## Island Farmers Rush Potato, Grain Harvest

Potato and grain harvesting occupied the attention of most island farmers last week, with most of them in the fields every available hour.

Harvesting progress was the best this week, since the job started, although many farmers still have a great deal of work to do. Many grain crops are still being cut in the field, with nothing done at this late October date, and there are not enough machines to go around.

An operator from Abney, near Murray's River, who was harvesting grain crops there Friday, said he has orders for 400 acres of grain still to be done. If the weather holds long enough, the man with a 10-foot cut on his machine, can harvest approximately 15 acres per day, it was said. Earlier in the season, when days were slightly longer, he said the combine could handle 20 acres per day.

So long as the weather holds good, most grain farmers are not worrying about the delay. The grain is getting harder and firmer every day, a Wood Islands farmer said Friday.

It's still waiting for the arrival of a combine harvester.

Potatoes are being harvested all over the province, with many people giving priority to the spud crop because the tubers are so susceptible to frost damage. Good crops were reported from most parts of the province, and harvesting operations have been completed on some farms in western Prince County, it was learned here.

This autumn saw the use of horse-drawn machinery being revived where it was still available, in places where the tractor was too wet or too soft to use heavy machinery. But in many places there are no binders left—none has been built for a half-dozen years—A number of new parts are no longer available for them, a prominent machinery dealer said here this week.

## 75 Sought As Liner Is Lost

ROERVIK, Norway (AP)—A Norwegian coastal liner with 90 persons reported aboard rushed Sunday night it was abandoned ship in stormy seas off Norway's north coast. A light-house keeper reported early today that 75 survivors reached his island.

Two other lifeboats said to have been launched by the liner were still missing.

The coastal express liner St. Svithun reported it had gone aground at 9:40 p.m. Sunday night near Grinda light house about 30 miles south of here. Then, 30 minutes later it reported it had come clear by its own engines.

But a dramatic emergency call shortly afterward said three life boats had been launched and crew and passengers were abandoning ship.

According to Jobs Aarberg, passenger manager of the owners, Stavanger Steamship Company, the ship carried a crew of 45 and about 45 passengers. The southbound express liner Sigurd Jari left Roerвик immediately and rushed to the scene followed by a few other cargo ships and a score of fishing vessels.

After searching the area around the light house they reported there was no sign of the liner or its other two life boats. Gale winds and reduced visibility hampered the search.

## Nuclear Plane Crash Said Almost Disaster

WASHINGTON (AP)—Dr. Ralph E. Lapp, a nuclear physicist, said Saturday the state of North Carolina had a close call last year from a jetted nuclear bomb that packed a potential wallop of 24,000,000 tons of TNT.

The defence department declined to affirm or deny Lapp's report.

In a book published Sunday, Lapp, who is not connected with the government's atomic program, says: "Nuclear weapons have been involved in about a dozen major incidents or accidents, mostly plane crashes, both in the United States and overseas."

"In one of these incidents a B-52 bomber had to jettison a 24-megaton bomb over North Carolina. The bomb fell in a field without exploding.

"The defence department has adopted complex devices and strict rules to prevent the accidental arming or firing of nuclear weapons. In this case the 24-megaton war head was equipped with eight interlocking safety mechanisms, all of which had to be triggered in sequence to explode the bomb.

That election, fought over federal grants to the province, saw Mr. Hollett defeated. He was later appointed to the Senate.

In this election Mr. Smallwood will be candidate in Bonaville North for the fourth time. The riding elected him to his first term of office.

ment said the presidential order banning American cargoes to ships which transport Communist goods to Cuba will be issued in a few days. A spokesman said a delay in proclaiming the order was caused by a need "to clean up the legal language in the order."

Kennedy cut short his week-end political swing through western states and though his physician said this was because of a presidential cold, the Post linked the sudden return of the president to the mysterious Caribbean developments.

Adding to speculation was the sudden cancellation of a Friday business trip by State Secretary Rusk and reports that Defence Secretary McNamara had ordered his joint chiefs of staff send other military leaders to remain in Washington for daily consultations for the next six weeks.

The Pentagon said this was for the purpose of preparing a new five-year defence plan involving decisions on providing faster planes and more equipment for the military force.

ROME (AP)—Railway workers in the Italian area of central Italy struck Saturday, disrupting the entire national railway network. The 24-hour strike was one of a series of the Italian state railways, whose employees are seeking improved wages.
