**Building New Port May Solve Trieste Issue**

By ARTHUR GAVSHON LONDON (AP)—A scheme to build an enclave new Yugoslav port on the Adriatic sea is emerging in behind-the-scenes diplomatic conferences here.

It is only in the talking stage now. But if it jells, it may bring Italy and Yugoslavia together in a solution of their dispute over Trieste, the Adriatic port that both claim.

Since early March, Britain, the United States and Yugoslavia have been holding talks here in search of some solution. The idea is to develop a plan which can be presented to Italy and which Italy can accept.

The scheme emerging takes these broad outlines, according to British and American officials:

1. Yugoslavia has agreed that Italy may have the city and port of Trieste and most of zone A, now occupied by British and American troops.
2. Yugoslavia would keep zone B.
3. In zone B, between Capodistria and Pirano, Britain and the United States would help Yugoslavia build the new port. There was no indication of the cost, but to build any port would take millions of dollars. The U.S. would bear the largest share of the cost.
4. A small part of zone A would revert to Yugoslavia, including the villages of Crevaini and Basovizza in which many Slavs live.
5. Yugoslavia would sponsor Italian membership in a projected military alliance linking the Yugoslavs with Turkey and Greece.

The kernel of the problem has always been the extreme importance of Trieste, economically and strategically, to both Italy and Yugoslavia.

Both countries say they need the port to take in and send out goods in world trading. In addition—a port on the northeast corner of the Adriatic would be invaluable to either country in war.

When the Italian peace treaty was signed after the Second World War, the territory was split. Britain and the U.S. took over control of zone A, bordering defeated Italy. Yugoslavia took over zone B bordering its own territory. The port city of Trieste itself is in zone A. Yugoslavia and other countries now have free access to it.
