fair, perhaps, the richest man on the Pacific coast, has two sons, James, jr., and Charles, who have been, to put it mildly, very wild boys. When James, jr., came out two months ago from the G. man Hospital, where he had been seriously ill on account of excessive drinking, some friends talked to him of Dr. Brown, the hypnotist, who was said to have performed wonders with an opium taker, and after a great deal of persuasion he was induced to pay the hypnotist a visit. Brown knew his man, and he exercised his will power upon the patient of the hair apartment to millions. He was kept under hypnotic influence for several hours, and when he was brought back to a conscious state he was told by the doctor to go and drink no more. The admission was unnecessary. He could not drink. He made a vigorous effort but failed. The liquor acted on him as an emetic. That was six weeks ago and he has not touched a drop since. Before this he had to be put to bed five nights out of seven. Young Fair then took his younger brother Charles to Brown and he, too, was put under the spell. In his case it also worked like a charm and he developed an intense dislike for liquor. He told the World representative that so sick of liquor is he that the swinging doors of a saloon fairly nauseate him. There is no happier man on the coast than Senator Fair.—N. Y. World.

PITTSBURG, April 6.—There were 212 deaths in this city last week, and 115 in Allegheny as the result of grippe. It is estimated that 35,000 in Allegheny are suffering from the malady, and 75,000 in Pittsburg. This is about 25 per cent of the entire population.

A King Goes into Business.

LONDON, April 4.—It is stated here that the prospective visit of the King of Greece to London is with the object of taking up his permanent residence in this city. In this event he will abdicate in favor of the Duke of Sparta. The reason of this decision is said to be that the King is the head of a very large commercial house in the city, and has acquired an enormous fortune by fortunate stock exchange speculations.

The Bye-Elections

Victory for Reformers

The Liberals Successful in Fort Augustus & East Point

The bye-election Thursday to fill vacancies in the House of Assembly for Charlottetown, the third District of Queen's Co., and the first of King's, resulted in the return of Dr. Jenkins, independent Conservative, Charlottetown, Mr. J. H. Cumiskey, Liberal for the third District, and probably Mr. Alex. Robertson, Liberal, by a small majority for the first of King's.

The election here in the city and Royalty was conducted quietly and orderly. There was no excitement, but considerable interest was taken in the contest. The whole strength of the liquor party was brought out against Dr. Jenkins, and it is significant that they were beaten not by any means by the full strength of the reformers. After the close of the poll many of Dr. Jenkins' supporters gathered in the committee room in the Market Hall, where a few short speeches from the doctor and some of his friends were given.

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The Speakerships

A good deal of speculation is being indulged in as to the Speakerships of the two Houses of Parliament. The name of Prof. Weldon, of Alberta, is being prominently mentioned in connection with that of the House of Commons, but it is doubtful if a member with Mr. Weldon's talent for debate would care to be silent for four or five years of his parliamentary life. It is far more likely that Mr. Wood, of Brockville, will be the Speaker of the next Parliament. It is likely that Senator Allan will be continued in the Speakership of the Upper Chamber.

The Death of Dr. Crosby.

Dr. Howard Crosby died on Easter Sunday, a victim of pneumonia, after an illness of ten days. In his death New York loses one of the most public-spirited men that ever lived within her borders. He was for many years Chancellor of the University of New York and at the same time pastor of one of the leading Presbyterian churches in the city. The duties of both positions did not, however, prevent his very active interest in municipal government. To his exertions was due, in a great measure, the birth of the Society for the Prevention of Crime. Of Dr. Crosby's attitude toward the temperance movement we have expressed ourselves freely in times past. We care to say now nothing more than that he was, in our opinion, one of the most formidable enemies the cause of temperance has ever had. But he was an enemy that never stooped to double-dealing of any kind. What he meant he said, and his words and actions always corresponded. He was courageous and consistent, and we are fully disposed to believe, sincere. And a great extent of the temperance cause, no true man ever fought for a sincere conviction, no matter how erroneous, and fought by open and candid methods, without serving the cause of truth.
