



American Yawl Winner Of Manchester To Halifax Race After Brush With Gale

HALIFAX, (CP)—The American yawl Malay, her sails patched from a brush with a North Atlantic gale, waltzed briskly into harbor here Tuesday to win the Manchester-Halifax ocean yacht race in slightly more than 65 hours.

The only two competitors who could have upset Capt. Don B. Strohmer's performance were stranded at least 25 miles seaward by a calm.

The 40-foot Malay, sailing out of Padaranan, Mass., crossed the finish line six hours behind the 1953 champion yawl Salamagal but won by virtue of a healthy handicap cap. Strohmer, of Bethlehem, Pa., was seventh to furl his sails at the Royal Nova Scotia Yacht Squadron breakerwater before sundown.

The Pennsylvania said the Malay ran into a gale Tuesday night off the southwest tip of Nova Scotia. She burst two ribs and was patched in a six-hour tussle with needle and cord against the wind.

Strohmer said he ran the Malay shoreward to within 50 yards of Cape Sable island and there in a camp water caught a following wind for Halifax while his rivals further out kept trying to contend with heavy seas.

The Malay's adjusted time for the 360 miles was 65 hours, 11 minutes and 25 seconds, 22 minutes and two seconds better than Salamagal.

At 9:30 p.m. ADT, one of the 17 competing yachts had crossed the finish line. The others were not in sight.

Strohmer was navigator on the LeClair when she won the biennial classic in 1953. He attributed his victory this time to "a gamble that we are surprised really paid off."

The only Canadian competitor among the early finishers was the navy's yawl Pickle, the scratch boat. She was fourth across the line but because she has no handicap was dropped to ninth automatically and will wind up even lower in the final standings.

Second place, after the handicaps were computed, went to Wild G.C. Wyland. Coincidentally, she also was the second boat across the finish line but wound up with a 45-second edge over Salamagal.

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The stewards reminded him (Aly Khan) that discrepancies in form shown by horses running under the rules of racing compared with their running outside the jurisdiction of the stewards would not be tolerated.

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League Leading Dodgers Lose To Cards; 3rd In Row

BROOKLYN (AP)—Stan Musial, hero of Tuesday's all-star game, and Wally Moon smacked home runs and rookie Larry Jackson tossed four-hit ball Thursday night as the St. Louis Cardinals whipped the Brooklyn Dodgers 6-1. It was the third straight defeat for the National League leaders.

The Dodgers, who have been shut out only by Jackson and Milwaukee's Bob Buhl this season, averted a second whitewash at the hands of the St. Louis right-hander in the ninth inning. Jackie Robinson started the scoring with a double and came home on Carl Furillo's single.

Until then, the 24-year-old Jackson had handcuffed Brooklyn on two hits—both by Roy Campanella, who was making his first appearance since stepping down June 29 with a knee injury.

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Giants, who only once this season had stolen as many as two bases in one game, swiped four Thursday night against Chicago, setting up two big runs with two of the thefts in a 3-2 triumph over the Cubs.

The Giants, battling to overhaul the third place Bruins, sewed it up in the third after Don Muller had led off a two-run sixth inning with his sixth home run of the season.

Hank Thompson worked a walk from loser Bob Rush with two out in the third, stole second and scampered home on Mueller's single.

In the second inning, Al Dark followed Mueller's home run with a single, stole second and raced across the plate on a single by Wes Westrum.

Ruben Gomez was the winner, blanking the Cubs until the sixth when Jim King socked his ninth homer with a man on base. It was Ruben's seventh triumph against four defeats.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Al Rosen and Larry Doby belted home runs Thursday night as the Cleveland Indians came from behind and defeated New York, 5-4. The loss cut the Yankees' league lead to four games.

Rosen, leading off in the eighth inning, tied the score with his 12th round trip of the year. Doby's blow, his 14th of the season, came with none on in the third.

Singles by Hal Naragon, Ray Narleski and Al Smith produced the winning run in the eighth.

New York got all of its runs against Bob Lemon, the first of three Cleveland pitchers.

The pitching victory went to Narleski and was his fifth without a loss.

The loser was Jim Konstanty, who came on in the sixth.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The Cincinnati Redlegs gave the Pittsburgh Pirates a 19-1 drubbing Thursday night, every man in the starting lineup getting at least one hit. Wally Post hit two homers good for four runs, Dale Burgess chipped in with a circuit clout and Johnny Temple had five hits in seven trips — including a bases loaded triple.

The play at the plate was close and catcher Joe Coyle of the Stars claimed that Kennedy failed to touch home plate.

Umpire Whalen saw things differently, however, and tossed Coyle out of the game when his protests became a little strong. Tom MacFarlane had no other catcher available and the umpire awarded the game.

NO IBC FIGHTS IN PENNSYLVANIA

CHICAGO (AP)—Truman Gibson, secretary of the International Boxing Club, said Thursday the IBC would not schedule fights in Pennsylvania because of the state's new athletic code which permits revocation of boxing licenses "without notice and hearing."

Newspaper accounts of the new Pennsylvania code place its enforcement in the hands of the Pennsylvania state police; and say that it requires out of state promoters to be licensed, and permits revocation of licenses without notice and hearing.

"We have no plans to schedule fights in Pennsylvania or any other state that does not provide the ordinary and reasonable safeguards of notice and hearing," Gibson said.
