

Fishermen Are Catchless On 2nd Day Of Tourney

WEDGEPORT, N.S. (CP) — Opening day scores held good as the 14th international tuna cup match passed by its halfway mark here Thursday.

Twenty-one fishing craft picked their way through dense fog to reach port. None flew the familiar white success flag.

As a result Mexico continued its lead with 855 points collected for the 655-pound bluefin landed on opening day by Juan de Dios de la Torre. Cuba holds second place with 585 points allotted to the 485-pound specimen boosted by Gonzalvo Nunez Wednesday morning.

The Mexicans and Cubans split the 200-point bonus allowed daily for most fish. Each team drew a point per pound of fish caught and Mexico gained an extra 200 points because it had the larger

prize.
SCORING PATTERN
That's the scoring pattern that rules throughout the tournament which ends Saturday afternoon. At that time there will be extra bonuses to the team showing most fish for the series and the largest single catch.

Thursday's fishing produced one brief period of action and there was no emergency development. Mexico's Rogelio Arreola hooked a tuna at 9:13 a.m. and lost it 15 minutes later. He was unable to estimate the weight.

The 110-foot yacht Nellie D bearing a party of women sightseers ran aground at Earl Rock, a ledge about six miles from here.

Radioed messages from the Nellie D quickly brought committee and pressboats to the scene. The sightseeing party composed

of about 20 wives of anglers and press representatives was safely evacuated to a nearby island. No one was injured in the mishap.
45-DEGREE LIST
By late afternoon the Nellie D was listing at a 45-degree angle and reported to be taking a little water. Owner Donald Raymond of nearby Yarmouth said he thought the craft suffered no serious damage and would be refloated at high tide.

Anglers again reported sighting tuna but not in the numbers seen Wednesday.

Fog billowed over Soldiers Rip and Lobster Bay, the two centres of international competition, most of the day. Committee boats had a tough time keeping track of the scattered fleet but despite rumors of another strike the final roundup showed Rogelio Arreola's brief battle was the only one of the day.

Dick Hutton, the Tulsa, Okla., wrestler kept his \$1,000 last night by defeating rugged Jack Pesek (the man who thought he could do it) in their best two out of three fall match at the Sports Arena.

In the semi-final, a tag-team affair, Tony Baillargeon, the Quebec strong man, and his partner Len Hughes defeated the rough tough team of Bull Montana and Maurice Vachon.

Hutton kept the match going by constantly going out under the ropes to escape the wrath of Pesek who got the best of the match despite Hutton's using of illegal tactics.

Hutton won the first fall by battering Pesek around the ring and then giving him a body slam. Pesek came back strong in the second fall and in a matter of seconds had Hutton down for the count.

The third and final fall was won by Hutton after about six minutes of wrestling when he caught Pesek in his famous abdominal stretch.

The tag-team match was the most exciting as well as the roughest match of the night and kept the large crowd that was in attendance booing and cheering for the best part of an hour.

Almost as soon as the match had begun Montana and Vachon started using their punching power to its best advantage.

Baillargeon after taking a lot of punishment finally tagged Len Hughes and it took the experienced matman only a few minutes to pin Vachon and win the first fall.

Montana and Vachon won the second fall of the match by again using illegal tactics. The top rope of the ring came loose during their struggles and Vachon as well as Montana used the iron buckle on the end of the rope to beat Hughes and Baillargeon to the mat. Vachon had no trouble at all in pinning Hughes to even the match.

Baillargeon won the third fall from Montana by twisting him over his head in an airplane spin.

While the spin was going on Vachon leaped into the ring only to be met by Montana's flying feet as Baillargeon spun Montana for the final time before hurling him to the floor and holding him down while referee Fred Hayter counted three.

Vachon and Montana got into a fight over whose fault it was they lost the match and were soon slugging it out, much to the delight of the crowd, in front of the dressing rooms. The fight ended when Vachon made a mad rush at Montana and crashed in to the boards head-first. While Vachon lay stunned on the floor Montana retreated to the safety of his dressing room.

