

# Canadian Gov't Declares Independence In Affairs

OTTAWA (CP)—Whatever else may be said of last week's special session of Parliament, it produced a strong declaration of independence in international affairs by the Canadian government.

They "could not allow this crowd of smaller nations to deal decisively" on questions concerned with their vital interests. But, the prime minister said, the peoples of the smaller countries are "human beings," too. He went on to say that "the era when the supermen of Europe could govern the world has and is coming to a pretty close end."

Mr. St. Laurent said the UN had placed, "and I think rightly so," some blame on the British, French and Israelis for "taking the law into their own hands."

Mr. Hughes, a Second World War veteran, has lectured on hospital design in every province and has been made a fellow of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada for his work in helping to improve Canadian hospital design.

## Has Headed Federal Hospital Design Division For 10 Years
