CHINESE GUILTY OF HORRIBLE CRUELTY Towards Their Captives and Wounded

RUSSIANS RETALIATE BY SHOOTING THE NATIVES.

European Garrison at Peking Formally Abandoned

SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.

LONDON, July 5.—The correspondent of The Express at Chefoo, telegraphing on Wednesday, says:

"Admiral Seymour was wounded while sitting in a house at Tien Tsin by the Chinese sharpshooters.

Official news received at Chefoo, shows that the Chinese have been guilty of horrible cruelty towards the wounded and captured, subjecting them to what is known as the Ling Chee, or slicing process. Under this hideous rite the bodies of the fallen have been mutilated.

The Russians are retaliating by wholesale shooting of the natives.

The situation, according to the Express correspondent, shows signs of drifting into barbarism and savagery.

Revolting stories are told of the barbarities practised on the Japanese and European prisoners captured on the way to Peking, though it was not known before that Admiral Seymour had lost any prisoners.

The Chinese troops are marching towards Tien Tsin.

The Chinese say that they left behind them trails of rapine fire and blood. Native women were ravished and children cut in two. Direct tidings from Peking and with the despatch sent by Sir Robert Hart June, 25.

SHANGHAI, July 5.—An attempt to relieve Sir Robert Hart is being pressed.

The European garrison at Peking has been formally abandoned. The admirals have met at Tien Tsin and decided that

the weakness of the allied force left no other course open. This practically leaves the little band in Peking, with the women and children, to their certain doom.

The news has filled the entire European community in China with the bitterness of despair. But there are a few who affirm that any other course is not possible.

The experience which befell Admiral Seymour's force practically decides the question of relief.

It is pointed out that the Chinese had, at that time, in the field only a fraction of the huge force which now cuts off Tien Tsin from the capital.

A CAR HORROR.

More Than Sixty Passengers Killed.

RAILWAY SUBSIDIES.

Heavy Grants to Most of the Provinces.

OTTAWA, July 5.—Hon. Mr. Blair brought down, last night, the railway subsidy bill.

It includes a grant to the Grand Trunk Railway for Victoria bridge, Montreal, of \$360,000 in addition to the previous vote, making \$600,000 in all.

Nepean Point bridge, Ottawa, will have expended upon it \$100,000 additional to \$113,000 given before.

Total amount of subsidies including re-votes, is \$3,493,200, divided by provinces as follows:

Ontario.....	\$1,212,000
Quebec.....	860,000
Nova Scotia.....	401,200
New Brunswick.....	465,000
Western Roads.....	555,000

ACCIDENT LAST NIGHT

Unlighted Manhole on Douglas Street Causes Trouble

An accident that might have been attended with fatal consequences occurred last night about eleven o'clock. While Mr W K Beirsto and a lady friend were driving in from North River, by way of Douglas Street, their horse fell into a manhole between five and six feet deep on the latter street that had been left unlighted and without any covering except a piece of board about five inches wide. The lady was thrown from the carriage into the manhole with the horse, and was rendered insensible. Mr Albert Hale who, with some lady friends, was also coming in from North River, reached the scene shortly after the accident, and rendered all the assistance in his power. Several other men also gave assistance. The horse was removed from the manhole and led out through the sewer trench that was being dug. The lady was removed to a house nearby, and as soon as possible afterwards was taken to her home. Dr. S. R. Jenkins was called in and found her badly shaken up. The horse was also hurt, and the carriage damaged. Too much cannot be taken regarding the lighting of trenches and manholes while work upon the sewers is in progress. Especial care should be taken when the night is dark.
