Moncton Town Council induces the establishing of a sugar refinery at Moncton, by adopting the following resolution a few evenings ago:

Resolved, That any Company formed for the purpose of refining and manufacture of Sugar in the town of Moncton shall be exempt from all taxes on the capital stock, income, or real estate of said Company for the space of ten years; and

Further Resolved, That a bonus equal to the school taxes be organized when said Company or Co-partnership Company is in course of formation.
