

Canada Bans Jet Export To Caribbean 'Hot Spot'

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian government has rejected attempts by a United States firm to ship surplus Canadian Vampire jet fighters to the Dominican Republic, a Caribbean hot spot.

Trade Minister Churchill said in the Commons Monday an export permit for the surplus was sought but not granted. He was questioned by Paul Martin (L—Essex-East) following Washington reports that the Dominican Republic was seeking Canadian jets to bolster its air defenses.

Initial Washington reports were obscure, but from various quarters this story was pieced together:

About a year ago, Fore-Metal Company, a division of Fliteways Incorporated of West Bend, Wis., purchased some 26 of the obsolete RCAF single-seater Vampires at a reported \$24,000—averaging

about \$950 a plane that originally cost the RCAF \$130,000 each.

SHIPPED TO MALTON

The company was slow in taking delivery. About 14 of these were shipped to Genair Limited at Malton Airport near Toronto for storage and reconditioning.

Later the Dominican Republic, headed by Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo, started negotiating for 12 of the Vampires as rebel leader Fidel Castro staged a successful revolt in nearby Cuba. Cuba's ousted president Fulgencio Batista obtained a refuge in the Dominican Republic.

Meanwhile Fliteways officials tried to get Canadian government approval to ship 12 of the Vampires at Malton to the Dominican. The request was turned down. Canadian officials said Canada didn't want to get involved in any new Caribbean flareup.

But the buyer can't take the planes out of the country without an export permit. If taken to the U.S., they can't be moved out of that country to another buyer without an American export permit.

The governments of the two countries co-operate to keep firm control over the trans-shipment of arms.

At Malton, a spokesman for Genair Limited said 12 or 13 of the Vampires have been stored in the company's hangars for an unidentified customer. At Milwaukee, a Fliteways spokesman said the plane brokerage firm bought 14 Vampires from the RCAF.

At Washington a state department spokesman said the U.S. was considering a request for a trans-shipment permit, but no decision has been reached.
