Pleads Guilty To Assault Charge

SUMMERSIDE — An O'Leary man, Ronald Lee Waste, pleaded guilty before magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County court yesterday to a charge of assault causing bodily harm and was remanded in custody to July 26 for sentencing in order that his record be obtained.

Robert Arsenault, Bedeque, was fined \$50 and costs for driving while his license was suspended.

A St. Eleanors man, Gerald Stewart MacLeod, entered a not guilty plea to a charge of driving without due care and attention and his case was adjourned to July 27.

Ernest Joseph Arsenault, St. Gilbert, Dennis Gaudet, Miscouche and Vernon Atkinson, G.E.L. Summerside, were each fined \$10 and costs on separate charges of speeding.

Try To Move Hogs Across Strait

Strenuous efforts were made yesterday by the Swift Canadian Company plant at Moncton to move as many P.E.I. hogs as possible across Northumberland Strait. The company will be increasing the number of hogs bought from Island farmers due to the strike which has kept up most Canada Packers plants across the country.

T.A.M. Gillies, head buyer

for the Moncton plant is on the Island at present helping to direct activities during the emergency.

A beef fieldman, Glen Cotton, interested in all livestock developments stated yesterday, however, that there is no cause for panic, as the animals can be handled in an orderly manner. Livestock trucks moving the hogs to the Swift plant in Moncton are sharing in the big rush of traffic crossing the Strait, and although priority for these trucks has been requested, it was seen yesterday as most unlikely, as tourist traffic is taxing transportation facilities to the limit.

Statement Likely Today

Premier Walter J. Shaw said yesterday the changeover from Conservative to a Liberal administration can be expected next week and that he would make an official announcement to that effect today.

Tourist traffic to the province so far this year, is up about 20 per cent over figures for the same period in 1965, George V. Fraser, Director of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau said yesterday morning.

He added that the volume of traffic is unprecedented and if it continues, it will be the best year ever for the industry.

This week Mr. Fraser said the heavy influx has had the staffs of Island tourist bureaus working overtime accommodating the visitors.

Preston Hamill, and following reports from the various committees, it was decided that the greens committee, chaired by Ernest MacDonal, would begin this work immediately and also purchase necessary equipment for the construction of the greens at this new and picturesque course.

Very favorable reports were heard from all committees including finance and membership and all members approved a motion of thanks to George Nicholson, a charter member, who gave much of his time and talent towards the development of this course.

The golf club is being used frequently each day by members and visitors and the executive expressed the desire to improve conditions as rapidly as possible to increase the pleasure of all those using the province's newest golf course.

1,080 Blood Donors Needed

At least 1,080 blood donors will be required at eight centres in the province during the week of August 21 according to F.A.S. Jones, provincial chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee, who stated that the schedule is now finalized with committee chairmen and members at work on the preparatory plans.

Mr. Jones explained that 1,080 donors is the minimum quota and represents the least quantity of blood needed to provide the needs of patients in our hospitals and those in Nova Scotia at that period in August.

When writing the chairmen at the various centres recently, Mr. Jones stressed the fact that the increasing dependence on blood for use in saving health and life, makes it an absolute necessity that every clinic reach its objective, and that every possible donor should volunteer. He advised the committees of the desperate importance of leaving no effort undone and urged them to recruit as many people as possible in the work of soliciting donors in their areas.

Royal Canadian Legion branches in the following six of the eight centres will be the sponsors and hold the clinics in their local Legion Homes—North Rustico, Eldon, Monell, Souris, Cardigan and Montague. The other two clinics are at Hunter River where the Women's Institute is the sponsoring organization and at Kinkora with Ralph McCarville as the chairman.

unified force will be required and the chief of the defence staff will see that there won't be any more failures of communications between headquarters and headquarter soldiers will be required to serve in field army formations unless they volunteer for such service.

There will be no change of uniform until the legislation establishing the new force has been passed through Parliament. The new uniform will be of a standard color and design but will carry distinctive badges or insignia to indicate the component of the force to which the wearer belongs.

The defence chief's message also said that "within the new defence force there will be an adequate and continuing establishment of personnel allocated for the effective operation of the currently approved maritime force program."

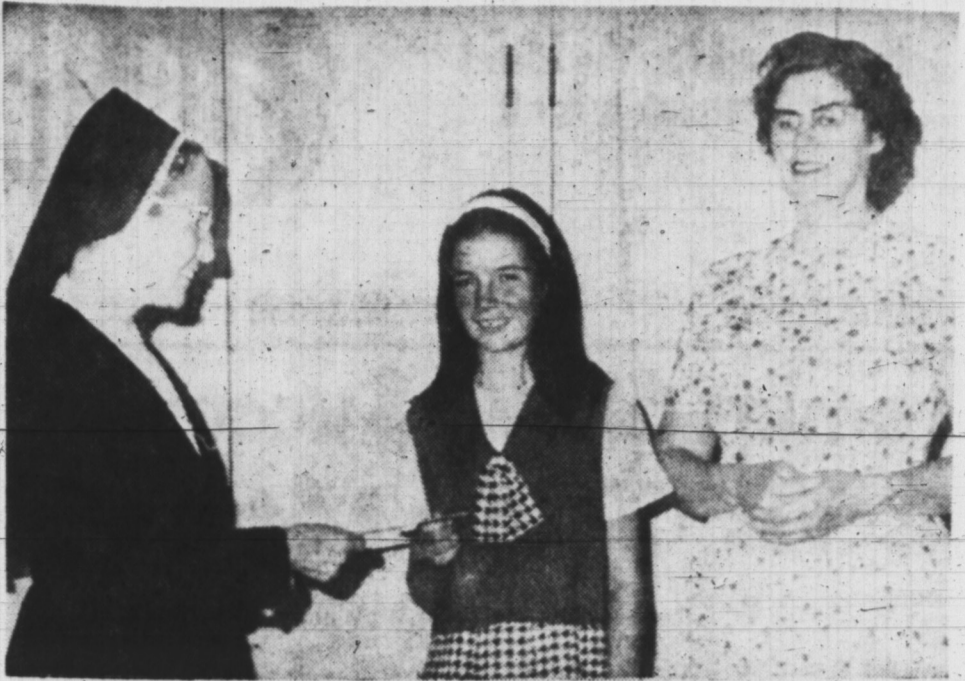
could not support a policy leading to unification of the forces. Informants said his successor may be named next week after a meeting in Paris.
