

Anniversary Items.

TUESDAY, Oct. 14.—The battles of Jena and Auerstadt, in Central Germany, were fought on the 14th Oct., 1806, between the French and Prussians. The French were commanded by Napoleon, and opposed Prince Hohenlohe at Jena, and by Davourisk, opposed by the King of Prussia at Auerstadt. About 20,000 Prussians were killed and wounded, and about the same number taken prisoners, and 900 field pieces; the French losing 14,000 men. Before a fortnight after these battles, Napoleon issued, from Berlin, what is known as the famous Berlin decree, an interdiction against the commerce of England. It declared the British Islands to be in a state of blockade, and ordered all Englishmen found in countries occupied by French troops to be treated as prisoners of war.

Supreme Court—Prince County.

MONDAY, Oct. 13. The Queen on the prosecution of Mary Grady vs John M. Whitman.—This was an indictment charging the prisoner with an indecent assault and with common assault. The circumstances relating to the charge and the evidence in support of it was substantially the same as that in the case of Kate McKinnon against the same prisoner, tried Saturday. The jury in this case however found the prisoner—Not Guilty. The Attorney-General and Hodgson, Q. C., for the Crown. Mr. Wright for the prisoner.

After this verdict was brought in, the prisoner was placed at the bar to receive his sentence for the indecent assault on the girl, Kate McKinnon, of which he was convicted on Saturday. The Chief Justice sentenced him to be imprisoned for twelve months in the common jail of Prince County, and during that time to be kept at hard labor.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Prime Meridian Conference.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13. At the prime meridian conference to-day, Sir Frederick Evans, of Great Britain, presented comparative statements, showing that the tonnage of shipping controlled by the Greenwich standard of longitude, was in round numbers, 14,900,000 tons, while that controlled by the Paris standard was only 1,735,000 tons. Rutherford's resolution, in favor of Greenwich as the prime meridian was then adopted, twenty-one nations voting in favor of it; one, San Domingo, against it, and France and Brazil abstaining from voting.

The Cholera.

NAPLES, Oct. 13. During the past 24 hours 97 new cases of cholera and 45 deaths have been reported in this city.

ROME, Oct. 13.

The total number of fresh cases of cholera reported in Italy for the past 24 hours was 195, and the number of deaths 99. The Queen of Portugal has sent 10,000 lire for the relief of cholera sufferers in Naples.

King Humbert has given 120,000 lire to be used for the same purpose in Greece.

New Naval College.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14. The secretary of the navy, has established for an advanced course of professional training for naval officers, to be known as the naval war college. It will be under the general supervision of the bureau of navigation. The principal building on Harbor Island, Newport, R. I., will be assigned to its use. Commodore Luce will be President of the College, which is for officers of a higher grade than cadets.

Terrible Typhoon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13. The steamer Oceanic arrived to-day, bringing associated press advices from Hong Kong up to Sept. 13, and from Yokohama on Sept. 15th. Yokohama and Tokio were visited by a terrible typhoon. In the latter city three thousand houses were wholly or partly destroyed, and twenty persons killed. The loss of life at sea was appalling.

Another Railway Collision.

CAMDEN, N. J., Oct. 13. A collision occurred here between two Pennsylvania railroad trains this morning. Joseph Carman, engineer of one of the trains, was killed, and the fireman of the other train was fatally injured, having both legs cut off. Several passengers were hurt. Both engines were smashed.

Turkish Mail Robbery.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 13. The Turkish mail from Bagdad was last night attacked by brigands and robbed of over £60,000. The attack was so well planned that the existence of collusion between government officials and brigands is suspected.

Chinese Losses.

PARIS, Oct. 13. General De L Isle has reported to the Department, that "the Chinese, in the last engagement, lost 1000 men, including their general. The victory was mainly due to the gallantry of the Vanguard, under command of Capt. Fortou."

Free from Epidemic Diseases.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 13. Advice from Porto Rico say that the island is now free from epidemic diseases.

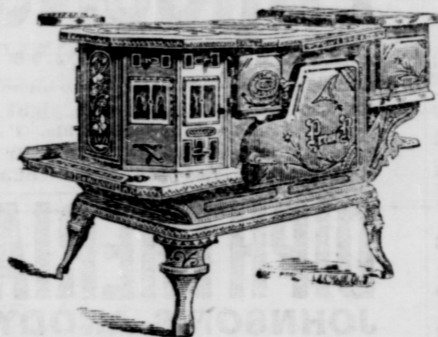

The Scholarship is of the annual value of \$125, and will be tenable for three years.
