

The June Term of the Supreme Court for Prince County commenced on Tuesday last. There was but little business before the Court, and the Term closed on Wednesday night.—1st.

Brig 'Kurea', from New York, has been wrecked off the southern coast of Soana. The captain, crew, a passenger named Wm. Giddings, and a part of the cargo were saved. The Kurea was 150 tons new measurement, rated A1, and was built in 1862 in P. E. Island, whence she hailed.

We observe by the Halifax Witness that Rev. George Sutherland left that city on Wednesday, the 5th inst., by the Panama route, for New Zealand and Australia. It seems, therefore, that he purposes to labor in these Southern Colonies; and that we were slightly in error, when we mentioned his name in connection with the missionary field.—Pat.

THE MYSTERY, OF TRIGNMOUTH.—To the Editor.—Sir,—We, the undersigned, Owner and Master of the late brigantine Mystery, of Trignmouth, beg, through the medium of the Shipping and Mercantile Gazette, to tender our warmest thanks to Capt. Hull, of the brigantine Jane, of Prince Edward Island, who so promptly answered our signal of distress, and immediately bore down on us on the morning of the 19th ult., our own boats having been carried away by a tremendous sea on the 14th, which also took everything moveable from our decks, causing our vessel to leak very badly. Capt. Hull immediately launched his own boat, sending his Chief Mate, Mr. Thomas Boyer, in charge, who, although there was a heavy sea running at the time, managed the boat admirably. He, together with his boat's crew, risking their own lives, in length succeeded in rescuing us from our perilous position, to whom we shall ever feel indebted. We have also to thank Capt. Hull, and Wm. Bell, Esq., owner of the brig Jane, for their extreme kindness and attention to the wants of ourselves and survivors of our crew who were frost-bitten and otherwise disabled, but received every care during our stay on board their ship.

News by Telegraph.

CHARLOTTETOWN, June 15.
London, 14.—Bullion in Bank of England increased three hundred and seventy six thousand pounds.

New York, 14th.—Cholera in Brazilian Camp on River Plata, seven hundred died in four days.—St. John, N. B.—Tilley, Mitchell, and Tupper leave for Ottawa on Monday next.—Gold 137.

LONDON, June 11.
All the Fenian prisoners convicted of high treason have been transferred and placed in prison.

The chancery case of the United States vs. McRae has been decided in favor of the latter.

A despatch from Constantinople reports that the Sublime Porte has issued a firman, making Egypt a separate sovereignty.

PARIS, June 11, even.
His Imperial Majesty, the Czar of Russia, left Paris to-day for Germany.

PESTH, June 11th.
The Emperor Francis Joseph, the New King of Hungary, has added to the éclat of his coronation by distributing a vast sum of money among the poor, and by richly endowing various benevolent institutions in the city.

LIVERPOOL, June 13th.
Lord Monck, Viceroy of the Dominion of Canada, sailed to-day for Quebec in the steamer Nestorian.

DUBLIN, June 13th, even.
Corydon, by whose testimony the prisoners who were captured at Dunganrow were identified, was to-day attacked by a mob at Waterford, and barely escaped their vengeance with his life.

WASHINGTON, June 13.
A prize fight for \$200 and the championship of America, came off this morning at Acquia Creek, between Colyer and Aron, after sixty-seven rounds, occupying two hours. Colyer was badly punished about the head and face. Aron had four ribs broken. England, France and Austria were represented on the ground, by representatives from their legations. About three hundred persons witnessed the fight.—Gold 137.

New York, June 11.
The news from Mexico by way of New Orleans reaches to June 2d. Mendez was shot May 16. A Court Martial to try Maximilian was ordered by Escebedo, to assemble May 19th. Maximilian was badly wounded on the morning of the final assault and it is said his wound may prove fatal.

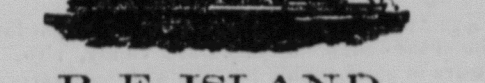
