Is it a Breach of the Scott Act?

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR.—While attending a Customs' seizure sale, yesterday, I noticed two quarter casks of gin were put up and sold by auction to a gentleman resident. I am aware that the Scott Act is in force, and under its provisions the sale of liquor is punishable by fine and imprisonment. I, therefore, cannot understand why spirituous liquors are openly sold by action from our Government warehouses. Would you or somebody else be kind enough to throw some light on the matter. The public would like to know whether the Auctioneer is, or is not, guilty of a breach of the Scott Act.
