

Gus Mortson's Goal Gives Hawks 4-3 Win Over Leafs

TORONTO (CP) Chicago Black Hawks, who seem to be going nowhere in the National Hockey League standings but are having fun doing it by ruining other teams' chances, Saturday night put a large dent in the playoff hopes of Toronto Maple Leafs by taking a spine-tingling 4-3 decision from them.

Hawks, in the league cellar with 42 points, tied moved to within seven points of the fifth-place Leafs, who have played one game less. Chicago's hopes of a playoff berth, however, are almost only mathematically. Hawks took a 4-2 lead with less than five minutes to go in the game. Right Winger Ron Stewart of Toronto cut the lead to 4-3 with less than two minutes to go to set up one of the most exciting finishes seen here this season.

Leaf goaltender Ed Chadwick was removed from the nets with one minute and 15 seconds to go in the game. Leafs stormed around the Chicago goal. Then Hawks raced into Leaf territory with puck and Eddie Litzberger, gunning for 30th goal of the season, got the puck and fired a low fast shot at the goal. Defenceman Marc Reaume of Toronto stopped the shot.

With 38 seconds left, Eric Nesterenko of Chicago was given a hooking penalty. Leafs again stormed the Chicago net. Hawk netminder Al Rollins somehow got his glove on the loose puck before it could go in the net.

Gus Mortson, Elmer Vasko, Nesterenko and Eddie Kachur scored the Chicago goals. Centre Rudy Migay and right winger Tim Horton were the other Leaf scorers.

Rollins played a tremendous game, making 29 saves, 11 in the last period. Chadwick had 15 stops.

C.R.U. Leaves Door Open, But Removes Welcome Mat

MONTREAL (CP) — The Canadian Rugby Union ended its annual meeting Saturday by leaving the door open for the Ontario union's entry at an unspecified time into Grey Cup play but made sure no welcome mat has yet been hung out.

By officially adopting on a 7 to 2 vote the compromise proposal offered by the Quebec Union at the open meeting, the CRU in effect:

1. Allowed the ORFU to retain its constitutional right to challenge each year for the cup but left it up to the two big pro leagues of the CRU to decide when the weaker member has sufficiently improved its calibre of play.

2. Tried to arrange the ORFU's feelings by suggesting pre-season and post-season exhibition games as a yardstick in determining the ORFU's playing strength.

Action in the question Saturday followed exactly the pattern laid out at Friday's closed executive meeting.

IDENTICAL RESOLUTIONS

The Quebec union submitted an amendment to identical resolutions of the Big Four league in the East and the Western Interprovincial Football Union which would have thrown the ORFU out of future Grey Cup competition by a change in the constitution.

The Quebec union-only intermediate-class voting member of the CRU—proposed that the question of ORFU participation be left to the executive of the CRU each year.

Decision would be by a bare majority of six votes. Combined, the Big Four and WIFU have those six votes and the two pro members have been the ones long wanting to sidetrack the ORFU.

Saturday's meeting formally ratified Nov. 30 as the date of the 1957 Grey Cup game and formally named Toronto as the venue. A recommendation was left with the incoming executive that the 1958 game be played in Vancouver.

MINOR RULES CHANGED
Decision on the venue and date for the 1957 East-West all-star Shrine game was left to a special committee. Montreal was reported a possible host.

Six comparatively minor playing rule changes were approved, all recommended by the rules committee from 16 suggestions received.

Down Downey of Toronto, an ORFU member, became the CRU's 1957 president in succession to Ken Montgomery of Edmonton. Toronto was named as the site for the 1958 annual meeting.

Favorable support was given to an application by the Maritime union that it become a full-fledged member of the CRU.

Dave Jenkins Captures Men's World Figure Skating Ch'ship

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP)—Dave Jenkins of the United States won the men's world figure skating championship Saturday night to keep in the U.S. the title won for the last four years by his brother, Hayes Alan.

A British team, June Markham and Courtney Jones of London, put on a graceful exhibition to win the dancing championship for the seventh straight year.

The Canadian entry in this event, North American champions Geraldine Fenton, 20, and F. I. McLachlan, 18, both of Toronto, was second. It was their first appearance in the world competition.

Jenkins, 20, put on a brilliant display of spins in the men's free skating to clinch the title. He had built up a commanding lead in compulsory figures skated earlier last week.

Canadian champion Charles Soelling of Toronto won third place, behind Tim Brown of California.

MAIN TRIUMPH
Canada's main triumph in the championships was in the pairs, where Barbara Wagner, 18, and

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Lightly-Regarded Colt Won \$143,000 Derby On Saturday

NEW YORK (CP) — Lightly-regarded Sir William, a colt from Washington State, won the \$143,000 Santa Anita derby Saturday while Bold Ruler held on in the stretch to whip six other Kentucky Derby nominees in the \$131,400 Flamingo Stakes at Hialeah Park.

