To Ship Two Carloads Of Island Hogs To Winter Fair

Plans are now under way for the shipment of two carloads of market hogs to the Royal Winter Fair to be held in Toronto next month, according to word received yesterday from Mr. H. W. Clay, senior livestock fieldman, Federal Department of Agriculture.

However, Mr. Clay stated that he did not yet know which breeders would contribute the stock as it would depend on the weight of the hogs at the time. It is planned once again to have island hogs compete in both the bacon and live classes.

Last year at the Royal Mr. Sterling Willis, North River, won the famous Todd Trophy for the second year in a row. Mr. William Found, New London, was second in the Brethour Trophy competition. This latter trophy has been won previously by exhibitors from this Province.

Also expected at the Royal this year is a carload of Jersey cattle from the herd of Mr. Edison Mutch, North River.

Charlottetown Teachers Federation Hold Meeting
