Newsman Dies In Sydney At 52

SYDNEY (CP)—John Roderick (Shaun) MacDonald, a Nova Scotia newspaper man for more than 31 years, died in hospital today after a long illness. He was 52.

Born in Sydney, he attended St. Mary's University, Halifax, before beginning his news career in the Halifax bureau of The Canadian Press in 1934. He joined the Sydney Post-Record

the following year and became Cape Breton correspondent for the Halifax Herald in 1945. He held this post for the Halifax Chronicle-Herald when he died.

Mr. MacDonald was a past-president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association. Surviving besides his wife Clara are sons Gerald, with The Chronicle-Herald in Sydney; Maurice with CPR public relations in Montreal, and Brian, Rodde land Timothy and daughters Margaret and Clare Marie, at home.

1966 Is Considered Record Year For Blood Donor Clinics

A total of 1,274 donors registered at last week's Red Cross blood donor clinics held in five centres in Prince County, to chalk up a 102.2 per cent of the quota of 1,246 which had been set for the four days.

1966 has been a "record" year as far as the overall attendance at Red Cross blood donor clinics is concerned, according to F.A. S. Jones, provincial chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee.

Mr. Jones said that 6,000 do-

ctors registered at the five series of clinics on a quota of 5,790 to produce a 102.3 per cent result for the year. This is the largest number of donors ever to turn out at clinics since their inception in this province in 1948, and only the second year that the total objective had been reached and exceeded. In 1965 there was a 107 per cent response with an enrollment of 5,890 donors.

GREAT PRAISE The provincial blood donor chairman had great praise for

the donors throughout the province who responded so magnificently, as well as for the Royal Canadian Legion branches which sponsored two-thirds of the clinics and held them in their well-equipped homes, and the other organizations and groups which headed the committees in their localities. He expressed gratitude to all who assisted in any way in making it possible to maintain the province's blood supply at such a satisfactory level.

Hon. Robert E. Campbell Sworn In Yesterday

A new addition to the Executive Council gave Western Prince Edward Island official representation at the regular meeting of Premier Alex Campbell's Cabinet yesterday afternoon.

A ceremony at Government House added Hon. Robert E. Campbell to the Liberal Cabinet. He was sworn in as minister without portfolio by Lieutenant-Governor W.J. MacDonald.

Mr. Campbell, 44, is from Alberton. He represents the district of First Prince. Elected councillor in the May 30 election, Mr. Campbell was first elected to the Prince Edward Island Legislature in 1962.

ACT CHANGED The Executive Council received its new member through a bill passed at the special session

of the Legislature which provided that the Legislative Assembly Act be changed to provide for nine cabinet ministers, and one member without portfolio. The amendment to this act allowed Mr. Campbell to be sworn in as a member of the Council.

Mr. Campbell was asked if he intends to submit any specific proposals to Cabinet today.

He stated that on behalf of the residents of Prince County, he will introduce for Cabinet consideration a proposal for the establishment of a golf course in west Prince.

Programs of highway construction for west Prince are among other items expected to be brought before Cabinet during future meetings, he said.

Brief Presented To Premier Campbell

By LORNE YEO Stressing the fact that all money received and paid out by the Workmen's Compensation Board comes from the employers and not from government, the Prince Edward Island branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association yesterday presented a brief to Premier Alex Campbell and members of Cabinet.

The delegation to Cabinet included R.P. MacDonald, Charlottetown; Eric Hamer, Summerside; J.W. Stewart, Moncton, manager of the Atlantic division, Canadian Manufacturer's Association; Norman Stewart and Louis Howatt, both representing the Builders Exchange.

The submission pointed out that the system of granting compensation, medical aid, and pensions should not be abused by treating it as social assistance legislation or unemployment insurance. To do so, and depart from the basic principles, could jeopardize the workers' or widows' pensions now being paid.

ORGANIZATIONS The manufacturers suggested that employee and employer organizations should be asked to nominate their respective representatives to the Board when vacancies occur as the Compensation Boards across Canada are each composed of three persons, representing employers, employees and government.