Sir William, with jockey Henry Moreno aboard, came up in the stretch and held off a determined challenge by Swirling Abbey and Round Table to win by a head.

The time on a slow track was 1:54 1/5 for the 1 1/8 miles.

Sir William, owned and bred by Mr. and Mrs. Herb Armstrong of Herrington, Wash., paid \$14,800 \$7.70 and \$3.10.

One of Sir Williams' dubious claims to distinction is that he has no upper front teeth. They were kicked out by another horse when he was a yearling.

MASTERFULLY GUIDED
At Miami, Eddie Arcaro guided Bold Ruler masterfully to a neck victory over Willie Hartack on Gen. Duke in track record time of 1:47 for the mile and one-eighth. Another Calumet horse, Iron Liege, was third in the select field of triple crown hopefuls.

The old record of 1:47 1/5 was set by Spartan Valor in 1952.

Bold Ruler, favorite in the betting at 1 to 2, paid \$3.20, \$2.20 and \$2.40.

Bold Ruler, trained by Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons, earned \$96,400 for his owner, Mrs. H. C. Phipps

of New York and Palm Beach. At New Orleans' Fair Grounds, Kingmaker, a chestnut stretch runner, took over when the pacemakers failed to win the \$60,600 New Orleans Handicap.

Full Flight also came up fast, but had to settle for second with Speed Rouser third.

PAID \$11.80
The time for the 1 1/8-mile event was 1:50 1/5. Kingmaker paid \$11.80.

Fabricator won the \$20,000-added Southern Maryland Handicap at Bowie Track, Bowie, Md. Kinda Smart was second and Paper Tiger third.

At Bay Meadows in San Mateo, Calif., No Bumps was never headed as he won the \$15,885 San Jose handicap. Translation was second and Pie Master third.

Ron Delaney Wins 1000 Yd., And Two-Mile Race At Meet

NEW YORK (AP) — Ron Delaney, a running machine who defies description, won both the 1,000-yard and the two-mile races—a feat never before accomplished in one evening—in the intercollegiate track and field championships Saturday night.

He came from 50 yards off the pace in the last three laps in the two-mile event to win. He entered it with only 48 minutes rest after his victory in the 1,000-yard race.

His victories led Villanova college to the team championship with 46 points.

Several runners have tried this double before, but it never has been accomplished. Delaney did it and the way he did had the crowd of 7,150 going wild.

He won the 1,000 in routine fashion in 2:14. Little Ike Matza of New York University made a good try in finishing second about two yards back.

STARTED LAST
Just 48 minutes later, Delaney returned to the track for the two-mile.

Lew Stiglitz of Connecticut took the lead. Delaney was dead last at the start. But by the time the race had gone 19 of its 22 laps, he had pulled into second.

At this point, he was just 50 yards back of Stiglitz, who appeared to be getting stronger with each stride. Delaney seemed well-heated. But he decided to mazz

the try anyway.

He cut the lead down to 10 yards with a lap to go. On the final turn, with the crowd yelling itself hoarse, he pulled even with Stiglitz. Then he swept past the Connecticut runner.

At the end, Delaney was pumping for all he was worth. The margin was eight yards and the time was 9:06.5, breaking the meet record of 9:07 set by George King of New York University last year.

DETROIT (AP) — Aging lightweight champion Archie Moore will put his title on the line June 7 in Detroit against the winner of a Chuck Spieser-Ernie Anthony fight here April 5.

Nick Londe, matchmaker, said Thursday Moore's manager, Charles Johnston, agreed to the date.

Spieser is the No. 1 lightweight contender and Anthony is rated No. 3.

