

Montreal & Mexico Play Scoreless Soccer Contest

MONTREAL (CP)—Cantalia, a Montreal team bolstered by four imports from Argentina, held the highly-favored Mexican national squad to a scoreless draw in an exhibition soccer game Sunday in wind-whipped rain.

Following the game, a scuffle between fans and members of both teams broke out near an exit on the field. A few blows were struck but nothing serious developed. Cause of the fight was not known.

Fernando Mucelli went off midway in the first half; Carlo Ferrari of Argentina, near the end of the first half, and Eugene Vinay, near the end of the game. The fourth Argentine import on the Montreal squad is Roberto Roberto Tesaruro.

TIMELY NOTES ON FUR TOPICS

W. M. Ritchie, chief inspector of furs and grading services at the Canada Department of Agriculture, has cabled from Vienna, Austria, that the Viennese furriers who attended the Canadian fur exhibition there were pleased beyond expectation with the Canadian furs on display.

Upwards of 200 Viennese furriers spent many hours looking over the exhibits at the Hotel Bristol, and many of them returned several times inspecting coats and stylings of the Canadian garments. It is understood that they will place many orders with manufacturers because of this exhibit.

A complaint has been registered with General Motors styling division that metallic threads in auto seat cover upholstery are spreading the abrasion of long-haired furs.

This is being investigated by General Motors, and major producers of metallic threads denied that the threads will cause this abrasive action. A spokesman for the Ford Motor Company styling division said that no complaints had reached them. He added that before any seat fabrics are used, fabrics and furs are tested against them as a standard procedure by both Ford and the thread producer. Chrysler Corporation officials would not comment.

MUTATIONS STRONG
The mink market seems very firm in New York. At the New York Auction Company sale last week an estimated 37,000 Cerpulean regulars were moving at least at a 90 per cent rate, with prices firm to five per cent off from February.

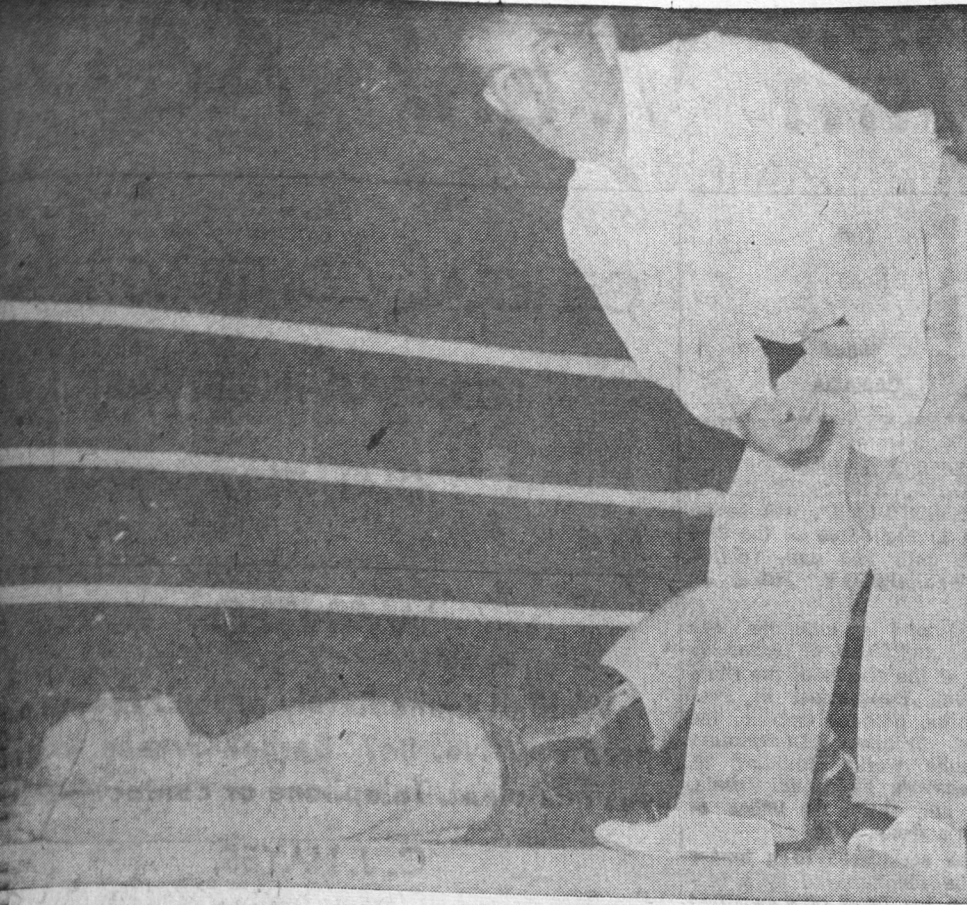
The sales room continued to be amazed at the way mutations had held up during April. Many buyers felt that Sapphires were hold-

