The Parnell Commission.

The Parnell Commission re-assembled on Tuesday. Attorney General Webster asked the Court to inspect the books of the League in the keeping of the Hibernian, National and Munster Banks...

Sir Walter Phillimore, counsel for the Hibernian Bank, contended that the commission had no power to compel the production of the books.

Presiding Justice Hannen said he would not discuss the question. If the bank, under the color of protecting the privacy of their clients, obstructed the orders of the court, their court would be constrained to put its power into force.

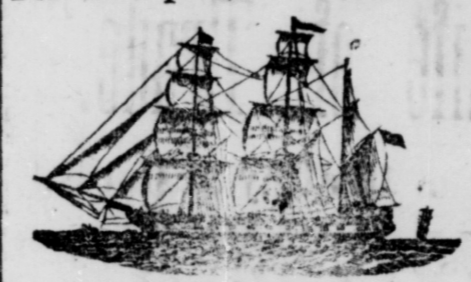
