#### THEY TAKE SECOND PLACE

Your fiancé may be overdoing the good times he has with the old gang, but the real error here is his insistence that you give up your friends. This you should absolutely refuse to do. On the nights he is out without you, you should be free to go to movies, for walks—even skating or bowling—with other girls.

It is, to say the least, unusual for a man in love to willingly spend so much time away from his sweetheart. ANSWER: Jane is a very confused girl, and a little help from one of you girls may mean a lot to her.
