## City Vocational Institute Fees Criticized By NES Committee

Discussion surrounded the effect of fees charged at the grade nine and 10 level for students taking the varied courses at the Charlottetown Vocational Institute, when the local improvement advisory committee met at the Charlottetown office of the National Employment Service.

The committee, composed of representatives from employer and employee associations, was addressed by J. H. MacLellan, principal of the Charlottetown Vocational Institute. Mr. MacLellan discussed the courses available for those wishing to take vocational training.

The committee felt the fees charged at the grade nine and 10 level often penalized or excluded those pupils who were in greatest need of assistance; also the transportation problem for city students attending the vocational school.

The need was mentioned for the training of waitresses, who have more direct contact with tourists than any other group of workers, also the possible health inspection of all those engaged in the preparation and service of food for the public.

## Old Wood Islands Ferry Suffering Inglorious End

The Charles A. Dunning, formerly a Northumberland Ferry Ltd. ferry at Wood Islands, was reported to have broken adrift Tuesday between Prince Edward Island and the Cape Breton shore, when being towed from Pictou, N.S. to Sydney, N.S. to be scrapped.

She was being towed by the tug Eugene Roy of the Maritime Dredging Company Ltd., Charlottetown.

It was reported by department of transport superintendent of lights at Charlottetown, Fred G. Osborne, that the Dunning was believed adrift in heavy south-southwest winds and seas from 1948 to 1951, when it was reported Thursday night by L. E. Weller, Jr., of Maritime Dredging, that the Eugene Roy tried unsuccessfully Wednesday to get a line aboard the Dunning, and further efforts were hampered by bad weather.

The Charles A. Dunning was sold by Northumberland Ferry Ltd. to Pictou, N.S. interests last July, and later sold to a company in Sydney for scrap, it was reported.

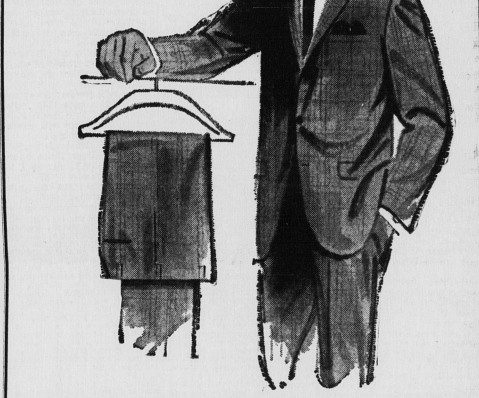
