## Youth Convicted In Assault Case

Alban Luce, 17, of Summerside, was convicted in police court Wednesday of assaulting Ronald Culleton, Summerside, by striking him over the head with a bottle on the evening of April 21 and was remanded for sentence by Magistrate Richard S. Hinton, Q.C., until Monday, at the request of crown prosecutor George R. McMahon, who stated there may be more serious charge laid against Luce.

It has been learned that the charges involve a criminal assault on a Charlottetown woman while she was visiting Summerside on the weekend of April 21.

The complainant Ronald (Bud) Culleton testified that Luce came into Town Taxi stand on the night of April 21st with his right hand covered with blood. He took off his coat and wanted to fight, witness stated

after calling him an obscene name. Culleton said he told him to come back tomorrow and he'd fight him then.

## Death Denies Long Ambition

MELBOURNE (AP) — Austrian bricklayer Johan Braun, 66, waited eight years to achieve his ambition of seeing his only grandson again.

He worked hard to save money for the fares to take him and his wife to Australia to see Herbert Zimmer, 11, who migrated with his parents Steven and Elizabeth Zimmer eight years ago.

But the reunion turned to sorrow Monday. Braun collapsed and died as the liner Sydney was only 50 yards from the pier at Melbourne. Braun was so anxious to leave the ship that he had one suitcase ready near the gangway when the ship was 200 yards from the pier. He dashed below to get another and collapsed on his way back upstairs. Before the ship's doctor could be reached Braun died.

Mrs. Braun now will make her home in Australia.

## Ancient Cosmetics Factory Found

JERUSALEM (AP) — What may be the remains of a cosmetics factory of 2,500 years ago has been discovered near Ein Gedi, an Israeli settlement on the western shores of the Dead Sea.

Prof. Benyamin Mazar, Hebrew University archeologist who led an expedition in the area, told reporters here barrel-sized jars of a design never found here before and small gracefully shaped perfume jars discovered nearby tend to substantiate the assumption that at least some of the buildings unearthed were used for the manufacture of balsam, one of the most precious perfumes of the ancient world.

Also found were iron tools: seals and jar handles with Hebrew inscriptions, weights, fragments of scales, and an alabaster ointment vessel imported from Egypt, and Cypro-Phoenician pottery.

The find was only a part of Ein Gedi's industrial centre, Mazar said. The archeologists discovered signs of a whole industrial quarter that flourished at the time of King Josiah, the last great king of Judah, who lived from 638 to 608 B.C.

## Britain Repays Loan From Fund

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain has repaid the equivalent of \$70,000,000 in West German marks, \$20,000,000 in Canadian funds, and \$15,000,000 in Belgian francs.

The latest repayment comprised \$35,000,000 in West German marks, \$20,000,000 in Canadian funds, and \$15,000,000 in Belgian francs. Britain drew \$1,500,000,000 in various currencies from the fund early last August.