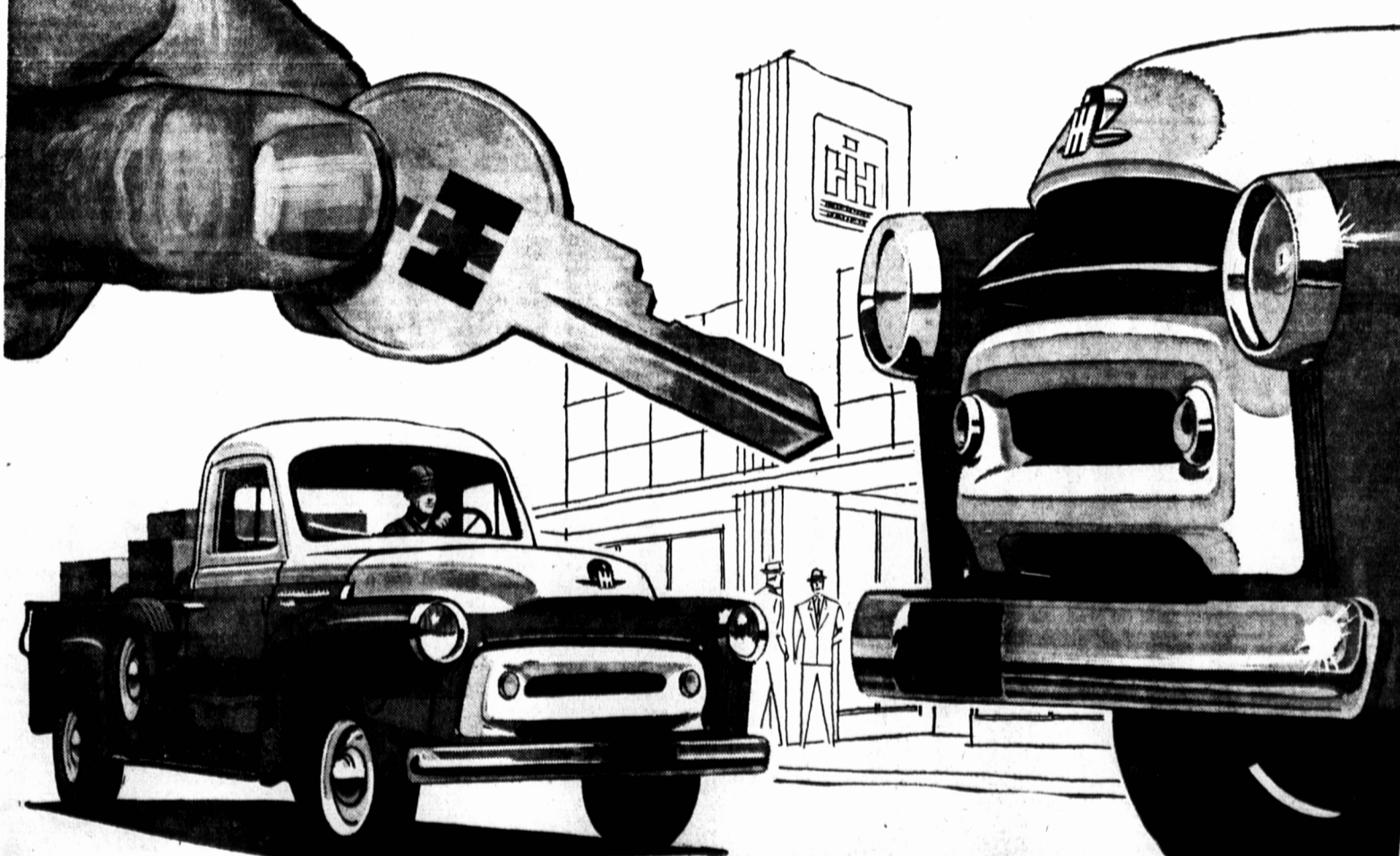
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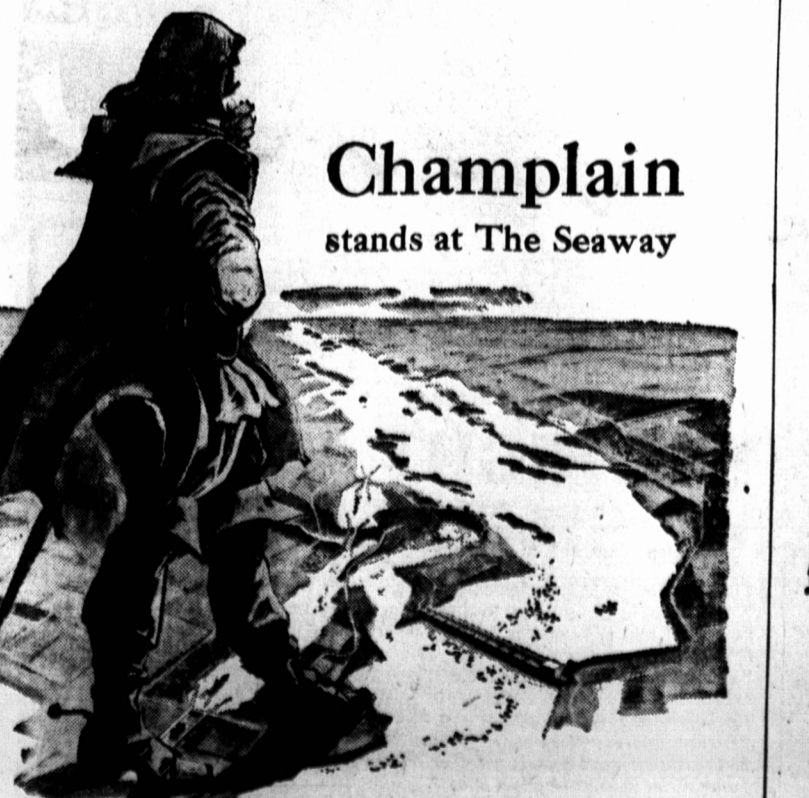
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