The submission reiterated the employers support of Workmen's Compensation legislation which, when an accident occurred arising out of an in the course of employment, compensates the injured man for 100%

More Co-operation Is Needed Among Farmers

SOURIS — More co-operation among farmers is needed, the trouble is to get them to co-operate, it was suggested last night at the annual meeting of the Kings County Federation of Agriculture held in the United Church hall here.

President George Matheson, Heatherdale, presided. Other items suggested by five study groups include: capital grants to help pave farm yards; farmers should be able to hunt or fish of their own property without a licence and the farmer should have control over who can hunt and fish on his property.

Several groups favoured the government's announced schedule of fees for plowing farmers' lanes. Several others opposed it stating: "The people own the government snowplows, why should they have to pay to have their lanes plowed?"

At the meeting stricter Hallowe'en enforcement was urged, with one group suggesting that Hallowe'en be banned altogether. Another group suggested that each rural district organize a patrol to prevent lawlessness.

POTATO DISEASES Dealing with potato diseases, one group suggested that all railway cars at sidings should

be disinfected. Some of them suggested disinfecting the inspector.

Keith Kennedy of Charlottetown gave an illustrated talk on his recent trip to the World Poultry Congress in Russia. This talk will be reviewed in a future John A. Rodd column.

John A. Rodd, Milton, provincial president of the Federation of Agriculture spoke briefly, as did J. Lincoln Dewar, provincial secretary.

Fire Destroys Two Barns

MONTAGUE — A fire of unknown origin at 1:30 a.m. yesterday destroyed a large barn and another smaller one on the property of Raymond MacAulay at Peters Road, five miles from Murray River.

The fire which got out of control quickly broke out in the large barn and then spread to the other which was situated nearby. As far as could be learned last night the larger barn contained a quantity of hay and grain along with some farm machinery, which was destroyed. The second barn housed a number of cattle, all of which were removed.

The Murray River Fire Department responded to the call. According to Montague RCMP the buildings were insured for a small amount.

Mr. MacAulay lost a barn a number of years ago in a fire which broke out during grain threshing operations.

Estate Planning Is Meeting Topic

The meeting, under the chairmanship of president Donald B. Nicholson, appointed his new officers for the coming year: They are, Robert Carruthers, President; Don Nicholson, Past President; Bennett Carr, 1st Vice-President; Jack Wainman, 2nd Vice-President; Vance Bridges, Secretary; Robert Parke, Treasurer. Directors are J.A. Galant, Stuart Ives, W. Driscoll, Ralph Rupert, Blair MacDonald, Wilfred Inman and Robert Hyndman.

Mr. Carruthers was also named as the Island association's delegate to the national association convention in Ontario. R.J. Harper, chairman of the Underwriters' Bursary Fund, reported that contributions are coming in satisfactorily and the association's objective should be met without difficulty. The fund, established by the Life Underwriters' Association of Canada, has been set up to make bursaries available in selected Canadian universities where courses are being offered, which contain at least 15 hours of instruction on the principles and fundamentals of life insurance. The fund, in this action, according to a pamphlet released by the fund directors, "seeks to stimulate more appreciation of the life insurance business, particularly in view of the rapid increase in the percentage of the population acquiring university education."

Island Population Shows Net Gain Of 998 People

OTTAWA — Prince Edward Island has net a net population gain of 998 people for the first 10 months of this year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports.

Number of births to the end of October was 1,644 and deaths have totalled 646 in the same period.

But births continue to decline in comparison with 1965 and with the average for the past three years. There were 2,116 births to the end of October this year, and the average for three years has been 2,281. The decline this year is 12.3 per cent below 1965 and 19.1 per cent below the three year average.

Marriages continue to show a slight increase with an even 600 registered for the first 10 months this year compared to 581 in 1965 for a 3.3 per cent rise.

Deaths are up 2.3 per cent over 1965 and 3.4 per cent over the average number for a three year period.
