A FEW QUESTIONS.

The Patriot of last evening placed in its editorial column a quotation from a speech of Lord Dufferin concerning the Civil Service of Canada, in the course of which are these words:

"If you take my advice, you will never allow your civil service to be degraded into an instrument to subserve the ends and interests of any political party. The success of a political party ought to depend upon its public policy and the ability of its chiefs, and not upon the advantage likely to accrue to its individual adherents. In fact, the more the area of personal profit consequent upon a change of Government is limited, the better for the country at large."

The Patriot, we may presume, approves this advice, fatal as it is to the claims, pretensions and expectations of the Liberal party office-seeking adherents. If the Patriot approves these words of Lord Dufferin, why does it not emphatically condemn the Dominion Government's dismissal of men employed on our railway and other public works—some of whom have served the country long and faithfully and some of whom have large families dependent upon them—and the appointment of Liberal party heelers in their places? If the success of a political party ought to depend upon its public policy, why do we continually see the power of the Liberal party employed to advance and retain little Liberal politicians because they have stood by the party. A short time ago Messrs Currie and Gallant, of this Province, were appointed to the Lobster Commission, though it is safe to say that neither of them knows much more about a lobster than a lobster knows about *pons asinorum*. A few days ago, we called attention to the fact that a man many times convicted for violation of the Canada Temperance Act had been appointed to fill a Dominion office in King's County. This man is also a notorious Liberal partisan who has by reason of his persistent violation of the law, lost the respect of all men of temperance and honor residing in his vicinity. You have been singled out of all the residents of King's County for Government preferment to the office of Surveyor of Shipping. But the Patriot, quoting with approval Lord Dufferin's remark that "the success of a political party ought to depend upon its public policy and the ability of its chiefs and not upon the advantage likely to accrue to its individual adherents," says not one word in condemnation of the appointment of this notorious law breaker. Every act of a government ought to be defensible. We ask the Patriot to defend, if it can, the recent appointment of John Gow Scrimgeour. Why, too, has not the Guardian had something to say concerning the honor and distinction that has been bestowed by Sir Louis Davies and his colleagues in the cabinet upon a many-times convicted violator of the Canada Temperance Act? Announcement of the appointment was made several days ago. If John Gow Scrimgeour were a Conservative electioneer, and if had been appointed by a Conservative administration, the Guardian would have had something to say about the matter long ere this. It is to be feared that the Guardian's regard for temperance and morality is deeply tintured by desire to serve and toady to the party power. We ask The Guardian to say whether or not the appointment of John Gow Scrimgeour is defensible, or in accordance with the principles laid down by Lord Dufferin and editorially approved by the Patriot as those which ought to govern the public service of the country.

OUT OF STEP.

The Winnipeg Tribune (Liberal) edited by Mr Richardson, M. P., has been charged with being out of step with Western Liberals. To this The Tribune replies:—"If it is being 'out of step with western Liberals' to protest against the failure to meet our expectations on the tariff, then is the Tribune 'out of step.'"

"If it is out of step with western Liberals to ask for economy in the administration of public affairs, then is the Tribune 'out of step.'"

"If it is out of step with the western Liberals to call for an investigation into official crookedness in the Yukon and to insist on a sweep in the Yukon in the interests of the government itself if malfeasance is proved, then is the Tribune out of step."

"It is out of step with western Liberals to protest in the name of Liberalism against any alliance, real or imaginary, between the C. P. R. and the Liberal party, then is the Tribune out of step."

"If it is 'out of step with western Liberals to insist upon knowing why the C. P. R. Company handed over a property valued at upwards of a hundred thousand dollars to the Minister of the Interior and to demand in the name of Liberalism what was the quid pro quo, then is the Tribune 'out of step.'"

"If it is 'out of step with western Liberals' to desire that the platform laid down by the party before taking office should, as far as possible, be carried out in office, then is the Tribune 'out of step.'"

We fancy that a good many Liberals in the East as well as in the West are "out of step" with the Liberal Administration upon these points.
