# Minneapolis Is Winner

HALIFAX — (CP) — Drivers  
James "Roach" MacGregor of  
Charlottetown and Bunny Walker

# Ball Park Vote Comes Tomorrow

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The  
most familiar name on ballots in  
California primary election  
won't be that of a candidate. It  
will be Chavez Ravine.  
This hilly, weed-grown patch of  
land a mile from city hall has  
become widely known since  
Walter O'Malley and his Los An-  
geles Dodgers decided to build a  
ball park in it.  
Tuesday the voters decide for  
or against Proposition B, which  
outlines the contract between the  
city and the Dodgers. It provides  
for a swap whereby the city turns  
300 unimproved acres in Chavez  
Ravine over to the Dodgers in ex-  
change for Wrigley Field, the old  
coast league grounds, with O'Malley  
putting up his own money for  
the new park.  
When the city council approved  
the contract 10-4 last fall there  
seemed no further obstacle to  
shifting the Dodgers from Brook-  
lyn.

# Resignation Accepted

PARIS (AP)—The World Box-  
ing Committee Saturday accepted  
the resignation of the United  
States National Boxing Associa-  
tion from its ranks.  
Julius Helfand, chairman of the  
New York State Athletic Commis-  
sion, was re-elected president for  
another one-year term.  
The NBA has been in and out  
of the world championship com-  
mittee since it was formed in  
1953.  
The world committee charged  
that the NBA has consistently dis-  
regarded the committee decisions  
on world title affairs.  
"The NBA by its repeated ac-  
tions has given numerous exam-  
ples of its bad faith in the  
application of committee deci-  
sions, counter to the assurances  
that had been given," the com-  
mittee statement said.

# Won Long Bike Trial

second of two tests designed to  
pick Canada's four-man team for  
the 1958 British Empire Games.

man bunch. Each finished sec-  
onds behind the winner in second,

knocked out Johnny Kilbane in  
the sixth round to win the world  
featherweight boxing champion-  
ship 35 years ago tonight at New  
York. Kilbane had worn the  
crown for 11 years, but Criqui

he was beaten by Johnny Dun-  
dee. In those days the weight  
limit was 122 pounds, compared  
to the present 126.

# Driver Is Barred After Fatality

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Ed El-  
lian, a big and bitter man, was  
barred Saturday from competing  
in any auto races sanctioned by  
the United States Auto Club as  
result of the 15-car pileup Fri-  
day in the 42nd 500-mile Memori-  
al Day classic.  
Jimmy Bryan of Phoenix, Ariz.,  
driving the only car of the first  
wreck that missed the wreck, won  
the race.  
Pat O'Connor of North Vernon,  
Ind., one of the outstanding driv-  
ers in the United States, died in  
the worst crash — in number of  
cars involved — in the Indianapolis  
Motor Speedway's 47-year his-  
tory.  
The 200-pound, 31-year-old El-  
lian, who holds the speedway  
mile-a-lap qualifying record, was  
killed after the accident as say-  
ing that he charged into the turn  
too fast.  
But Saturday Elisian said:  
"I don't know why I lost it (the  
race)."  
"I had gone through that cor-  
ner faster. I have had these hot  
dogs (race drivers) spin in front  
of me and run me through the  
wall on other tracks. It sure  
isn't intentional. I liked O'Con-  
nor as well as anybody."
