Baby Sitter Committed For Mental Examination



Diane Bound, 22, of Scarboro, Ontario, has been committed for psychiatric examination following investigation of the bludgeoning of three-year-old Susan Kellough. The baby's body was found tied to her crib and showed marks of severe beating which resulted in

her death. Hired as a baby-sitter while the parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Kellough, went to work, Miss Bound had been tending two Kellough children for a month as well as several other neighbors' children. She is believed to have consumed liquor shortly before the baby was beaten, police believe, with a beer bottle. Found near the

crib was a note which read: "If I can't have children, you can't have them either." Police found her at the home of a neighbor, Mrs. Frichette, who said the girl had described in detail how the baby was killed. The other Kellough child, 11-months-old Penny, was found unharmed in the house. Diane Bound is shown in three poses.

VICTIM OF NEAR TRAGEDY

"Goldie," an 18-month-old lioness ended an impromptu show in Brantford, Ont., with a vicious attack on 43-year-old Mrs. Herman Smith. Performing before a few spectators in an office building in downtown section of the city, the 250-pound African lioness became attracted to a plastic purse belonging to victim. As she started away with her bag, the lioness lunged at her seized a leg in her mouth causing wounds which required 70 stitches to close



Claiming no knowledge of the tragedy which rocked the western city, Rev. A. C. Valdez, seen above, a faith-healer from Phoenix, Arizona, now in Toronto where he has promised to perform miracles, has reported that he would be glad to return to Winnipeg as a material witness in the murder trial of Mr. and Mrs. Gavin McCullough, "if it would do any good." A short, stocky preacher of the "old-time gospel," Mr. Valdez had recently preached at meetings in Winnipeg, which the McCulloughs had attended. Five days after his departure, their seven-year-old adopted daughter, Martha, was found in her room, beaten to death. It is believed that religious beliefs of the handsome, 35-year-old Pentecost preacher, barnstorming across North America, may have been connected with the slaying, in which the parents, found responsible for the bludgeon-strangulation death of their daughter, tried to "drive the devil out of her."