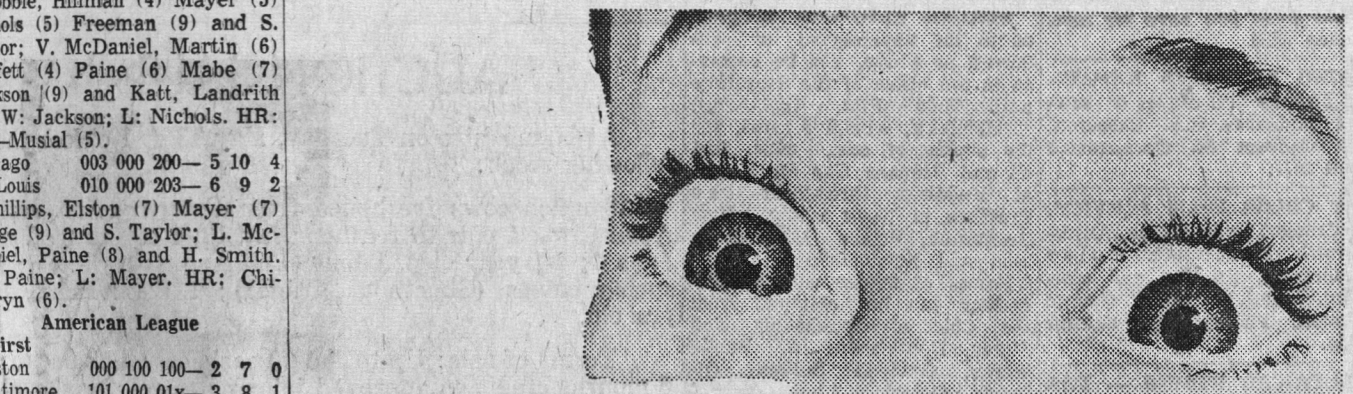

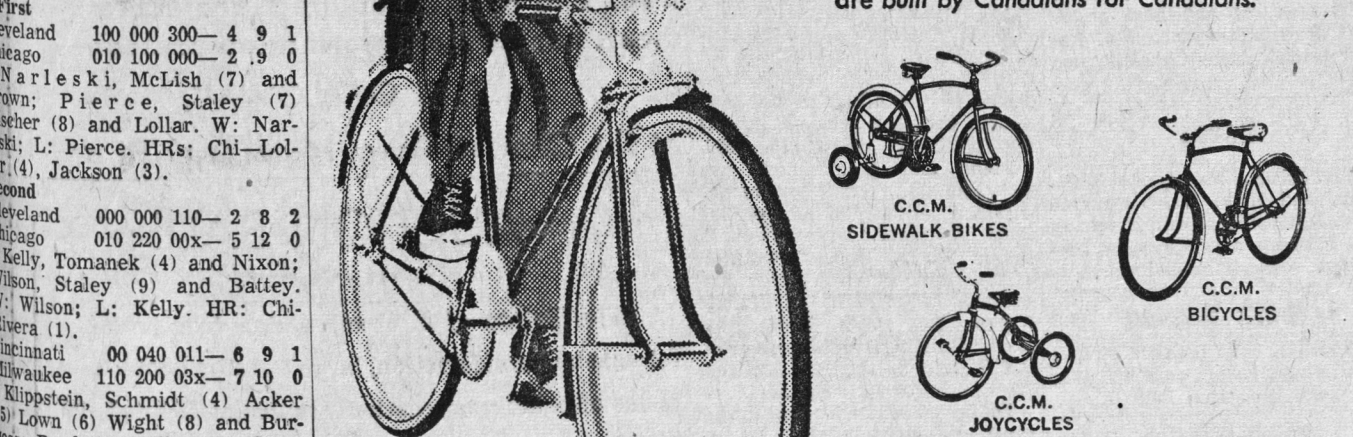
