Local and Other Items.

CITY COUNCIL meeting to-night.

SCOTT ACT REPEAL.—The repeal vote on the Scott Act in Colchester County, N. B., will be taken on April 4th.

MEETING.—A meeting of St. Dunstan's congregation will be held in St. Patrick's Hall, on Sunday evening next, to consider the matter of an appropriation towards a monument to the late "Father Dan."

FUNERAL.—The funeral of the late Duncan McMillan took place yesterday afternoon. There was a large attendance of citizens generally, and the members of the Caledonian Club, in regalia, preceded the hearse.

THE STANLEY crossed from Pictou to Georgetown yesterday, meeting large quantities of ice. The mails and passengers were brought to town by special train, arriving yesterday afternoon. She left Georgetown for Pictou at an early hour this morning, and will return this evening.

SENTENCE.—Captain Thomas Stark and Mate James Rigby, of the schr. Clara, have been sentenced to five years in the penitentiary for inhuman treatment, resulting in the death of seaman Hooker, while on a voyage from Bristol to St. John's, Nfld.

BADLY INJURED.—While driver Charles Saunders, of Truro, was standing on the track at Paines Junction on the afternoon of Friday last, he was struck by the Shediac branch train shunting round the "Y." He was knocked about twenty feet, and had one of his ribs broken, besides sustaining other severe injuries.

PROPOSED FOUR-OARED RACE.—A four-oared match or purse-race is talked of at San Francisco between O'Connor, Gaudaur, Lee and Hamm in one boat, and a local four of Peterson boys from the Arie club against them. The Pacific slope oarsmen, including Peterson, McDonald, Cockrane, Branch, and one or two others, likely to be picked for the local four, agreed to furnish the big professionals with a shell or racing barge.

A CLEVER CAPTURE.—A runaway horse attached to a top buggy came tearing madly down Farnum street. Officers McMahon and Barr were standing on the corner of Fifteenth and Farnum and attempted to stop the animal. This they failed to do, but McMahon, with cat like agility, caught the buggy, as it was passing, and jumped into it from the rear. He then climbed up on the horse's back and caught the reins. The horse could not be pulled up until he had reached the B. & M. headquarters. The officer then quickly rode the horse, a la postillon, to the police station. The owner of the runaway has not been found. —Omaha Paper.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM FIRE.—A lamp exploded at the residence of Michael Luby, Queen street, about one o'clock this morning, and there would, undoubtedly, have been serious conflagration were it not for the prompt action of officers Cameron and Campbell, who noticed the blaze of the lamp through the window while passing along the street, and aroused Mr. Luby who extinguished the fire by throwing the lamp into a coal-hod. The lamp was in a bracket on one side of the room, a few feet from the ceiling, and when the officers first observed the fire, the flames were above the chimney and up to the ceiling. Mr. Luby, his wife and family were sleeping in an adjoining room, and knew nothing about the fire till the officers woke them up.

THE SEA SERPENT AGAIN.—The sea serpent was seen again in McQueen's Lake, last Wednesday evening, by two men of undoubted veracity, Archy McDonald and Archy McQueen (Lauch's son), while driving along the road beside the lake. They describe it as about sixty feet in length, with a black body and moving somewhat similarly to a porpoise. There seems to be no doubt now, in the minds of many, that some such vast creature really exists in the lakes of this country. The recent accounts of the monster in McQueen's Lake correspond not only with the accounts of those who saw it in the same lake twenty years ago, and another monster seen in a swamp and lake near Canso, Guysboro county, three years ago. In the two latter cases the serpent was seen to move through a swamp or bog into a lake and left a trail that was visible for many days afterwards. Is was something of the crocodile species. —Sydney Reporter.

INDIAN SUMMER IN CAPE BRETON.—At Loch Awe, C. B., on February 4th, a half dozen Mayflowers were found in embryo blossom. In a pasture near the same place, a strawberry plant flowered on the 21st of January. At west end Nyanza, Victoria county, on January 26th, a bird resembling a wren hatched out four lively chicks which were very much like young wrens, and are the pride and admiration of the people in the vicinity. The nest was discovered in a tree before the hatching process was completed, and it was supposed that the birds would perish when February weather would arrive. Not so, however, for on February 5th they are doing admirably, although the tree had some ice and snow about it for some days previous. No artificial care or shelter was afforded to assist the enterprising mother bird, as it was desired to see what could be done in the brooding line of business in the middle of a Cape Breton winter. The people of Victoria county, however, do not wish the above facts to become too well known—they are afraid that the people of Dakota and other United States territories will move hitherwards en masse.

Notes and Clippings.

—Kingston News: Now, we have never been able to discover even from universal history, that optimism is not a more logical belief than pessimism. If this be true of universal history, which, viewed too narrowly, appears to display a retrograde tendency, it is more than certain that pessimism is utterly illogical in Canada's case. Canada's future will be the product of the same factors that went to produce her present prosperous condition, viz.: the energy of her sons, her natural wealth and her wise administration. The only important difference between the future and the present is that the future will be the present magnified in every detail of its prosperity.

—New York Tribune: Sir John Macdonald continues to be the sprightly old man and astute politician that for so many years have made him the idol of the Tory or Conservative party and the terror of the Grits or Reformers. The other day a dinner was given at Sherbrooke, Quebec, to Mr. Pope, who is a member of the Dominion Cabinet, and Sir John was one of the guests. In response to calls upon him he made one of those clever speeches for which he is famous, in which he sounded the praise of his colleague and of his own policy so deftly that even his enemies could not take offence. On very few previous occasions has he appeared more at home or made a more skillful speech. Mr. Chapleau is recognized as the orator of the Dominion Cabinet, yet neither he nor any other of its members can get so near to the hearts of the people as Sir John.

—Boycotting is a punishable offence in Canada. That is the meaning of the judgment of Queen's Bench division of the High Court of Ontario, given in the case of Regina vs. Gibson, an appeal from a conviction of the Wentworth sessions. The three defendants were members of a bricklayers' union, which passed a resolution forbidding its members from working at the new city hall, then being built at Hamilton, while Buscombe was employed by the city authorities. The jury found the defendants guilty of conspiracy, and the highest appellate court in the province has affirmed the jury's finding. Chief Justice Allen holding that "what the defendants and the other members of this union present at the meeting conspired to do was not within any of the purposes of their combination permitted by law, nor was it even within the purposes of their constitution and rules."

—It appears that Lord Lansdowne will associate with the vice-regal office the administration of the foreign portfolio of India, and the hope is expressed that, in directing negotiations with the neighboring states, he will show a firmer hand than his immediate predecessor. This criticism and suggestion were called forth in reference to the Ampe or representative of China in Sikkim, when Lord Dufferin's excessive tendency towards conciliation had rendered—after the fashion of half-civilized rulers or functionaries—more arrogant than before. He had also, it is alleged, been playing a double game; for, while pretending that the Tibetan authorities were obstinately opposed to the arrangement proposed by the Indian Government, he had himself been suggesting objections and counter offers of an insulting kind. It is expected that Lord Lansdowne, dealing directly with the Pekin authorities, will be successful in bringing about a satisfactory settlement.

A Rome despatch says there is talk of a betrothal of Prince Emanuele, eldest son of the Duke of Aosta and nephew of King Humbert, to Archduchess Margareta, daughter of Archduke Charles Louis of Austria.
