PERSONAL. Professor Robertson left for Halifax this morning. Mr. George Stanley, of the firm of Stanley Bros. has returned from his business trip to the Old Country. We are glad to hear that C. C. Carlton, Esq., the popular United States Consul at Souris, who has been laid aside by a severe attack of grippe, has sufficiently recovered to be on foot again. Mrs. Hunt was the guest of Col Moore while in Charlottetown. She left for Summerside this morning and will address a public meeting there to-night. She returns to the city to-morrow forenoon, and will address the Legislature in the afternoon. On the following morning she will leave for Nova Scotia. Much regret is felt on account of Rev. John McKay no longer able, on account of ill-health, to continue his revival services at Souris. The day of the intended series of meetings was held on Monday evening. On Thursday following, Mr. McKay, who had contracted a severe cold during his protracted labors at Summerside, was unable to preach, and finding himself quite ill, determined to return to his home in Boston. While in Souris he made a very favorable impression upon his auditors, and a wish was expressed that he should return at an early date. Rev. Messrs. Cameron and Goulet are now carrying on the good work begun by the evangelist. The people we said to be much interested. Good is expected to follow the special efforts now being put forth there. On the 9th ult., Bishop Quinlan, of Tennessee, ordained Mr. George Walter Honeysy, M. D., and Mr. Henry Alex. Hartley, D. D., as deacons of the Episcopal Church. Both were formerly Methodist ministers—the former having been Secretary of the Nova Scotia Conference of the A. M. E. Church, and the latter a member of the Methodist School and principal of one of the public schools in Nashville for many years. The Rev. Eugene Johnson, lately one of the most popular and successful of Congregational ministers, is now a candidate for Orders in the same diocese. The Rev. William Evans, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Baltimore, author of "Why I am a Lutheran," was ordained in Holy Trinity Church, New York, on the 16th ult. On the Sunday previous to this he preached his farewell sermon to his old congregation and gave as his reason for taking this step, that having made a careful and diligent study of holy scriptures, and ancient church history, he could not possibly (such as it cost him to make the change) see any other course to take. Bishop Whaler confirmed 96 persons at the Church of the Covenant, Philadelphia, on the 23rd ult. more than one half of whom were reared outside the Episcopal Church.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

SUPPLEMENTARIES PASSED.

Mr. Foster Unwell.

OTTAWA, April 6. In the House of Commons yesterday, the item of \$95,000 towards appropriation passed on vote. Five thousand dollars are appropriated for the World's Exposition at Chicago. Mr. Carling said that this sum was a small preliminary grant, given to permit the Canadian Commissioner to go on with his arrangements. The Government, he said, had asked the Provincial Governments to unite with the Dominion, so as to make the Canadian exhibit worthy of the Dominion. All supplementaries were passed, after which a long discussion ensued on the Customs Act in regard to seizures. Hon. G. E. Foster is unwell, and, as a result, the Opposition have postponed the motion with reference to Canada's right to make her own commercial treaties.

Horse Thieves Arrested.

LYNN, Mass., April 6. The police here have arrested F. H. Saborn and Morris L. Oliver for extensive robberies of horses, carriages, etc. The men hired a stable at South Boston and furnished it with horses, etc., which they stole throughout the State.

Big Strike in New York.

NEW YORK, April 6. A big strike has been inaugurated by the building trades. Four thousand five hundred men have quit work. The fight is against the Peiman Hot Heating Co., who are charged with employing non-union men.

Attempted Fires at Mt. Allison.

SACKVILLE, April 6. The recent attempts to set fire to one of the Mt. Allison College buildings have been traced to a theological student who is suffering from temporary mental derangement.

Murders His Wife.

LAWRENCE, Mass., April 6. Peter Ego, a brakeman on the Boston and Maine Railway, murdered his wife on the public street yesterday. He is a worthless fellow.

Newfoundland Fisheries.

LONDON, April 6. The British and Newfoundland Governments have agreed to prolong the moratorium with regard to the Newfoundland fisheries over the present season.

A Defaulter Arrested.

OTTAWA, April 6. Paquin, the defaulting assistant postmaster at Hull, Ont., has been arrested at San Francisco. He will be extradited.

Blake May Re-Enter Parliament.

TORONTO, April 6. The Toronto World says that it is accorded an excellent authority that Edward Blake is willing to re-enter Parliament.

New Brunswick Man Drowned.

CAHAIS, Me., April 6. Herbert Puck, a native of New Brunswick, was drowned here yesterday.
