

Islanders Edge Halifax Saint Mary's 4-3

Chicago, Detroit Score Shutouts; Leafs Wallop Boston 8-1 Over Weekend

MONTREAL, Dec. 10 — (CP) — Chicago Black Hawks smothered Montreal Canadiens under a 5-0 shutout Saturday night to the consternation of 14,003 paying customers.

It was the second shutout in a row for the Montrealers and their fourth loss in the last five games. They surrendered third place in the National Hockey League to the Hawks and were in danger of being overhauled by Boston Bruins, whom they meet tonight in Boston.

Canadiens elected to carry play to the Hawks with burst of power drives but they carried it so far they couldn't get back. The speedy Hawks ran wild on breakaways and nearly all their goals came on these ice length dashes. Gerry McNeill, in Canadiens' goal, couldn't cope with the accurate sniping.

Canadiens showed more fight than in their last few games but their scoring was erratic.

DETROIT, Dec. 10 — (AP) — Detroit Red Wings, who humbled New York Rangers 9-0 Wednesday night, practically repeated that performance Saturday night as they blanked the Rangers 5-0 in a National Hockey League game before 11,101 fans.

Young Terry Sawchuk hung up his fourth shutout of the season and his second in a row over the luckless New Yorkers. The last-place Rangers called on goalie Emil (The Cat) Francis, brought up from Cincinnati of the American League, to get them back into stride but he was bombarded.

Francis racked up 31 saves, 15 of them in a frenzied second period, during his first appearance of the season in hockey's major league.

Rangers, striving to shake off the funk which has seen them win only three games, tried hard in the first period but faded rapidly before Detroit's attack.

TORONTO, Dec. 10 — (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs walloped a disorganized Boston Bruins team

8-1 here Saturday night and stretched their undefeated National Hockey League streak to nine games.

The Leafs — whose last defeat was a 3-1 loss in Boston Nov. 19 — jumped into a 2-0 first-period lead and the Bruins never came close.

Rookie Tom Sloan, the N.H.L.'s top goal-getter, added two more to bring his total to 18. Linemate Sid Smith also tallied twice for the league leaders and other Toronto goals were by Danny Lewicki, Hugh Bolton (the rookie rear-guard's first point of the season), Fleming MacKell and Teeder Kennedy.

Vic Lynn, former Leaf winger traded to Bruins last month, saved his squad from a shutout with an unassisted goal early in the third period.

Many of the 13,881 fans turned out to watch the performances of Lynn and Wild Bill Ezinicki, traded to Bruins in the same deal.

Lynn, who slipped the puck under goalie Turk Broda's rising arm for the prettiest goal of the night, sparked against his former mates. But Ezinicki was never dangerous.

It is going to be a busy week for the Charlottetown Islanders hockey team. Five games in six days, commencing tonight, four of them being scheduled Big Four games and one an exhibition game with Sydney Millionaires. That is a long schedule for one week, but the Lamoureux-coached squad are quite equal to the task and will probably win more than their share of games in the process.

The boys will journey to Amherst, N.S., tonight where they will start their week's schedule rolling in a league contest with Moncton Hawks. The game was originally scheduled for the local Forum, but due to two games coming in quick succession, Tuesday and Wednesday night that are scheduled for here, the Islanders will play their home game at the Nova Scotia centre, and give fans test with a chance to see their first Big Four game of the season. It was only just a little more than a year ago, when Amherst was in the M.S.H.L. and the Island wasn't, that the Amherst boys gave local fans the same opportunity. Now the Island is returning the compliment.

The Islanders will return here following the Amherst clash, where they will meet the Saint John Beavers at the Forum Tuesday night, a game which has brought another slight switch in the current schedule. Beavers were not scheduled to play here until Wednesday, but agreed to play the game a day earlier to make way for the exhibition contest with Sydney on Wednesday, which was the only open date for them in their Cape Breton schedule.

That is the big contest that everybody has been waiting to see. For an exhibition contest, it has created more interest here than many league games have this season. To most fans, it is not just a game of hockey, but a test of the calibre of hockey being played in the respective leagues represented in the contest. In a sense, it will be a battle of the "Giants". Both teams are the top dogs in their own leagues, and there has been so much talk as to which league is the stronger of the two this season, that fans want to see for themselves if it is the Islanders or the Millionaires who are the big guns in Maritime hockey circles.

In an exhibition game earlier this season, the same two teams met over Sydney ice, with the Millionaires garnering the verdict by a 3-1 margin. This, of course, has convinced most Cape Breton fans as to which team they think is the best — but not so Island fans. They are something like the well-known fellow from Missouri, "seeing is believing" and until they sit in at rink-side and see their "Islanders" beaten, nobody will convince them that their team isn't the best in the Maritimes.

By that it is not meant to infer that the Islanders are going to be beaten, far from it. They are a solid hockey club and if Sydney can come over here and take the boys into camp over their home ice, then they are certainly going to earn it, there will be no mistake about that. It will be a battle worth seeing, and whichever way the decision goes, both teams are going to know that they have been in it.

But back to other games the Islanders will play this week. Getting their only breather on Thursday they will be on the road for their last two games, meeting the Hawks on Friday night at Moncton, and going on from there to Saint John where they will wind up their week's activities against Beavers.

The Islanders, however, aren't going to be the only ones busy in the way of hockey activities this week. Officials who will be conducting the third annual Referees and Coaches School to be held in Charlottetown today, Tuesday and Wednesday are going to have their hands full. Among the bustle of these will be George Hayes of the National Hockey League's refereeing staff and Leo Lamoureux, coach of the Islanders. Mr. Hayes, who arrived in the City last night from Montreal, will be the chief instructor, while "Leo the Lion" will assist him on various lectures and activities.

George Hayes To Open Third Annual Hockey School Here Tonight

The third annual Hockey Coaches and Referees School, under the sponsorship of the Department of Physical Fitness, will open its three-day sessions here tonight when Mr. George Hayes of the National Hockey League refereeing staff, will conduct the opening class on hockey rules and refereeing at the Charlottetown Hotel at eight o'clock sharp.

Mr. Hayes, who headed the school so successfully here last year, arrived in the City last evening by plane from Montreal, where he had officiated at the N. H. L. contest there Saturday night between Canadiens and Chicago Black Hawks, the latter clipping the Montrealers by a 5-0 count.

Acting as assistant instructor with Mr. Hayes this year will be Islanders accuracy Leo Lamoureux, who although busy with his team at Amherst tonight, will be on hand to give students many pointers on phases of the game in the remaining two days of the school.

Hockey enthusiasts and candidates from all three of the Maritime Provinces will be attending the School again this year and it is believed that some 30 to 50 will be taking in the classes.

As during the past two years, the two competent instructors, Hayes and Lamoureux, will give lectures and practical demonstrations on practically every phase known to the sport of hockey during these next three days, which should do much in the way of creating a greater knowledge and interest of the game; the purpose for which the School was founded here three years ago by Brigadier W. W. Reid and his Department of Physical Fitness.

On his arrival here last night, Mr. Hayes expressed his pleasure at being asked to come back here again this year and was looking forward to the forthcoming activities of the School with much interest and the renewing of friends and acquaintances of last season. Referring to recent changes in the hockey rules, Mr. Hayes stated "there are very few important changes in the hockey rules, although the wording of many of the rules have been changed to simplify their meanings," a point he plans to stress during sessions this week.

Kevin Conway, playing his last game before emigrating to the Pacific Coast, almost lost Islanders the game when he carried the puck across his own crease and lost it to Jackie Hollett. Although Gordon stopped Hollett's shot, he had no chance on Watson's quick return of the rebound.
