Lord Rosebery was the recipient on Tuesday of the freedom of the city of Bristol, where he afterwards unveiled a statue of Edmund Burke. In speaking of the eminent statesman, author and writer, the Premier attributed his greatness of character to the fact that he loved reform and hated revolution. Politicians, he said, would derive a great deal of consolation from studying his life. Edmund Burke did not rise to the occupancy of high office and had not lived to see the fruits of his efforts, but success and fame followed.

Maurice Swaley is Vicar, a memorial tablet and window were lately unveiled to the memory of the late Bishop Melley, Metropolitan of Canada. The tablet bears the inscription: "To the memory of the Most Reverend John Melley, D. D., 1st Bishop of Fredericton, 1845-1892, Metropolitan of Canada, 1879-1892. Born 1805. Died at Fredericton, New Brunswick, Sept. 1892, in the 88th year of his age, and the 48th of his Episcopate. He was Vicar of St. Thomas with Exwick, and incumbent of Oldfield, 1838-1845. Prelate of Exeter Cathedral, 1842-5. An unflinching friend to the poor. To him Exwick owed the erection of its free and open Church, Oldfield the enlargement and restoration of its Chapel, and this Church many of its fairest adornments. Erected by Parishioners and Friends, October, 1894." The Archbishop of Ontario and Canon Brigstocke, of St. John, were present and took part in the ceremony of unveiling.

PETER McNAUGHTON'S SAD DEATH.

He Was Reading in Bed and Fell Asleep Leaving the Lamp Burning. The mortal remains of Mr. P. P. McNaughton, whose sad and premature death at Moncton was referred to in yesterday's issue of THE EXAMINER, will arrive here tonight and will be met at the train by a deputation from the Ancient Order of Hibernians, deceased having been a member of the division recently organized at Moncton. Interment will probably be at Lot 65 to-morrow. From the Moncton Times at hand this forenoon we glean the following particulars regarding the sad affair: It was discovered about one o'clock on Thursday morning in Mr. McNaughton's room at the Park Hotel. He was alone at the time, and it is supposed that the fire which was left burning at his bedside. The first person to discover the blaze was his brother, Dan McNaughton, who was up about the house at that time. He saw a flash of light and a smell of smoke. He ran upstairs and found his brother in bed, with a lamp burning at his bedside. The fire had spread to the bed and the room was filled with smoke. Mr. McNaughton was found to be dead. The cause of death was asphyxiation. The fire was caused by the lamp which was left burning at his bedside. The room was found to be in a state of great disorder. The fire had done considerable damage to the room. The body was removed to the morgue and the funeral will be held on Saturday. The remains will be taken to the home of the deceased in the morning.

THE DEATH OF THE CZAR.

THE announcement in the Official Gazette of the late evening read, "Emperor Alexander quietly fell asleep in the Lord at 2.15 this afternoon." LONDON, Nov. 2. The Prince and Princess of Wales, on their way to Livadia, were at the last station this side of Vienna when they received a despatch announcing the Czar's death. The news did not reach Balmoral until 7 o'clock last evening. The Queen was not surprised, as she had been informed of every phase of the Czar's illness. But she was deeply moved when she learned that the end had come. She sent a long telegram to the Czarina, and issued to the court officials the usual instructions as to mourning.
