LETTERS TO THE EDITOR. A FACTORY SUGGESTION.

Sir,—I observe a communication over the signature of "Pro Bono Publico" in the Patriot of the 5th inst., wherein the writer advocates the getting up of a factory at that district of the Island. I give the writer credit for wielding the pen on so important a subject. But he did not touch on the probable cost of the kind of factory he describes, viz., a factory with door and sash factory first, and if that proves a success, then go ahead with other machinery also. I merely throw out these few hints as I am very little conversant with factory mills of any description. Nevertheless, I would feel quite willing to take stock in anything of that description of business.

The question is asked, Why do the young men leave? To which I would answer, to get employment. They are tired of the old monotony, farming day in and day out; they are conversant with what is going on in the outside world; and they wish to be at some other occupation. Their propensities don't lead them all to be farmers; so, therefore, they want to follow the best of their inclination. I would not say that the agents of these children are responsible in a great measure for their leaving their native country. They bank up their money and leave their sons to go where they like and shift for themselves. Thus the country is drained of the young nerve and sinew of its population. No factories here to encourage them to stop. If things keep on at this rate, our country will soon be blighted from the map of the geography.

Then, I say, farmers, awake; try and keep your sons and daughters around you, allocate the getting up of factories, and let us keep the money and shift for them, not be sending it to purchase goods that can be made and manufactured here.

That it is advisable to amend the School Act 1877 in such a manner that hereafter no school teacher shall receive more than \$50 from the Provincial Government for any one year for employment, and also to abolish the Bonus Clause in said Act from a date to be mentioned, and in such a manner as not to interfere with teachers already entitled to same.

He said that while the Government was convinced that nothing should be done to interfere with the efficiency of the School Act, still they thought they were taking a proper step under the proposed bill, while in no way injuring the measure, but pointing out that the returns showed that comparatively few of the districts were now voting supplements, and some people were taking them altogether. On the other hand the argument is that the educational system must not be interfered with, and the Government is trying to steer a middle course between the two. This, he said, would be accomplished by the proposed step.

The House then went into committee on the resolution. Hon. Mr. Peters moved that the resolution be amended by striking out "50" and inserting "25" in lieu thereof.

Mr. Gordon said the School Law had been found to work well, and he thought the voice of the people was strongly in favor of the Act of 1877. There was no demand or petition for a change, and he thought that no change should be made in the Act. He for one would be very sorry to see this Act amended.

Hon. Mr. Shaw referred to the fact that the Leader of the Government and his followers had taken three weeks to "hatch" the resolution before the House, and he should not therefore impute any ignorance to the Opposition. He thought the bill should provide for a bonus to teachers who would be entitled to a bonus at the end of the present year.

Hon. Mr. Peters said there was such a provision in the bill. The resolution as amended was then reported agreed to, and the House adjourned until ten o'clock on Thursday forenoon.

THURSDAY, April 19. Hon. Mr. Peters asked the Leader of the Government to table a statement showing in detail the amount received by the Government during the year 1892 and 1893 for fines imposed and fines collected under the Canada Temperance Act, the names of the persons on whom fines were imposed, and the amount of fines collected from each person respectively.

Hon. Mr. Peters said such information on this subject as the Government deemed in the public interest would be given. Mr. Gordon asked the Leader of the Government to table a statement showing the amounts due the banks at this date.

Hon. Mr. Peters said the statement asked for would be given. On motion of Mr. Rogers (Charlottetown) the House went into committee on the bill entitled "An Act in Amendment of the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act and the Amendments thereto." Mr. McKinnon in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to with amendments, and ordered to be read a third time to-morrow.

Hon. Mr. Peters moved that the House go into committee on the bill respecting the income tax, with Mr. Wise in the chair, and in so doing briefly explained the provisions of the bill.

Mr. Gordon said the Opposition did not intend opposing the bill because they thought it was right that the rich should be taxed. He regretted, however, that when the Attorney-General was explaining the provisions of the bill, he did not explain that the tax was made necessary by the reckless extravagance and waste of public money by the present administration. Had the affairs of the Province been properly managed, there would have been no necessity for the bill.

Mr. Shaw agreed with the stand taken by the Leader of the Opposition on this question, and argued that the Leader of the Government should have told the people during the election campaign that it was the intention to impose taxes upon them. He had not done this, however, and thus misled the people into again entering him with the reins of power. At one o'clock the House took recess.

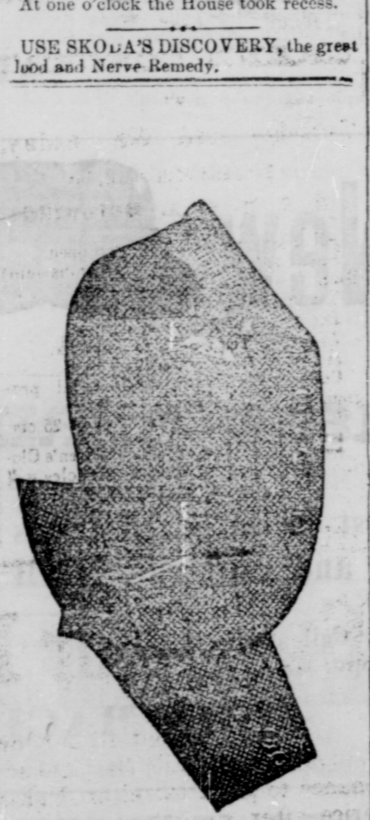
