Ladies In Waiting Are From Norfolk And Surrey

The Countess of Leicester, Lady-in-waiting to Her Majesty, in March 1933. Her husband, the 5th Earl, was secretary to the late King George V. and extra enquiry to him during his reign in 1901. Her husband's title was conferred on her by Queen Elizabeth since her accession.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN FIRST Led To Unhappy Results

NEW YORK (AP) — Two psychologists here said that women and children first had been the victims of a disaster at first hand study are Dr. Paul Friedman, of the New York Institute of Psychiatry, and Dr. Luis Lin of Mount Sinai Hospital here.

"They both were aboard the liner Le De France, which took aboard 1,000 passengers and 1,000 children from the sinking liner following its Atlantic collision last year with the Swedish motorship Stockholm.

"The two psychologists presented their observations and conclusions in an article in the American Journal of Psychiatry.

"The application of the women and children first principle on the liner De France resulted in some poignant and tragic separations of parents from their children," the psychiatrists asserted.

"It can be said that this principle was applied in a most unfortunate way during catastrophes, possibly distressing in isolation of parents from their children," the psychiatrists who made the study are Dr. Paul Friedman, of the New York Institute of Psychiatry, and Dr. Luis Lin of Mount Sinai Hospital here.
