

Large Congregation At S'side Mission Service Last Evening

A congregation of nearly 600 men and women and children attended the fourth "Calling Christ To Canada" evangelistic meeting, held in the Civic Auditorium, Summerside last evening, under the sponsorship of the United Churches in the area between Alberton and Hunter River.

The missioner, Dr. R.W. Armstrong, Ottawa took as his text "Now is the Accepted Time; This is the day of salvation," and told of a new concept in Christian thinking in the past few years that centres around the word "now" more than ever before.

Dr. Armstrong stated that God doesn't think of things in terms of time measurement and that "if we analyze time properly we will be led to something that transcends the world in which we live," he said, "When we use a

moment right and proper, we do something that resonates through eternity." The missioner pointed out the parallel between the atom and a moment and said that "just as an atom radiates changes in rocks, wood and other materials in which it comes in contact, so radiation from our life changes everything it touches; each moment it is sending forth something that will eternally change something else."

In explaining the portion of text "This is the day of salvation" Dr. Armstrong said salvation is the gathering up of all talents and divine gifts that God has given us and bringing them into harmony with His purposes. He stated that years ago ministers used to scare people into getting right with God, by preaching the dangers of delaying in getting right with God, the Missioner said "I am not sure that scaring people into religion is the right way, but there are just as important issues at stake right now as there were then and to neglect eternal values is a terrible thing."

Rev. L.M. Murray, Kensington conducted the service and Rev. J. Herber Kean, O'Leary read the Scripture lesson and led in prayer. Dr. Peter MacDonald, Crapaud directed the choir of 30 mixed voices as well as the congregational singing. A solo was rendered by Mrs. L.M. Galbeck. Mrs. Harold Schurman was pianist and Mrs. Ric Sheen organist. The mission services continued this evening at eight o'clock, following the prayer meeting at 7.30

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Let's Talk It Over

Someone has said that the principles of grammar and good English expression is based on excellent taste. We presume the same can be said of the principles of English pronunciation. Words are pronounced with a view to euphony, comfort of expression and differentiation of meaning. Strange enough when those in authority seem to make a poor choice, the people in the role of common usage step over the picture and overrule the boys who make the official decisions.

For example, such a word as "Hospitable" with the accent placed on the first syllable is rather difficult to pronounce. You pronounce the "Hos" giving the syllable its proper stress, and the other three syllables have to be thrown out in a big rush without any stress. Many people stress the "pit" which is more comfortable. The word "inexplicable" is another such example. Instead of stressing the "ex" as is supposed to be correct, people often stress the more comfortable "pic". Again the word "buoy" is pronounced like "boy". Those who handle the float generally call it a "boo-ee" which is a more musical word, and less likely to cause confusion. When a word is pronounced almost like such words as hue, hew, hugh, yew and you, is it any wonder many farm folk get away from all the confusion by pronouncing it "yo". The experts decide the pronunciation, but the common people sometimes show a lot of common sense in rejecting their decisions.

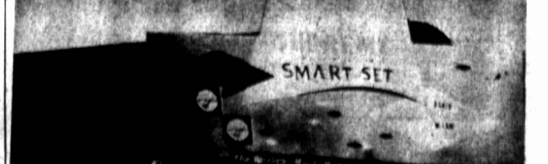
SECOND GAME
