Case Dismissed In Exchequer Court

A case for the recovery of a motor vehicle seized by R. C. M. Police during a raid for moonshine at premises at Mt. Stewart failed when Mr. Justice M. B. Archibald dismissed it at a sitting of the Exchequer Court of Canada held in the Supreme Court room yesterday. Appearing for the appellant, Loyal Feehan, was Mr. J. Lester O'Donnell who maintained that since the moonshine was not found in the truck itself the seizure was illegal. Mr. John Nicholson, appearing for the Crown, argued against the motion. Several members of the R. C. M. P. were heard as witnesses. Accompanying Judge Archibald to this city was Mr. R. M. Spankie, Q.C., Registrar of the Exchequer Court.

Korea Incident - The speaker related an incident during his visit to Korea when the padre of the brigade invited him to be present while he gave the first lessons in Christianity to a young Korean he had saved. He was greatly handicapped by the limited vocabulary acquired in English and for the first lesson had to be content with pointing to a picture of the Saviour and saying "A good Man".

The Primate said it illustrated that if love were present the goodness of God and knowledge of Him can be passed on equally as well by pointing.

He said that more reading of the Bible should be done by the laity, and that the church should pass on when necessary. But in conclusion he assured the congregation that "This church of ours will fulfill her destiny because our people exhibit a saving Grace."

At the opening of the service the procession of clergy and laity, headed by the church choir, moved down the aisle. At the entrance to the chancel Rev. G. R. Harrison, Archdeacon of Prince Edward Island, stopped and turned to the waiting Primate.

In delivering the official address of welcome he expressed the pleasure of all at this first official visit of the head of the church and asked a blessing on him in his work.

The Archdeacon told him "Since you have been our Primate you have endeared yourself to the church people of Canada and the Missionaries and church people of other lands by your devotion to the work of the Church, and the inspiration of your example your personal kindness and wise leadership."

Following conclusion of the service the Primate was introduced by the Right Rev. Robert H. Waterman, Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, who told of His Grace's visit this week to Nova Scotia and the inspiration he had provided at the several services he attended there last Sunday.

The benediction was given by the Primate.

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ing urge of millions of Asians for national freedom and a better life in the West are not able to agree on the distinction between these two forces which require a different approach and understanding by us, our co-operation in this part of the world may weaken and disappear to the joy and relief of those forces centered in Moscow and Peking who are using our motives and fair to bring about just such a result.

A Real Danger

"This is an actual—and not an imaginary danger—because there is a real difference of view within our coalition as to the meaning of these Asian developments and on what our reaction to them should be. This difference involves, in fact, basic questions of Asian policy."

"There is no dispute over the necessity of resisting Communist military aggression, so determined by the UN or even, in certain circumstances, without such formal determination. There will, of course, inevitably be differences over the means for detaching such aggression and over the relative contributions of those taking part in the operation. Korea is an example of this kind of difference which can be disagreeable without being fatal."

Rhee Declares

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a truce on present terms simply means a defeat for us. We have been explaining this point to our allies and we intend to do so continually."

Will Fight Alone

Rhee reaffirmed that South Korea would "fight by ourselves" if necessary to drive out the Chinese. But he called for no unruly outbreaks in continuing anti-armistice demonstrations.

South Korea's acting prime minister, Pyun Yung Tai, hinted strongly that South Korean troops manning two-thirds of the 155-mile battle line would refuse to withdraw 1-4 miles to create the demilitarized zone called for in the armistice agreement.

Pyun said "we cannot and will not accept any part of the armistice terms."

The National Assembly in Pusan voted to send messages to Allied nations involved in the Korean war asking them to abolish the present truce plan and launch new efforts to solve the problem.

Discuss Line

It appeared one group of staff officers was discussing a demarcation line to separate the operations of the first and second group was thrashing out the mechanics of prisoner exchange.

The demarcation line is being drawn along the battle line but even this was shifting from hour to hour under the weight of Chinese and North Korean attacks.

St. ANDREWS, N. B. (CP)—Announcement that the Maritime Blue Cross headquarters in Moncton will be shifted to a new building to be erected near the new Moncton city hospital before the year-end was made Thursday at a Blue Cross session held in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Maritime Hospital Association.

Dr. Joseph A. MacDougall, Saint John, a Blue Cross executive member, urged immediate representation of this group on the MHA board to fill a recent vacancy.

The annual MHA business session was held following an address by Dr. A. L. Swanson, Toronto, executive secretary of the Canadian Hospital Council. Guest speaker at the annual dinner was Dr. Leonard Miller, Newfoundland deputy minister of health, who spoke on hospitals in his province.

