She sailed from there on Tuesday, and was again obliged to return on account of the strong easterly gale. On Wednesday morning she sailed again, and reached Halifax on Wednesday night, and left for this port on Thursday morning. Captain Hallett reports that while passing Little Hope Light, he saw an unknown wreck on the rocks a little below the lighthouse. She was in a most dangerous position. THE NEW ARCHBISHOP OF HALIFAX.

Rev. Dr. O'Brien, of Indian River, Appointed.

MONTREAL, Nov. 11.

A cablegram from Rome, received yesterday, announces the appointment of Rev. Cornelius O'Brien, D. D., of Indian River, to the Archbishopric of the Diocese vacated by the death of Archbishop Hannan.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

BOSTON, Nov. 9.

The vote of Massachusetts, with only one town to hear from, gives Butler (Dem) 13,292 plurality.

In New Hampshire the returns from all towns but eleven give Hale (Rep.) about 275 plurality. Both Republican Congressmen are elected.

In Connecticut the Democrats elect the Governor by 5,000 plurality.

Hon. P. A. Collins, (Dem.), ex-President of the Irish Land League, has been elected to Congress from the Fourth Massachusetts District.

The Democrats captured the Eight District, New York from the Republicans. Mr. John J. Adams brother of Hon. Michael Adams, of Newcastle, defeated the Republican candidate, Russell. Gen. McCook (Rep.) was last representative of the district.

ALBANY, N. Y. Nov. 9.

The Evening Journal estimates Cleveland's majority at 190,000. It gives 85 Democrats and 43 Republicans in the next Congress.

LONDON, Nov. 9.

The Daily News says President Arthur's administration will be seriously hampered by the Democratic success. It is more than probable that a wish to thus tie his hands led many of his supporters in 1880, to oppose him now. The rebuke thus given to the President and his friends was thoroughly well deserved.

In the Commons, this afternoon, Mr. Gladstone said that the object of Lord Dufferin's mission to Egypt is to conduct necessary negotiations with the Egyptian Government. No machinery exists, he said, by which the Egyptian people could be consulted with regard to their future government.

CAIRO, Nov. 9.

Lord Dufferin, to-day, had four hours' conference with Cherif Pacha, Egyptian Prime Minister.

BANGOR, ME., Nov. 9.

At the annual meeting of the International Railway Company, of Maine, held to-day, the election of officers resulted in the choice of the following directors:—J. H. Pope, of Ottawa, Ont.; W. B. Ives, of Sherbrooke, P. Q.; D. E. McFee, of Sherbrooke; Noah Woods, E. R. Burpee and F. A. Wilson, of Bangor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.

Herbert Spencer, the English philosopher, was tendered a complimentary dinner, to-night, by over 200 prominent gentlemen, at which the Hon. Wm. Everts presided.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.

Ex-President Pierola, of Peru, arrived here last night from Europe.

The Herald this morning has a leader of two columns on cable masters, in which it says that "a new cable is going to be laid, and that messages will be going through it next summer." The Herald also has an editorial on the "collection of news," in which it states that at a meeting of the New York Associated Press yesterday, it offered a resolution that the Western press, the New England press, the New York State press, and Philadelphia and Baltimore press associations be admitted to membership in the associated press, but the resolution was voted down.

LONDON, Nov. 9.

The News' Madrid correspondent says Spain and England, before the ratification of the extradition treaty in 1879, always surrendered each other's criminals. The Gibraltar police authorities seem to have waived all extradition formalities by the immediate surrender, when the Spanish Consul notified them that fugitive Cubans were men he wanted, and then pretended that they had expelled the fugitives from Gibraltar because the strict regulations forbade the admittance of suspicious persons. After the recapture of other political prisoners on African stations they were treated with great severity, and Mao and his fellow prisoners were maltreated at Cuba.

CAIRO, Nov. 9.

Traders from Soudan report that El Obeid, which the False Prophet has been besieging, has been relieved.

LONDON, Nov. 9.

The Daily News' Constantinople correspondent telegraphs it has been decided that all letters emanating from the palace found in Arabi's possession shall be declared written without authority.

The Standard's Constantinople correspondent says the Russian acting Consul General in Eastern Roumania is now at open warfare with Aleks Pacha, Governor General of the Province, for no other reason than that the latter is endeavoring to govern the country in the spirit in which it was intended he should carry out the decisions of the Berlin Congress, irrespective of the particular interests of any one power. Forty-eight deaths occurred in Mecca from cholera up to October 29th.
