Summerside Rotarians were hosts last evening to representatives from the Summerside churches, the various service clubs, the Summerside High School supervisor, the Canadian Legion and Department of Physical Fitness, all meeting together in a round table discussion on the problem of juvenile delinquency in Summerside.

The object of last night's open meeting was to get the views of the leaders of all these organizations as to the best means to be adopted in combating juvenile delinquency and to provide for the future welfare of the youth of the town.

In welcoming the representatives last evening, the president of Rotary, Mr. Alan Holman, said that it was the opinion of some that the town and the various organizations are already doing too much for the children while others held the opposite view.

Major Henry W. Wedge stated that in his opinion juvenile delinquency in Summerside had decreased in the past years due to some extent to the fact that the churches have provided recreational facilities for their own youth in their own church halls. Service clubs too, he said, were doing a great work.

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real basis for assuming that the Communists will not negotiate in good faith.

Gen. Nam Il, Korean head of the Communist truce team, did not slam the door on any compromise. In his closing statement Monday he declared:

"The attainment of the negotiations depends upon the efforts of both sides."

So far the Allies and the Communists have outlined their positions on the prisoner exchange problem. There appeared to be ample room for compromise.

These were the three major differences:
1. No specific nation has been named by the Reds to supervise the estimated 50,000 Communist prisoners who have said they will reject direct repatriation home.

Switzerland, proposed by the UN command, was turned down by the Communists.

2. Whether prisoners refusing direct return home shall be moved out of Korea. The Allies contend it would be simpler and speedier to turn them over to the control of a neutral state without moving them from Korea. The Reds want to move them to a neutral country.

3. How long after an armistice is signed must balking captives remain in stockades before their fate is settled? The Allies say 60 days is long enough. The Red plan stretched out to at least nine months-including six months or longer in the neutral state.

"Since the introduction of our 1953 models in early December," said Mr. Sale, "dealers' sales of new and used cars have month by month exceeded those of any similar period in our history."

"Unless we encounter some wholly unforeseen circumstances, we should wind up 1953 with another production and sales record."

Unfortunately, we can see no prospects of any substantial improvements in the overseas markets for some time to come. We still are fenced in by import controls imposed by all our traditional customer countries.

To Use Scoudouc Air Base This Summer

OTTAWA, (CP) - The wartime air base at Scoudouc, N.B., near Moncton, will be operating headquarters for the 31st support group of the Royal Canadian Navy this summer, defence headquarters announced Monday.

The group, now flying its 20 Sea Fury and Avenger aircraft from H.M.C.S. Shearwater at Dartmouth, N.S., will move to the New Brunswick base this summer because of increased air activity at the Shearwater base.