The convention was opened Wednesday by Nell D. MacLean, Charlottetown, MHA president. One result of sectional meetings was an adopted motion for appointment of a committee to study the nursing situation in the Maritimes.

Commonwealth Troop Movements Are Restricted

IN KOREA, (CP)—Orders restricting the movement of Commonwealth troops, issued to take effect in the event of an armistice, were put into effect Thursday by the Commonwealth division.

The orders mentioned the possibility of South Korean demonstrations and restricted movement of soldiers near Seoul.

Thursday's order added that troops going to Seoul must carry personal weapons. This standing order in the Korean theatre hasn't been enforced lately.

Ironically, Thursday was the first day in months that the Chinese didn't send over one shell, bullet or mortar bomb.

Vessel Sunk In 1940 Is Raised

STAVANGER, Norway, (CP)—The hull of the British ship North Cornwall, sunk by the Germans April, 1940, was towed into harbor here Wednesday night after being raised by salvage crews.

The 7,000-ton vessel before it is broken up for scrap.

Russians May Bid For German Unification

BERLIN, (AP)—Political sources inside Red East Germany hinted Thursday night the Russians may make a powerful bid—possibly this week-end—for four power talks on all-German elections to unite Germany.

Officials active in the Soviet zone's captive Christian Democracy party said the new Soviet high commissioner, Vladimir Semenyov, may invite the U. S., British and French high commissioners of West Germany to meet with him on the subject of German unity.

One official, who asked who made anonymous, confirmed the general belief that the Russians were laying the groundwork for such a call in the recent dramatic moves they have been pushing in East Germany.

"There may be something important this week-end," the official said.

The latest of these moves was the announcement last night by the Kremlin-directed East German politburo that it was virtually de-communizing the Soviet zone and had agreed to end its oppressive restrictions on the Protestant church.

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Assembly Discusses Mixed Marriage Issue

TORONTO, (CP)—The 97th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met behind closed doors Thursday to discuss a request that the church discipline its members in marriages with Roman Catholics. Church officials declined afterwards to comment on whether the church would act on the request.

The recommendation, presented by V. W. Ralston of Calgary Presbytery, said in part: "The Presbytery of Calgary overtures the general assembly to propose to enact a law of discipline for the regulation of mixed marriages, and to submit it to the Presbytery for consideration."

Cascumpec Man Re-elected To Church Ass'n

SACKVILLE, N. B. (CP)—C. R. Leard, Cascumpec, P. E. I., president of the Lay Association, Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada, was re-elected with all other association officers Thursday.

Decision to hold the first experimental session of the newly instituted Atlantic Christian Training Centre at Berwick, N.S., Aug. 10 to Sept. 20 was endorsed by the association, which voted \$100 to the centre.

The general conference meeting again unanimously approved the campaign for a new students' residence at Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax.

Rev. Peter Gordon White, Toronto, newly appointed editor of Sunday School publications, described plans to meet increasing demands for knowledge of the gospel. Writers for Sunday School publications were urged to be needed, he said.

Rev. J. Murray Armstrong, Sussex, N. B., president of the United Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, brought greetings and made a plea for closer Christian unity.

Rev. C. Earle Gordon, Truro, N.S., chairman of the missionary and maintenance fund committee, reported a record high of \$330,386 for this fund in the Maritime.

Death Benefits Higher In P.E.I.

Prince Edward Island residents as beneficiaries of deceased policyholders received from the life insurance companies operating in Canada the sum of \$73,766 in the first three-month period of 1953, an increase of more than \$3,000 over the corresponding period of 1952.

The Canadian Life Insurance Officers Association reports that \$57,346 was paid in claims on 38 ordinary life policies and \$16,420 on 4 group certificates.

For all Canada, death benefits for the first quarter of the current year were \$26,017,120.

Captain Titcombe Back From England

Senior Captain Leslie Titcombe, officer in charge of the local Salvation Army corps, returned from London, England on Wednesday after attending Staff College there since early in March, remaining over to witness the Coronation.

"I am unable to put into words the feeling of awe with which the Coronation Ceremony was witnessed," said the Captain. "It is the first time since 1938 in which the people of Britain have been able to enjoy themselves in any traditional way, and they certainly revived the old spirit of optimism." The opinion prevails over there that a new era is opening for Britain and the Commonwealth.

Captain Titcombe expressed great pleasure at the success so far attained in the Red Shield and Stained Lodge Drive, which has been under way during his absence. Our friends throughout the province are doing a marvellous job," he said. The Captain was in attendance at the International Staff College for over two months where 24 students representing 18 different countries and speaking 16 different languages were assembled. He was the only Canadian officer in attendance.