Good Wrestling Card Last Night

The wrestling card at Civic Stadium last night attracted a crowd of about 1,000 and featured some of the most rugged action seen in Summerside this summer. Particularly good was the bout between "Pirate" Roy LeBoeuf and Reggie Siki with the latter a rousing favorite.

The drop-kicking of Bernier Fortin was unusually spectacular in the tag match, the french canadian bowling over two opponents twice in rapid succession. The referee, Paul Richard, was colorful, and was involved in the tumbles about a quarter of the time. The ladies, Jackie Burke and Yvonne Eric, were crowd pleasing and when Eric heard the ref give the decision to Burke, she promptly tossed him out of the ring. The weight-lifting of Geraldine Baillargeon impressed the crowd. No one answered her challenge to either men or women to come in the ring and duplicate her feats of strength. Her decidedly attractive appearance added to the act.

Bob Bedard Wins Second Round Of Invitation Tourney

TORONTO (CP)—Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., this year's Canadian champion, Thursday defeated Kurt Neilsen of Denmark, 6-6, 1-6, 6-1, in the second round of the men's singles in the international invitation tournament.

The match was postponed Wednesday night after two sets when it got dark and a broken light bulb could not be replaced.

Bedard is the only Canadian still surviving in the men's singles. Neilsen, 1957 United States indoor champion, was seeded fourth in the tournament.

Bedard, who Wednesday led Neilsen in the first set but tired in the second, Thursday forced the game all the way, rushed the net and smashed everything within reach.

Neilsen trailed all the way. He didn't even look warmed up at the end.

Luis Ayala of Chile, seeded third, was also defeated by an unseeded player, Whitney Reed of Alameda, Calif., 1-6, 7-5, 6-4.

Reed trailed Ayala in the first set and in the second up to 5-5. He came back from 4-1 in the second set.

Braves Defeat Dodgers 2-1

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Rookie Danny McDevitt whose wildness dimmed a great pitching performance put the deciding run on base with a walk in the ninth inning Thursday night and Del Crandall drove the runner home as the National League leading Milwaukee Braves defeated Brooklyn Dodgers 2-1.

McDevitt had held the Braves on only two hits until the ninth when he walked Johnny Logan. The second major argument of the game developed as Wes Covington came to bat and hit into what appeared to be a double play. McDevitt had started his delivery, and Covington appeared to step out of the box, but the pitcher came through and Covington rapped a bouncer to second base for what appeared to be the twin out. However, umpire Dusty Boggess had called for a time out, and the play was nullified.

Covington came back with a single to send Logan to third, and after Nippy Jones, batting for Del Rice, had forced Covington, Crandall smashed a single into right scoring Logan. It was only the fourth hit off McDevitt.

STRETCHED LEAD
The victory stretched Milwaukee's first place hold over the idle second-place St. Louis Cardinals to five games and dropped

the third-place Dodgers eight games back. It was only Milwaukee's third victory in eight games.

McDevitt staked the Dodgers to a new National League mound, staff strike out record in the second as he fanned the side. Andy Pafko was hit first victim, equalling the old mark of 817 set by the Dodgers in 1953. The rookie fanned seven more to push the new standard to 824. He also fanned the side in the eighth.

The major league record of 896 strikeouts was set by Detroit in the American League in 1946.

Brooklyn missed a scoring chance in the fourth as Neal singled and Roy Campanella and McDevitt walked to fill the bases and send Buhl to the showers. Bob Trowbridge took the mound for Milwaukee. However, a freak double play that produced a big argument retired the side.

Junior Gillimas' line drive to right was dropped by Pafko, who threw to second where Red Schoendienst tagged out Campanella who had failed to go to third in the force situation and returned to stand on second. Then Schoendienst stepped on second to force Neal and produce both ends of the double out at second. Neal crossed the plate on the play, but after a conference umpires refused to allow the run.
