During the coming week the Prince Edward Island Diocesan Board of the Anglican Women's Auxiliary will be hostesses to two representatives of the National Association of Girls Clubs from Great Britain, Miss Ann Meadows and Miss Marjorie Howells, both from Wales.

They will be house guests of Mrs. George Wood, P.E.I. Diocesan W.A. president.

Through the sponsorship of the Hon. Vera Grenfell in Britain and Mrs. Philip Carlington of Quebec, Dominion Girls Auxiliary secretary, ten members of the Association will be in Canada for several weeks. Separating into groups of two they are visiting different parts of Canada to see places of historic interest, business activities and manufacturing centres.

At the end of their travels they will spend two weeks with 100 members of the Anglican G.A.s in camp at Camp Pontiac, near Ottawa. As the National Association of Girls Clubs numbers 134,000 members, in England, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales and as they are all Business girls one can imagine the value of their visit as far as Canadian Youth is concerned.

In the last few years, several Canadian G.A.s have been guests of the Association and taken during the Coronation and taken to such cultural centres as Stratford-on-Avon, Edinburgh Festival, Oxford, Cambridge and attended services at St. Pauls and Canterbury Cathedrals. This visit has been a project of the Dominion board of the W.A. with the assistance of the diocesan boards.
