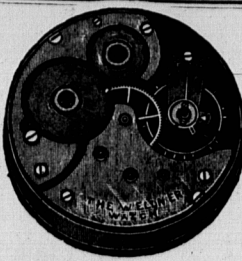

The death occurred at Long Creek on Saturday of Miss Maggie McEachern after an illness of over two years. She was the second daughter of the late Neil McEachern, and was dearly beloved by her large circle of relatives and friends in this city and Province. The funeral yesterday was largely attended.

Miss Gastonguay is one of our most charming girls, and in musical circles, especially, is a great favorite, being a graduate of the Academy of Mt. St. Vincent. Mr. Alleck is in the I. C. B. employ in this city, and is popular with his many acquaintances.—Halifax Mail.

Rev. A. J. McLeod, who is now stationed at New Glasgow, preached in Zion Presbyterian Church, in this City Sunday morning, and delivered two stirring addresses in the Y. M. C. A., one in the afternoon and the other in the evening after the church services. Mr. McLeod's style is evangelistic, and his discourses were marked with power and practical application—largely to the sins and short-comings of the times.

There passed away at West Roxbury, on April 14th, Sarah B. Stumbles formerly of this City. She leaves to mourn three sisters and two brothers, Mary and Stephen in Malden, W. W. of the Marine and Fisheries Department, Ottawa, Mrs. A. R. Crosby and Mrs. H. J. Kelly of this City. The remains arrived from Boston yesterday accompanied by her brother Stephen. Funeral today, Tuesday, from Hammond J. Kelly's Southport, funeral train will leave Charlottetown at 2:15 p. m., for Southport, remaining there for service, thence to Sherwood cemetery for interment.

Rev. Father Cornelius A. Campbell, D. D., who died Saturday evening at Kelly's Cross, had been in delicate health for some time, but no serious results were feared. Two hemorrhages occurring recently greatly weakened him and hastened the end. He was born at Mill Cove in 1866. He was a son of Michael Campbell, his mother, who died several years ago, being a sister of the late Archbishop O'Brien, of Halifax. For many years he was private secretary to the late Archbishop O'Brien, Halifax. The deceased was educated at St. Dunstan's College, and the College of the Propaganda, Rome. In 1894 he became assistant priest at Cathedral Halifax. After seven years in that capacity, his health gave way and he spent two years in Colorado, in the hope of regaining strength, but no permanent improvement resulted. For the past two years he remained at home, residing part of the time with his brother, Rev. Terrence Campbell, Parish Priest at Kelly's Cross. Though not engaged in actual pastoral work for the past seven years, Dr. Campbell, a ready and able writer kept his pen busy producing the 'Life of Mary, Queen of Scots,' and numerous articles for the Ecclesiastical Review. He was an eloquent speaker. Overworked as a student brought about a physical breakdown. He leaves a father, four brothers and three sisters.

The funeral of the late Rev. Dr. Campbell will leave his father's residence, Milcove, at 9:30 this morning for Corran Ban Church. Teams will meet the reverend clergy at Bedford Station this morning on arrival of the train from Charlottetown, and also arrival of trains from Souris and Georgetown.

The steamer Northumberland left this City yesterday morning about five o'clock and arrived in Pictou during the forenoon. She left Pictou for Charlottetown shortly after two and arrived in port about 7:50 having been delayed in the harbor by the heavy fog. This is the first trip of the season for the Steam Navigation Company's boat.

To R. W. Boyle, demonstrator in physics at McGill, has been awarded His Majesty's Commissioner's Science Research Scholarship, valued at £150, tenable for two years at least. Mr. Boyle will pursue research work in some of the laboratories in Germany under eminent scientists. For the past two years Mr. Boyle, who is a native of Newfoundland, has held his present position at McGill. (Mr. Boyle is a nephew of Mrs. (Hon.) George E. Hughes, of Charlottetown.)

The election trials affecting the sitting members for the First District of King's County open this morning at Souris. The seats are held respectively by John McLean, Conservative Assemblyman, who was elected by a majority of 165 over Frank Hertz, Liberal, and Hon. Lauchlin McDonald, Councillor, Liberal, who was elected by a majority of 41 over John Kiekham, Conservative. There are the usual charges of improper practices in both cases. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald will preside.

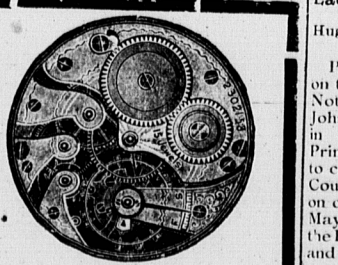

N. K. McLean, of Mitchell's River, leaves today on a visit to his daughter in Boston, Mass.

A slight thunder and lightning storm passed over the city last evening.

The moving picture program at the Opera House last night was of a high standard and plainly shown. The new singer has a good voice and rendered in fine style the popular song of the season, 'Rose.' Through missing connection the high class vaudeville expected did not arrive on time for last night's show and the management were much disappointed, however the program was a good one and much enjoyed by all.

At the meeting of the Anti-Tuberculosis Society held in the Board of Trade rooms last evening, reports from Organizer McCormac were read. He reports the people everywhere he had been enthusiastic in the movement and ready to take up the work. Mr. McCormac has nearly finished the work in King's County and is now ready to start in Queen's. It was decided to hold a general public meeting in the City in the near future to organize a subordinate society. A resolution was passed to ask the City Council through public channels to enforce the bye-laws respecting spitting in the Market and other public places. A code of bye-laws was adopted by the Society. It was decided to send blank forms to each subordinate society for reports. A resolution was passed authorizing the secretary to draw two hundred dollars on the grant given by the Legislature, for distribution of literature.
